## Wright evidence 'flimsy'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texas Democrats say an ethics committee report charging Speaker Jim Wright with numerous violations of House rules appears based fragments of evidence that won't stand up to scrutiny.

The Democrats said the report actually strengthens Wright's position as he tries to hold on to the nation's third-highest office.

#### Saudi arrested

BERN, Switzerland (AP) -Police today arrested Saudi arms dealer Adnan Khashoggi on a warrant issued by a U.S. judge in a racketeering case involving Ferdinand and Imelda Marcos. the Justice Ministry announced.

A ministry statement said Khashoggi was charged with "illegal property dealings" including with real estate owned by the former Philippines president and his wife and valuable paintings that disappeared from Manila's Metropolitan Museum after Marcos went into exile in February 1986.

Khashoggi, 54, who has lived in Paris, is accused of submitting a false document to French officials who were seeking evidence at the request of U.S. investigators.

### DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT: My nails are a mess due to onycholysis. The nailbeds were injured by an acidic cleaning substance. Do you have any suggestions for encouraging my nails to be-

come healthy again?
DEAR READER: Onycholysis is the separation of the nail from the nailbed, with a whitish appearance to the nail. The condition can result from injury or infection, particularly from chronic fungus infection of the growing portion of the nail at the cuticle. Treatment depends on the cause.

If the nailbed was damaged by a cleaning substance, new nail tissue will tend to grow out abnormally. This may be permanent. Sometimes surgery to remove the damaged portion will allow healthy nail-producing cells to take over. The effects of the procedure are uncomfortable and the result cannot be guaranteed.

If the nail is infected with fungus, such as Candida, anti-fungus pills (notably, griseofulvin) taken for several months may restore the nail to normal

I suggest that you have an examination by a dermatologist, who can advise you what, if any, treatment would be suitable.

DEAR DR. GOTT: During a robbery at work, I got a fractured skull and was in a coma for a week or two. My intellectual capabilities are impaired, which makes me angry, but my senses of smell and taste are driving me wild: rotten eggs all the time. Doctors tell me to live with it. What do you suggest?

DEAR READER: A blow that is forceful enough to cause a skull frac- P.O. Box 91369, Cleveland, OH 44101ture will almost always result in seri- 3369. Be sure to mention the title.

In your case, I suspect you had a concussion, resulting in coma fol-lowed by neurological abnormalities.

If a blow to the head is severe enough to cause bleeding into brain tissue, permanent weakness and other handicaps can result. Fortunately, you did not experience the more serious consequences of head injury. Nonetheless, you have aptly described two common conditions associated with severe concussion: impairment of intellectual capability and disruption of taste/smell senses. These problems are usually untreatable.

However, if treatment is possible, a neurosurgeon or a neurologist could

advise you.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My daughter and her family live close to an oil refinery. When the wind is in the right direction, the odor takes over the whole town. It seems as if they are constant-

ly suffering with stuffy noses. Could the fumes be hard on them?

DEAR READER: Yes, the vapors from an oil refinery can cause reactions of irritation and congestion in susceptible individuals. As you can imagine, this situation is difficult to resolve; oil companies may deny there is a problem.

Nonetheless, I believe that refinery fumes can be detrimental to health, under certain circumstances, by causing chronic lung and upper respira-

tory disorders. For more information about pro-



#### Eliminating safe exit cards

The key to achieving a proper endplay is to eliminate the defenders' safe' exit cards before thrusting the right defender on lead. Timing also is

West's lead of the king promised the queen, and that was all the information South needed to make six diamonds. When declarer won the first trick with his spade ace, he could not immediately draw trumps. Instead he played the ace of diamonds, cashed the K-A of hearts and ruffed a heart. Next a diamond went to dummy's jack, and the last heart was ruffed. That properly set the stage. All that was left was for declarer to get off lead with his remaining spade. West won the trick and had a choice of leading into South's A-Q of clubs or playing another spade. Since a spade would allow South to dis-

card a club from dummy while ruffing in his hand, there was no way to stop the slam

This deal is interesting in that the same strategy would work even if East had all three of the outstanding trumps. Declarer plays the same way with the same result, but of course he cannot draw more than two rounds of trumps. Tomorrow we will have an example of an endplay achieved while a trump remains in a defender's hand.

## WTC course selected among state's top 25



### Exxon's cleanup plan has been approved VALDEZ, Alaska (AP) — Im-

agine a road from Los Angeles to Phoenix, Ariz., 30 feet wide and coated with 4,200 gallons of oily black slime per mile. Now slop the goop onto remote beaches and coves along Prince William Sound.

The Exxon Valdez tanker wreck has left about that much oil on the sound's once pristine shoreline — Exxon figures it at 366 miles. And the giant corporation won federal approval Monday for a plan to clean up most of

But the ambitious strategy to clean up 305 miles faces sharp skepticism and new demands that it be broadened to include other polluted areas. Some officials just smiled sadly when asked its chance of success.

The plan calls for a mobilization by early June of 4,000 people and scores of vessels. By Sept. 15, they're supposed to erase the tarry remains of the nation's worst oil spill from the rocky beaches of one of the world's richest regions for fish and wildlife.

