## Wreck injuries fatal for Lubbock driver

A 38-year-old Lubbock man was killed when the 1985 Mack bobtail truck he was driving went out of control and overturned at 6:35 p.m. Thursday 4.5 miles north of Dermott on U.S. 84.

The Department of Public Safety said Valentine J. Ojeaga, a Nigerian who was in the United States as a resident alien and working for Temple Electric of Lubbock, was northbound with a load of transformers when the truck went through the median and flipped as it crossed the southbound lanes of the highway.

A DPS trooper said Ojeaga was not wearing a seatbelt and was ejected as the truck rolled.

The vehicle came back upright and continued more than 400 feet down the narrow ditch before it

finally came to a stop in some brush, he said.

Ojeaga was taken by Snyder EMS Ambulance Service to Cogdell Memorial Hospital, where Justice of the Peace Dan Callaway pronounced him dead at 7:43 p.m.

The victim reportedly had suffered massive internal injuries and possibly a broken neck.

A county front-end loader was summoned to help clean up the transformers, which were blocking traffic in the southbound lanes, and local wrecker service operators worked at the scene until around midnight to clean up the transformers and debris.

# Doctors and nurses confused about concept of brain death, study finds

CHICAGO (AP) — Confusion among doctors about the legal and medical definition of "brain dead" is common and may deprive some people of life-saving organ transplants, doctors say.

"Health professionals have personal concepts of death that

vary widely and are often confused and or self-contradictory," according to authors of a study, led by Dr. Stuart J. Youngner of Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine in Cleveland.

But the findings should not be taken to mean that doctors are declaring patients brain dead when they are not, say authors of related articles accompanying the study published in today's Journal of the American Medical Association.

Rather, "they might be hesi-

tant in making a diagnosis of brain death if they were uncertain about what it is to be brain dead," said one author, Dr. Joseph M. Darby, director of trauma and neurosurgical intensive care at Presbyterian-University Hospital in Pittsburgh.

"Confusion and or delays amongst health-care personnel might be an impediment to organ retrieval," he said in a telephone interview Thursday.

Researchers in Cleveland asked 195 health professionals at four university affiliated hospitals there to answer the question: "What brain functions must be lost for a patient to be declared brain dead?"

The professionals included 39 doctors likely to be required to make direct decisions about brain death and 156 doctors and nurses who might be involved in the care of brain-dead patients, the researchers said.

## AIDS testing bill gets tentative okay

AUSTIN (AP) — A House bill lawmakers tentatively approved allowing AIDS testing without specific consent from patients would clear up confusion among doctors and hospitals, says the bill sponsor.

But opponents contend the measure could lead to indiscriminate testing.

In debate on the bill Thursday, Rep. Eddie Cavazos, D-Corpus Christi, said he was concerned that patients would be tested unknowingly and that the results could affect their jobs or their medical insurance.

"Big Brother will know. Everybody else will know, and you won't know ... and it goes on

your record," Cavazos said.

Rep. Nancy McDonald, D-El Paso, said, "My fear in passing this law is that now we will be saying you don't really have ... the obligation to tell the patient what you're doing.

"Patients have a right to know what they're being tested for," Ms. McDonald said. "But in this law, we're giving them the implication that they don't need to know."

Ms. McDonald, who also opposed the bill during committee hearings, said she would offer an amendment before final passage that would require patients to be notified if they are being tested for AIDS.

The bill by Rep. Billy Clemons, D-Pollak, would modify 1987 legislation requiring special consent for AIDS testing.

It was tentatively passed on a non-record vote Thursday. It requires another vote for final passage.

Under Clemons' bill, patients could be asked to sign a specific consent form for AIDS testing or they could be tested by signing a general consent form for medical tests, which would not specify AIDS testing.

# DR. GOTT PETER GOTT, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've always weighed 110 pounds. Now I weigh 104, have headaches every day, eat sweets like crazy and am still losing weight. What's going on?

DEAR READER: Sudden weight loss, in the presence of normal or increased appetite, is a red flag for doctors because it can indicate several diseases.

For example, an over-active thyroid gland will often cause headache and weight loss, along with nervousness and feeling too warm.

In addition, some intestinal disorders, such as malabsorption, can prevent your body from achieving full nutrition from the food you eat.

