Blanca is a transfer from Texhoma, Oklahoma and was active in FHA IV and clerical practice IV.

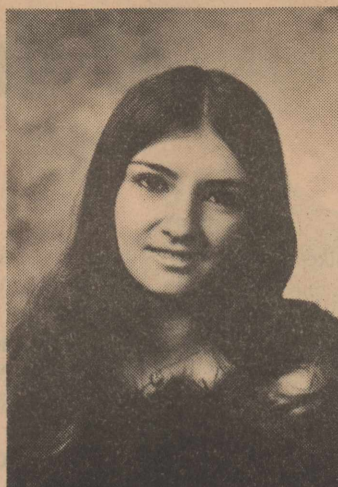

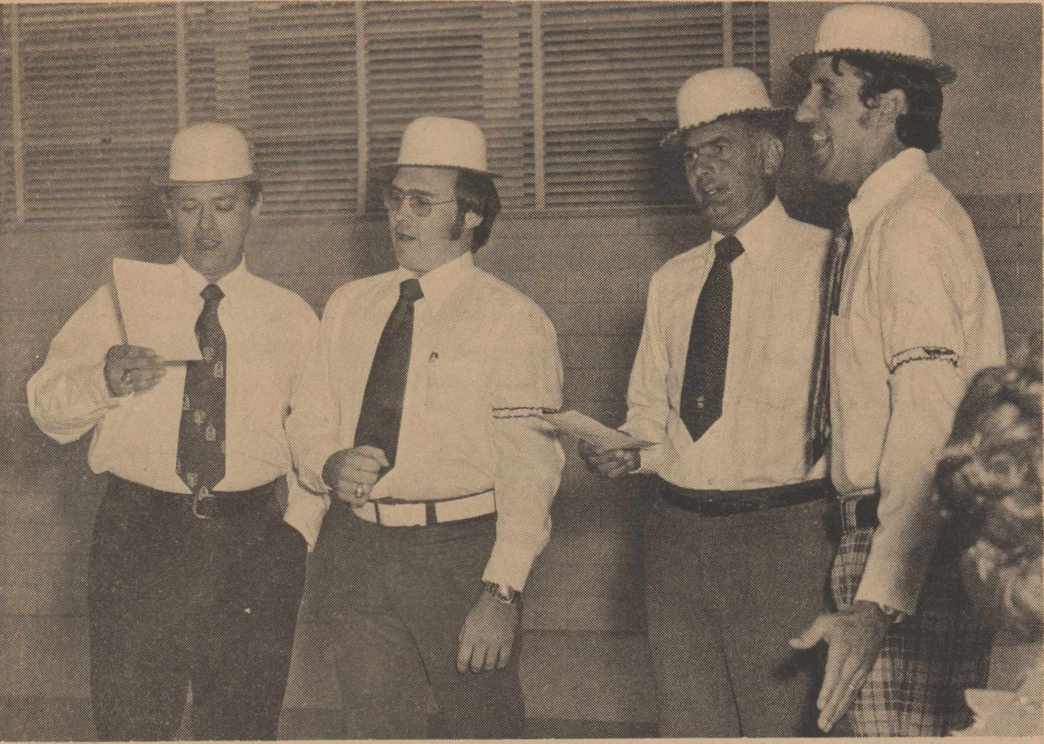

**Stratford Inc. Makes Restructuring Sales**

HOUSTON....Stratford of Texas, Inc., an agricultural company with floricultural and livestock operations, announced today that it had successfully completed the sale of its domestic poultry operations to Valmac Industries, Inc. on Monday, May 12, 1975. The consummation of the sale to Valmac was the final and most significant in a series of steps announced earlier in the year designed to yield Stratford a total of approximately \$26,000,000 in relief to the company in the form of cash, the assumption by buyers of Stratford debt and the partial conversion of short term obligations into long term debt. The other steps all of which have been completed, include the sale of the Company's Bar-L farm land and grow yard facilities, the negotiation of \$4,000,000 in additional credit from Stratford's principal bank, the sale of the assets of Stratford's Monark Egg Corporation subsidiary and the restructuring of a February 1975 obligation of \$3,447,000 to International Cattle Systems so that it will fall due in installments through 1978.