Adm. Paul Yost, the head of the Coast Guard, approved the proposal Monday. But he wondered if Exxon could meet its goals in the face of the sound's notorious weather and the limited time available.

"I'm concerned whether the level of activity can be kept up through the summer to complete cleanup," said Yost, who demanded the plan last week.

described it as barely adequate. "It needs more work," he said, adding it would be next week before he would comment on whether he believed it would

Yost, overseeing the cleanup at President Bush's direction, listened to the concerns of Kelso and other state officials. He then gave Exxon until May 1 to come up with plans to deal with oil contamination outside the sound and disposal of oily waste.

"The plan will be expanded to add in these other concerns, said Exxon spokesman Don Cor-

He said that on Saturday, Exxon would field its first landing craft equipped to work on the

But Exxon consultant Ed Owens said that initially, more time would be spent on training than cleaning.

The 987-foot tanker Exxon Valdez sumped more than 10 million gallons of crude oil into the sound after it ran aground on Bligh Reef on March 24. The company has been criticized for its initial response.

The U.S. Senate voted in 1834 to censure President Andrew Jackson for the removal of federal deposits from the Bank of the United States.

The testimony came Monday in a suit filed by Delta against the federal government in an attempt to force the government to help pay about \$125 million in claims by victims' relatives and \$25 million for the cost of the L-1011 destroyed in the crash.

Flight 191 crashed at Dallas-Fort Worth Interntational Airport during a thunderstorm on Aug. 2, 1985, killing 136 people on board and a motorist. Twentyfive people survived.

The non-jury liability trial, which recessed last month after the government rested its case, resumed with Delta presenting rebuttal witnesses.

The National Transportation Safety Board has blamed the crash on a microburst, a violent downward blast of air often associated with severe thunderstorms.

## 'Heathers' is savage high-school satire

In Movie Theaters

HEATHERS (R) If you've seen enough John Hughes-style teen movies to last you a lifetime, you may get kick out of this audacious pitchblack satirical comedy that marks the feature-film debuts of director Michael Lehmann and screenwriter Daniel Waters. These genre-kidding talents have had the malicious wit to bend B-movie traditions to their own entertaining purposes. Lehmann and Waters have concocted a rude send-up of snobby school cliques, preoccupied parents, teen angst and the stratified cruelties (and inanities) of high-school society. This movie's obscenity-spouting teens are hilariously appalling: They're either perfect, calculating princesses (a trio of whom are named Heather, thus the movie's title), blandly narcissistic jocks, or amoral rebels who will stop at nothing to challenge the - forgive the pun class structure.

In the latter camp are the surly outsider J.D. (Christian Slater) and the lovely Veronica (Winona Ryder) the latter a borderline member of the Heather clique. She stands by as the self-centered blond darlings play their weird version of croquet, though she writes vicious thoughts about them in her diary.

Spurred on by J.D., Veronica gets to live out her fantasy of seeing the Heathers get their comeuppance. First, she watches as J.D. blithely offers disguised drain cleaner to one Heather to drink. Soon the couple has become a two-person revenge squad, wiping out the most popular and the

The movie plays like a cross be-

tween "Carrie" and "River's Edge." It has a bracing perversity, though it loses its way in the final section as Veronica develops a sense of remorse. The violent exploitation-movie climax seems more conventional than what has come before it - less in keeping with the film's gleefully mean-spirited satire. But this is wild stuff. GRADE: \*\*\*1/2

DEAD CALM (R) Australian director Phillip Noyce, who gave us the affectionate, nostalgic "Newsfront," here tries his hand at a thriller designed to have us screaming in the

It's about a couple (Nicole Kidman and Sam Neill) who take a cruise on their yacht along the Great Barrier Reef to try to overcome the tragedy of their daughter's recent death. An act of kindness gets them in deep trouble: They rescue a man (Billy Zane) on a raft, who turns out to be the only survivor of a massacre that has taken place on a nearby ship. He's also a pyscho. Soon, the husband is stranded in the cabin of the other ship, which turns out to be slowly sinking, while the wife is stuck on their boat, playing a deadly cat-and-mouse game with the enigmatic intruder.

Achieving a charged, ominous atmosphere, this movie is a good-looking suspense thriller. But it gets pretsilly as the melodramatic contrivances mount up. There's also a cute dog named Benji on board: When the wife throws the boat keys overboard to thwart her attacker, Benji, good dog that he is, retrieves them. GRADE: ★★

TUCKER (PG) Paramount There's an appealing Frank Capraesque parable at the center of Francis Ford Coppola's portrait of Preston Tucker the revolutionary auto maker who took on the combined powers of the Detroit car manufacturers and their Washington politicians.

Framed by an asssertively corny, mock-Tucker company promo film, the movie is a celebration of the visionary instinct, done with nostalgic Norman Rockwell imagery. It's deft and enjoyable, but it's also all on one level, and ends up seeming a little shallow. As Tucker, Jeff Bridges has a beguiling sunniness and spunk. A jowly, mustachioed Martin Landau got an Oscar nomination for his supporting turn. GRADE: ★★1/2

"I'm concerned whether the level of activity can be kept up through the summer to complete cleanup," said Yost, who demanded the plan last week.