Finally, stress and anxiety are frequently associated with unexplained weight loss.

I suggest you see a doctor for an examination and testing to discover the cause of your problems.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My healthy niece recently died at 8 months from SIDS. What are the causes of this vicious, shocking death?

DEAR READER: Sudden infant death syndrome is a catastrophic tragedy for the parents whose healthy children die from this condition. This has an incidence of about one in every 350 live births and is the most common cause of death in children between two weeks and 1 year of age.

The origin is unknown. Some experts believe that infants who die from SIDS suffocate because their immature nervous systems do not ap-

propriately trigger respiration, especially when the child is asleep at night.

Other pediatricians believe that SIDS children have abnormalities in their airways or hearts. Treatment is difficult because many SIDS victims die unexpectedly, without warning. Because this bizarre syndrome tends to run in families (10 times greater incidence among siblings), high-risk children can be monitored at home with a device that signals the parents when the child becomes apneic (ceases breathing).

Fortunately, those children who are identified and monitored usually outgrow the affliction within a year.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My anal sphincter seems to be getting tighter with age and it makes bowel movements painful. Is this normal for a 79-year-old male?

DEAR READER: With age, the anal sphincter can narrow. This can make defecation uncomfortable.

Such a situation can usually be remedied by the use of mild laxatives, such as bran or prune juice, or by stool-softeners, such as Colace; or both. The chronic use of strong laxatives should be avoided.

Because anal stenosis has causes other than the aging process — growths, for instance — you should be checked by your doctor to make sure nothing is wrong. A simple rectal examination will enable the doctor to determine the cause of your problem.

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## San Jacinto marker sets anniversary

SAN JACINTO BATTLEGROUND, Texas (AP) — Standing like a silent sentry over the battleground where Sam Houston's soldiers beat the Mexican forces of Santa Anna in 1836 is the San Jacinto Monument, the towering limestone spire that was formally opened 50 years ago today.

Ceremonies will be held at the site today to mark the 50th anniversary of the monument's opening and to honor San Jacinto Day, the holiday that commemorates the historic battle in which the Republic of Texas won independence from Mexico.

During the formal opening of the San Jacinto Monument in 1939, thousands were on hand for the event, including 80-year-old Andrew Jackson Houston, the last surviving son of Sam Houston.

Houston signed dozens of autographs and posed for pictures with Indian chiefs while a barnstorming pilot in a tri-motor aircraft carried passengers over the monument for 60 cents a head.

But the ceremonies today honoring the limestone spire that is a Washington Monument look-alike are likely to be more subdued, with an address by Sen. Phil Gramm the high point. The monument rises 570 feet above petrochemical plants east of Houston.

## Make your own happy ending

With good reason there is a big question mark in the bidding box beside the pass made by East over North's four-heart bid. When a suit has been bid and strongly supported and the opponents begin exchanging cue-bids on their way to slam, that is the time to watch for an opportunity to make a lead-directing double. But East missed that chance, so it is hard to fault West for making the safe lead of the queen of clubs.

Declarer won dummy's king of clubs and drew three rounds of trump. He then cashed the ace of clubs and went after diamonds. When he played to dummy's ace and back to his queen, East followed with the two and the 10. When a third diamond was played toward the K-9 in dummy, West played low. What now? Of course there was no reason to suspect that West had started with four diamonds, but declarer still put in the diamond nine from dummy. When East showed out, South had 12 tricks and later took a losing heart finesse for an overtrick. Why was this play absolutely right?

If South goes up with the king of diamonds and East does show out, the slam will depend upon the favorable location of the king of hearts. But when declarer played the diamond nine, the contract was assured. If East won the jack of diamonds, he would have nothing to return that would not give declarer one more sure trick. (A heart would be into the A-Q while a club would allow South to discard from his hand while ruffing in dummy.)

## Top 'Man in Washington' going home after 12 years

WASHINGTON (AP) — He is perhaps the longest serving chief of diplomatic mission in Washington but his name has been conspicuously absent from State Department invitation lists for years.

He came here in the summer of 1977 with high hopes for a more congenial relationship between his government and the United States but is going home in a few days with the atmosphere worse now than when he arrived.

For Ramon Sanchez Parodi, being Fidel Castro's agent in Washington has not been an easy task.

Much of his tenure has overlapped with the era of conservative Republican dominance in Washington, a time when kind words for Castro have been as rare as frost in Havana in July.

But Sanchez Parodi has ac-

quired a reputation here as a no apologies defender of his country's leader and its revolution.

For starters, don't try to convince him about the merits of "Western values." He told a gathering at a local university the other day that to Cuba, "Western values" means centuries of Spanish colonial rule, decades of American neo-colonial rule and a capitalist system that left millions of Cubans in misery.

"We don't want to have anything to do with these values," he said, his mastery of English reflecting his long stay here.

The absence of a more normal relationship, he said, is the result of Washington's refusal to accept Cuba "as a sovereign and independent nation."

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# Spot checks show high radon levels are in American schools

WASHINGTON (AP) — School officials across the country are being advised to test for radon after the federal government found unhealthy levels of the odorless, cancer-causing gas in half the schools examined in spot checks from Maine to Washington state.

"Based on measurements taken in 3,000 schoolrooms in 16 states, it appears that elevated levels of radon gas can be found in schools throughout the United States," EPA Administrator William K. Reilly said Thursday.

He called indoor radon, which is emitted from natural radioactive decay in the ground, "one of the major environmental health threats facing Americans" and urged that officials nationwide test their schoolrooms for the gas.

The EPA, which last year issued a similar warning to homeowners after a spot check around the country, said that of 130 public schools tested in 41 communities, 54 percent of the schools had at least one room normally occupied by students or staff that registered unhealthy levels of radon.

The agency has said that any level of 4 picocuries per liter of air should be considered unhealthy and warrant additional tests and likely corrective action. In schools in five of the states the level was 20 picocuries or more and in a school in Tennessee it was found to be 136 picocuries.

By comparison, federal standards for uranium mining call for miners to wear protective equipment when radiation levels are 16 to 20 picocuries per liter of air during continuous work periods, said Richard Guimond, the EPA's director of radiation programs.

EPA spokeswoman Martha Casey said no list of the schools tested was immediately available, but affected state authorities and school officials in the 41 communities have been told of the test results.

There is no federal law requir-

ing tests for radon, although Congress enacted a law last year requiring the EPA to study the extent of radon contamination in schools. Congress has yet to provide the \$1.5 million for the program, however, said Sen. John Chafee, R-R.I., a sponsor of the legislation.

"These very preliminary findings show that radon may be a more serious health problem in our schools than we originally thought — that it may be as serious as asbestos or lead in drinking water," said Sen. Quentin Burdick, D-N.D., chairman of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee.

The EPA estimates that over a lifetime regular exposure to 4 picocuries of radon is equivalent to smoking a half pack of cigarettes a day. Scientists have estimated that radon may cause up to 20,000 lung cancer deaths a year, second only to fatalities caused by smoking.

Actual exposure of children to radon in schools is difficult to determine from the incomplete EPA tests since levels can range widely from school to school and

even among rooms in the same school, according to agency officials.

Guimond estimated in an interview that from the data obtained from the tests in the 130 schools, it is likely that students in as many as 10 percent of the nation's schools could be exposed to unhealthy radon levels on a regular basis.

Of the 3,000 schoolrooms tested, 19 percent had levels of 4 picocuries or more. About 3 percent, or 101 classrooms in six states, had levels of at least 20 picocuries, including 77 schoolrooms in Nashville, Tenn., area where the highest level — 136 picocuries — also was found.

Especially high levels also were found in schools in Butte, Mont., 51 picocuries; Los Alamos, N.M., 41 picocuries; and the Spokane, Wash., area, 98 picocuries, according to the EPA.

# Aikman inks record deal with Cowboys

IRVING, Texas (AP) - It took Jimmy Johnson three shots at Troy Aikman before he finally got his man.

It only cost a six-year contract for \$11.2 million to land him, including a \$2 million bonus.

Aikman became the quarterback of the Dallas Cowboys' future on Thursday when he signed the richest contract in NFL history for a rookie.

Johnson said he had been sweating the signing for two weeks.

"He turned me down out of high school and went to Oklahoma," said Johnson, who was then coach at Oklahoma State. "Then when I was at Miami I tried to get him when he left Oklahoma but he went to UCLA. I was afraid he would turn me down a third time."