Dennis Kelso, commissioner of the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation. described it as barely adequate.

"It needs more work," he said, adding it would be next week before he would comment on whether he believed it would

Yost, overseeing the cleanup at President Bush's direction, listened to the concerns of Kelso and other state officials. He then gave Exxon until May 1 to come up with plans to deal with oil contamination outside the sound and disposal of oily waste.

The plan will be expanded to add in these other concerns,' said Exxon spokesman Don Cor-



The 987-foot tanker Exxon Valdez sumped more than 10 million gallons of crude oil into the sound after it ran aground on Bligh Reef on March 24. The company has been criticized for its initial response.

## Rebuttal testimony begins in Delta Flight 191 lawsuit trial

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — testified Monday that if the crew A mood-altering drug taken by the pilot of Delta Flight 191 flight, an expert has testified.

Dr. Frederick Lewis, an expert on the drug Stelazine, said the 2-milligrams to 3 milligrams apparently taken by Capt. Edward Connors constituted a dosage too small to have caused any dangerous side effects.

The testimony came Monday in a suit filed by Delta against the federal government in an attempt to force the government to help pay about \$125 million in claims by victims' relatives and \$25 million for the cost of the L-1011 destroyed in the crash.

Flight 191 crashed at Dallas-Fort Worth Interntational Airport during a thunderstorm on Aug. 2, 1985, killing 136 people on board and a motorist. Twentyfive people survived.

The non-jury liability trial, which recessed last month after the government rested its case, resumed with Delta presenting rebuttal witnesses.

The National Transportation Safety Board has blamed the crash on a microburst, a violent downward blast of air often associated with severe

thunderstorms. The government has contended that plane's crew should have tried sooner to maneuver the jet out of the storm.

## 'Heathers' is savage high-school satire

In Movie Theaters

HEATHERS (R) If you've seen enough John Hughes-style teen movies to last you a lifetime, you may get a kick out of this audacious pitchblack satirical comedy that marks the feature-film debuts of director Michael Lehmann and screenwriter Daniel Waters. These genre-kidding talents have had the malicious wit to bend B-movie traditions to their own entertaining purposes. Lehmann and Waters have concected a rude send-up of snobby school cliques, preoccupied parents, teen angst and the stratified cruelties (and inanities) of high-school society. This movie's obscenity-spouting teens are hilariously appalling: They're either perfect, calculating princesses (a trio of whom are named Heather, thus the movie's title), blandly narcissistic jocks, or amoral rebels who will stop at nothing to challenge the - forgive the pun class structure.

In the latter camp are the surly outsider J.D. (Christian Slater) and the lovely Veronica (Winona Ryder) the latter a borderline member of the Heather clique. She stands by as the self-centered blond darlings play their weird version of croquet, though she writes vicious thoughts about them in her diary.

Spurred on by J.D., Veronica gets to live out her fantasy of seeing the Heathers get their comeuppance. First, she watches as J.D. blithely offers disguised drain cleaner to one Heather to drink Soon the couple has become a two-person revenge squad, wiping out the most popular and the

The movie plays like a cross be-

tween "Carrie" and "River's Edge." It has a bracing perversity, though it loses its way in the final section as Veronica develops a sense of remorse. The violent exploitation-movie climax seems more conventional than what has come before it - less in keeping with the film's gleefully mean-spirited satire. But this is wild stuff. GRADE: ★★★½

DEAD CALM (R) Australian director Phillip Noyce, who gave us the affectionate, nostalgic "Newsfront," here tries his hand at a thriller designed to have us screaming in the

It's about a couple (Nicole Kidman and Sam Neill) who take a cruise on their vacht along the Great Barrier Reef to try to overcome the tragedy of their daughter's recent death. An act of kindness gets them in deep trouble: They rescue a man (Billy Zane) on a raft, who turns out to be the only survivor of a massacre that has taken place on a nearby ship. He's also a pyscho. Soon, the husband is stranded in the cabin of the other ship, which turns out to be slowly sinking, while the wife is stuck on their boat playing a deadly cat-and-mouse game with the enigmatic intruder.

Achieving a charged, ominous atmosphere, this movie is a good-looking suspense thriller. But it gets pretty silly as the melodramatic contrivances mount up. There's also a cute dog named Benji on board: When the wife throws the boat keys overboard to thwart her attacker, Benji, good dog that he is, retrieves them. GRADE: ★★

## Probe begins into sudden gas increases

WASHINGTON (AP) -Gasoline prices around the country rose suddenly after the Exxon Valdez spilled 10 million gallons of oil in Alaska, but Exxon and a government energy official told a Senate hearing the accident

GLEN ELLEN, Calif. (AP) — Authorities said they found a note man's blood-splattered car hours after he killed five people and shortly before he slit the throats of his three young daughters.

Other new details also emerged about the bloody rampage in which seven people died, including allegations that winery worker Ramon Salcido had tried to kill the wife of a co-worker but his gun jammed.

Salcido continued to elude authorities today as a 5-day-old manhunt stretched from Canada to Mexico.