Ironically, Oklahoma State broke Aikman's leg in his sophomore season and while he was out he decided to transfer to UCLA.

"Thanks for breaking my leg, coach," Aikman said. "You did me a favor."

Johnson wanted Aikman bad. "Everybody kept saying I had a poker face but at times I had to bite my lip to keep my enthusiasm inside," Johnson said.

Aikman said how fast he plays in the NFL depends on how quickly he picks up the system.

"The ideal way would be to take things slowly," he said. "I'll have a lot of talent around me and that will help."

Johnson said he and Aikman will go to work immediately studying film.

"There's no timetable for when Troy will play," Johnson said. "We'll go at his pace. We'll see what happens in training camp."

Aikman said he will donate some of his bonus money to both UCLA and a Henryetta, Okla., high school. He also plans to donate \$1,000 to charity for each cowboy's victory next year.

"I hope to give \$16,000," he quipped.

The 6-foot-3, 217-pound Aikman of Henryetta, Okla., who played two years at UCLA after transferring from Oklahoma, was 20-4 for the Bruins. He completed 60 percent of his passes and had 41 scoring tosses to only 17 interceptions.

Aikman was the most valuable player in the Cotton Bowl, leading UCLA to a 17-3 victory over Arkansas. He also was named the winner of the Davey O'Brien award as the nation's best quarterback. He was third in the Heisman Award balloting.

Aikman will wear the number "8" jersey, the one he wore at UCLA.

Johnson handed it to Aikman and said "I hope you wanted number eight."

Then Johnson took Aikman to his locker at Valley Ranch which had his name already painted over it.

"This is where it all begins," Johnson said. "It's a new era for the Cowboys."

Aikman said he feels he will be a better professional quarterback than he was a collegian.

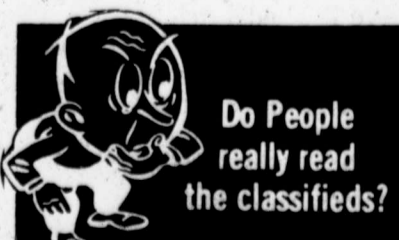

# Army officer from Texas killed by terrorists

The Viet Cong kept James N. Rowe in a cage in the jungle of Vietnam for five years, but they couldn't break his spirit with a constant barrage of propaganda and almost daily death threats.

He escaped from his cage, nearly was killed by U.S. forces who thought the black-pajama-clad Special Forces officer was a Viet Cong, and came home to the Lower Rio Grande Valley for a hero's welcome and some of his mother's homemade bread.

Rowe died early today when masked assailants opened fire on his automobile as he drove to work at the Joint U.S. Military Advisory Group headquarters.

Rowe, 51, a native of McAllen, graduated from West Point in 1960, and was captured by the Viet Cong Oct. 29, 1963. He escaped Dec. 31, 1968 after undergoing a physical and mental ordeal in a cage in the jungle.

After escaping, Rowe ran into an opening when he sighted a Cobra helicopter and began signalling for help.

The first impulse of the men in the helicopter was to shoot the man because he was dressed like the Viet Cong. But Army Maj. Dave Thompson ordered the men not to shoot because he wanted to take the man prisoner.

In his book, "Five Years To Freedom," Rowe recalled that he

jumped into the helicopter and began trying to tell the men aboard who he was.

"After five years I was out of the forest of darkness," Rowe recalled later. "I could see the horizon and the world seemed immense."

A first lieutenant at the time of his capture, Rowe was shocked to learn that he had been promoted to major. He was a colonel at the time of his death.

Rowe was taken to Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio for a medical examination and treatment and then was allowed to fly home to see his parents and other relatives.

As the helicopter approached McAllen, Rowe wrote, "I was

totally absorbed with my thoughts as I watched the towns pass below, bringing me miles closer to my home; it had been such a long, long journey both in time and space."

Rowe was driven from the McAllen airport to his parent's home.

It was an emotional scene as the young officer dashed from the car to the front porch, where his father, Lee Rowe, opened the door.

"Dad, dad, I'm sorry I didn't get home sooner; they just wouldn't let me go," he said.

Rowe had earlier told reporters he had requested that his mother, Florence, bake him some homemade bread for his first meal at home.

Rowe hugged his mother and father, later describing it as "five long years' worth of hugging."

"The three of us stood for a long moment, touching, com-

unicating without speaking."

Rowe recalled later. "My world was complete; I had reached out and touched the light."

A few weeks later, Rowe made his triumphant return to McAllen for a speech at McAllen High School's football stadium and a parade. Thousands turned out for a glimpse of the hometown hero.

Lee Rowe died in 1973 and Mrs. Rowe died in 1982.

John Ford, a cousin, was inside the Rowe home that reunion day in 1969 and recalled Rowe's emotional meeting with his parents.

He recalled that Rowe sent him a package of personal belongings before he took the assignment in the Philippines. They included some antique guns that belonged to his father.

"He knew it was a hot spot when he went over there. He knew he had to be careful," said Ford, a music instructor at Texas Southmost College in Brownsville. "He walked like an Army officer, he talked like one and he died like one."

"He was like a brother. When my father died, he helped keep me straight and make sure I stayed out of trouble," Ford recalled.

"You would think that someone who went through five years of Hell like that, that it would then be over and they could just die of old age," Ford said.

During Rowe's long captivity, his mother never gave up hope that he would return again. He was listed as missing in action and there was no official word that he was alive during that period.

"There's still no word, but he'll come home again," she told a reporter who made monthly inquiries for about two years. "You just wait and see."

### Vet rescued from garbage truck

AUSTIN (AP) — An ex-Marine who passed out while looking for cans in a Dumpster woke up under six feet of trash in a garbage truck. He called the experience scarier than two combat tours in Vietnam.

"I thought I was dead. The man upstairs must have been looking out for me," said 43-year-old Michael Badial, freshly showered, wearing clean clothes and glad to be alive.

Police officer Michael Turner heard Badial's screams for help while the truck was stopped around 2:30 a.m. Thursday.

Turner called rescue units from the Fire Department and Emergency Medical Services.

"The guy was lucky," said Martin King, operations manager for Longhorn Disposal, owners of the front-loading truck that empties Dumpsters in about five seconds.

King said the truck's compactor had been engaged but the trash compartment was only half filled with wet garbage from restaurants. "He got squeezed like a sponge," said King. "If it were wood and metal, it would have been worse."

Badial escaped with an injured right ankle and foot.

Badial, who said he is an alcoholic, said his troubles began Thursday when he began drinking with some friends.

"The last thing I remember is jumping into a Dumpster to get some cans," he said.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 (PROPOSICION NUM. 1) Shall Article I., Section 6, be amended to read as follows?

The city shall have the full right, power and authority to exercise the power of eminent domain when necessary or desirable to carry out any of the powers conferred upon it by this charter...

Each member of the City Council shall be a citizen of the United States of America and a resident citizen of the City of Snyder, and shall be a qualified voter of Texas, and shall have been such a resident citizen of the City of Snyder for a period of not less than one year immediately preceding his election, and shall not hold another public office or employment for which compensation is paid by the City of Snyder, and shall not be delinquent in any indebtedness to the City of Snyder; provided, however, that any qualified voter, with the above qualifications except as to residence, who shall have been a resident citizen for a period of not less than one year immediately preceding his election of any territory not formerly within the corporate limits of said city, or a resident citizen of such territory and/or the City of Snyder, which territory has been annexed under the provisions of this charter, shall be eligible to said office.

Each candidate for District 1 through 4 must, as of the first day available for filing for election and during his term of office, live within his or her respective district. For instance, all candidates seeking to represent District 1 must reside within District 1 as of the first day available for filing for election and, if successfully elected, during his or her term of office.

All single member district elections shall be decided by majority vote. Each registered and qualified voter properly voting in a City election may cast only one (1) ballot or vote for any particular candidate running within that district.

The two (2) at-large Council members shall be elected by plurality vote. Each registered and qualified voter voting in an at-large election may cast up to two (2) votes; however, no more than one (1) ballot or vote may be cast for any one (1) candidate.

The Mayor shall be elected by majority vote.

The general municipal elections of the City of Snyder shall be held in accordance with the Uniform Election Dates as established by the State of Texas Election Code and as amended from time to time.

A vacancy occurring in the Council, including the office of Mayor, shall be filled by a person having the qualifications required for the office being filled, and shall be selected in the following manner. If a single vacancy occurs, the Council shall appoint a successor to serve until the next general election. If two or more vacancies occur at one time, a special election shall be called by the remaining members of the Council to be held, to fill the vacancies for the unexpired terms, on the next Uniform Election Date authorized by the Election Code of the State of Texas no less than 90 days after the second vacancy occurs.

PROPOSITION NO. 12 (PROPOSICION NUM. 12) Shall Article II., Section 33 be amended to read as follows?

(Se enmendara Artículo II., Sección 33, para leer como lo siguiente?)

(1) Elections, General and Special. All elections may be served by a single polling place, located at City Hall.

(2) City Council; How Nominated and Elected; Official Ballot. Any qualified resident of the city who is otherwise qualified, may have his name printed on the official ballot for the particular office which he seeks at any election, by filing his sworn application with the City Secretary not less than forty-five (45) nor more than seventy-five (75) days prior to the date of the election. The qualifications as prescribed in Article II, Section 15, shall be complied with. The application of each candidate shall state the office for which he is a candidate and, if for Council member, the position for which he is running. The voting shall be governed by the general election laws of the State of Texas.

All registered and qualified voters of the City of Snyder shall be eligible to vote for the at-large positions. Only registered and qualified voters residing within a district shall be eligible to vote for the candidates running for that particular district position.

(3) Regulations and Laws Governing City Elections. All city elections shall be governed, except as otherwise provided by this charter, by the laws of the State of Texas governing general and municipal elections, so far as same may be applicable thereto. In addition hereto, the Council shall make any regulations which it considers needful or desirable, not inconsistent with this charter or the laws of the State of Texas, for the conduct of municipal elections, for the prevention of fraud in such elections and for the recount of ballots in case of doubt or fraud.

(4) Judging and Canvassing Elections. Municipal elections shall be judged and conducted by duly appointed election authorities, who shall be appointed by the City Council on odd numbered years for two year terms, and who shall have power to make such regulations not inconsistent with this charter or the laws of the State of Texas. Returns of the elections, general and special, shall be made by the election officers within twenty-four (24) hours from close of polls to the Council, which shall canvass and declare the results of such election not earlier than the second day nor later than the sixth day after election day.

(5) Council Ballots. The full names of all candidates for Mayor or Council members as hereinbefore provided, except such as may have withdrawn, died or become ineligible, shall be printed on the official ballots without party designations. If two candidates with the same surnames or with names so similar as to be likely to cause confusion are nominated, the addresses of their places of residence shall be placed with their names on the ballot. The order of names on the ballot shall be determined by lot.

The language on the ballot for the election of the two (2) at-large Council positions shall read in English: "You can vote for one or two candidates" and Spanish: "Puede votar por uno o dos candidatos."

(4) Evaluando y Examinando Elecciones. Se evaluara y se dirigira las elecciones municipales por inspectores de elecciones nombrados, los quienes serán nombrados por el Consejo de la Ciudad en los años de no número par por terminos de dos años, y los quines tendran el poder de hacer reglas no inconsecuente con esta carta o las leyes de El Estado de Texas. Los resultados de las elecciones, general y especial, se haran por los oficiales de elecciones dentro de veinte y cuatro (24) horas de cerrar el centro electoral al Consejo, el cual evaluara y declarara los resultados de tal eleccion no mas temprano que el secundo dia ni mas tarde que el sexto dia despues del dia electoral.

He shall keep a record of all commissions and licenses issued and shall countersign same. If no such election is to be held, the Council shall call a special election. Should the member of the Council whose removal is sought resign prior to said recall election, then no election shall be held.

If the Council shall fail to pass an ordinance proposed by initiative petition, or shall pass it in a form different from that set forth in the petition therefor, or if the Council fail to repeal a referred ordinance, the proposed or referred ordinance shall be submitted to the electors at a special or regular municipal election held on the first authorized Uniform Election Date that allows enough time to hold the election in the manner required by law.

Shall Article VIII., Section 81, be amended to read as follows? (Se enmendara Artículo VIII., Seccion 81, para leer como lo siguiente?)

After September 30, 1953, the budget document shall include:

- (1) A budget message prepared by the City Manager, which shall outline a fiscal policy for the city government and describe therein the important features of the budget with reference both to proposed expenditures and anticipated revenues for the current year; (2) a general budget summary with supporting schedules, which shall exhibit the aggregate figures of the budget in such manner as to show a balanced relationship between the total proposed expenditures and the total anticipated revenues for the fiscal year covered by the budget, and which shall compare these figures with the corresponding figures of the last complete fiscal year and with the year in progress; (3) detailed estimates of all proposed expenditures, showing the corresponding expenditures for each item for the current fiscal year and the last preceding fiscal year, with the explanations of increases or decreases recommended as compared with appropriations for the current fiscal year; (4) detailed estimates of anticipated revenues and other income; (5) delinquent taxes for current and preceding years, with estimated percentage collectible; (6) statements of the bonded debt and other indebtedness of the city government, showing the debt redemption and interest requirements, the debt authorized and unissued, the conditions of the sinking funds, if any, and the borrowing capacity of the city; (7) a complete draft of the budget ordinance, including an appropriations ordinance and such other ordinances as may be required to finance the budget.

PROPOSITION NUM. 21 (PROPOSITION NUM. 21)

Shall Article VIII., Section 82, be amended to read as follows? (Se enmendara Artículo VIII., Seccion 82, para leer como lo siguiente?)

The City Manager, at least sixty (60) days prior to the beginning of each budget year, shall submit to the Council a proposed budget and explanatory budget message. The Council shall arrange for and hold at least one public hearing on the budget during the period of its consideration; provided, however, that at least fifteen days prior public notice shall be given of such public hearing; and provided, further, that at least fifteen days prior to such public hearing, the City Secretary shall cause copies to be made available in his office for inspection by interested persons. The Council may revise, alter, increase, or decrease the items of the proposed budget prior to the adoption of the appropriation ordinance, provided that when it shall increase the total proposed expenditures, it shall also increase the total anticipated revenues so that the total means of financing the budget shall at least equal in amount the aggregate proposed expenditures. Annually, after completion of the public hearing, the Council shall approve the budget plan and shall enact, not later than the fifteenth day of September, the appropriation ordinances by a vote of at least a majority of the entire Council, and such other ordinances as may be required to make the budget effective. Should the Council take no final action on or prior to such day, the budget as submitted by the City Manager shall be deemed to have been finally adopted by the Council. As soon as possible after the completion of the tax roll, the Council shall pass the tax levy ordinance. A copy of the budget, as finally adopted, shall be filed with each of the following: the City Secretary and the County Clerk of Scurry County. The final budget shall be reproduced, and sufficient copies shall be made available for the use of all departments of the city, and for the use of interested persons, agencies and civic organizations.

Shall Article VIII., Section 84, be amended to read as follows? (Se enmendara Artículo VIII., Seccion 84, para leer como lo siguiente?)

Budget amendments shall be enacted by ordinance. The legal level of control for adopted budgets shall be by fund. Budgeting management shall be maintained at the departmental level with the aid of monthly expense reports showing line item amounts accumulated by department within each fund. Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and other commitments for the expenditure of funds are recorded in order to reserve that portion of the applicable appropriation in the General and Special Revenue Funds.

(1) On and after January 1, 1953, without prior notice by the Assessor and Collector of Taxes the city, each person, firm, business, partnership, and corporation owning real and personal estate and property in the city, including choses in action, franchises and privileges having a situs in the city, though the owners thereof be non-residents of the city, shall between the first day of January and the thirty-first day of March of each year, deliver to the Assessor and Collector of Taxes of the city a full and complete sworn inventory, upon such form as may be prescribed by the Council, of all such real and personal estate and property owned, possessed or controlled by him, her, or them, within the city on the first day of January of each year. In all cases of failure from any cause to obtain any such sworn inventory it shall be the duty of the Assessor and Collector of Taxes to ascertain the amount and value of such property and to assess the same, following the time herein fixed as he believes to be the true and full value thereof, and such assessment shall be as valid and binding as if such real and personal estate and property had been rendered by the owner.

PROPOSITION NUM. 26 (PROPOSITION NUM. 26)

Shall Article VIII., Section 91, be amended to read as follows? (Se enmendara Artículo VIII., Seccion 91, para leer como lo siguiente?)

All city taxes shall be levied, assessed and collected in the same manner as may be provided by the laws of Texas for the levy, assessment and collections of state and county taxes, unless otherwise provided by this charter, or by ordinance. All powers conferred by the general laws of Texas, as they now or hereafter may exist, for the assessment, levy and collection of taxes by county and city assessors and collectors are hereby adopted and made applicable to the city and shall be in addition to and cumulative of the powers herein expressly granted, including without limitation those granted to county and city assessors and collectors of taxes, to boards of equalization and to all other persons, bodies or agencies concerned with the assessment and collection of taxes.

Shall Article VIII., Section 95, be amended to read as follows? (Se enmendara Artículo VIII., Seccion 95, para leer como lo siguiente?)

Any purchase made or contract entered into by the City of Snyder shall be in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas as the same now exist or as they may be amended from time to time, or as provided by City ordinance when not in conflict with State law.

The City Council shall have the authority to appropriate so much of the revenues of the city, emanating from whatever sources, for the purpose of retiring and discharging the accrued indebtedness of the City of Snyder and for the purpose of constructing, purchasing, or otherwise acquiring, and thereafter maintaining, all public improvements and utilities of every nature now or hereafter authorized by the general laws of the State of Texas, and in furtherance of any and all of such purposes shall have the power to borrow money upon the faith and credit of the city and to issue negotiable coupon bonds therefor, either optional, serial or otherwise, in such sum or sums as may be deemed expedient. The total debt of the city evidenced by bonds and time warrants shall never exceed ten per cent (10%) of total assessed valuation of property shown by the last assessment roll, exclusive of any indebtedness secured in whole or in part by special assessments, and exclusive of any indebtedness secured by revenues, other than taxes, of the city or of any department or agency thereof.

## Iran-Contra documents complaints puzzle Bush

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush is voicing bewilderment over claims that sensitive Iran-Contra documents — including some dealing with his own actions — were withheld from congressional investigators.

But Bush does say emphatically that the Reagan White House, not his, was responsible for providing documents to the committees during their investigations in 1987.

If the lawmakers now have a complaint about what was and was not made available, he said, they should contact A.B. Culvahouse, who was Reagan's White House counsel at the time. "All I can just state is the confidence that I feel in Culvahouse and company," he said Thursday.

Bush also insisted anew that he would not discuss a document showing that he served as an intermediary in getting Honduras to help the Nicaraguan Contras. This came during a time when U.S. military aid to the rebels was banned.

## Investigators search ship, families grieve

WASHINGTON (AP) — Investigators aboard the USS Iowa searched for clues to the cause of a fiery explosion that claimed the lives of 47 sailors as the damaged battleship headed home and grief-stricken families dealt with the loss of their loved ones.

Officials refused to speculate publicly on what caused the worst disaster to strike a Navy ship in more than a decade, a blast that ripped through the Iowa's No. 2 gun turret during naval exercises Wednesday in the Atlantic north of Puerto Rico.

Although naval gunnery experts combed the vessel Thursday, their task was complicated by the absence of survivors from the swiveling gun housing where the explosion occurred. Eleven men escaped from powder magazines located deep within the ship at the base of the turret.

"We have no eyewitnesses to what actually transpired," Defense Secretary Dick Cheney told reporters as he returned to Washington from a NATO meeting in Brussels.

The Navy imposed a moratorium on firing 16-inch guns found on the Iowa and its three sister battleships, the New Jersey, the Wisconsin and the Missouri, pending an investigation of the disaster.

Adm. Richard D. Milligan, a former commander of the New Jersey, began the board of inquiry's investigation, and Pentagon spokesman Fred Hoffman said he could not predict when the investigation would be completed.

As the Iowa headed toward its home port in Norfolk, Va., the flag-draped, metal coffins containing the bodies of the 47 seamen killed arrived at the Dover Air Force Base in Delaware, site of the largest military mortuary. Navy honor guards carried the coffins off a camouflaged C-5 Galaxy cargo plane.

The bodies had been airlifted by helicopter from the Iowa while it was anchored offshore from Roosevelt Roads Naval Station in Puerto Rico, and placed on the cargo plane for the flight home.

Across the nation, teams of Navy officers and chaplains broke the news to the sailors' next of kin.

"It's the greatest tragedy any of us can suffer," said Rear Adm. Jimmy Pappas, the base commander in Norfolk.