In connection with the consummation of the sale of the domestic poultry division Stratford paid demand notes to its principal bank aggregating \$5,484,200. As a result of this payment, Stratford's domestic indebtedness to its principal bank totaling \$14,700,000 is now entirely on a term basis, with \$1,500,000 maturing on March 31, 1976, and \$13,200,000 maturing on December 31, 1976. As a result of the consummation of all of the foregoing steps, Stratford now has a positive working capital position for the first time in many months and is in a position to meet its current cash demands.

In announcing the successful completion of the sale of Stratford's poultry division, Stratford's principal objective continued to be to honor and discharge all of its obligations, including obligations to cattle program investors, as they become due. He noted that Stratford would have substantial cash demands during the first quarter of fiscal 1976, and that the Company's ability to honor those demands would depend heavily on the future success of continuing operations.

The principal operations remaining after the sale of the domestic poultry subsidiaries include Stratford's Green Thumb floricultural operations, its poultry operations in Mexico and its cattle feeding division. In rebuilding Stratford, the principal emphasis will be on the Green Thumb floricultural business. As has been previously announced, revenues for the first quarter of fiscal 1975 from floricultural operations increased 49 per cent over the same period in 1974 and pre-tax earnings increased 30 percent for the quarter. The expansion and modernization of floricultural production location No. 4 which has been in process for

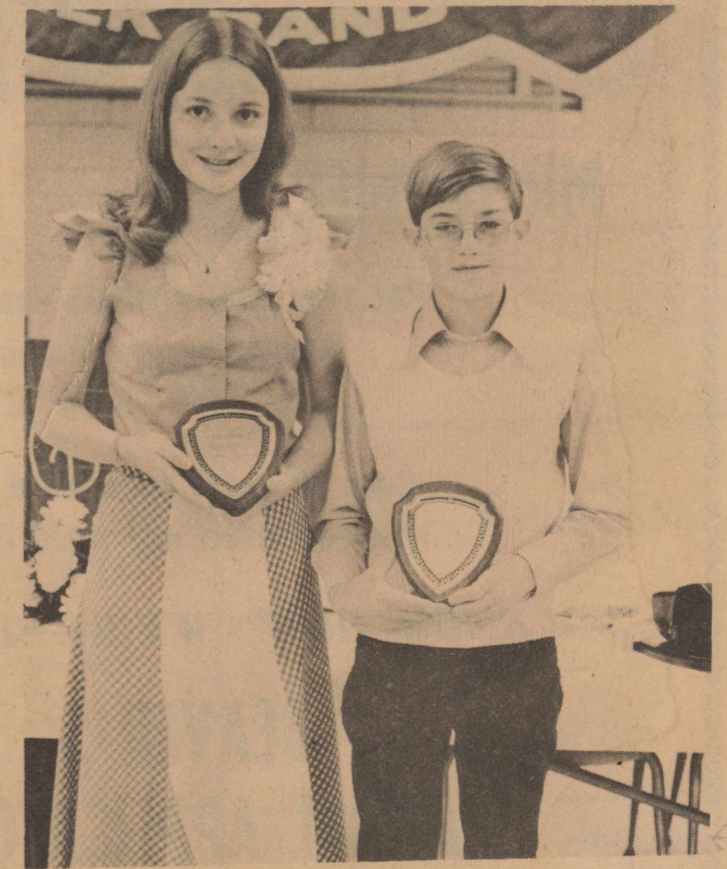

I have seen many tiny red berries hanging from those short vines in many a home in this county.

Strawberries, in season now, are a good source of Vitamin C, a nutrient needed daily.

The family will stay happy if an ample supply of berries is frozen now to serve them throughout the year in pies, as fruit topping, or make that all American favorite ice cream.

I advised selecting firm, fully ripe strawberries for freezing. Wash carefully and cap. Leave small berries whole and slice large ones into a bowl or shallow pan.

If sweetened berries are desired, sprinkle about 3/4 cup of sugar over each quart of berries. Turn them over gently until sugar is dissolved and juice forms.

Pack strawberries in moisture vapor-proof containers. Press down into juice. Leave 1/2 inch headspace in wide-mouth pint containers. Place lids on container, label with name of fruit and date. Then freeze immediately at 0 degree F. or below.

It is noted that frozen strawberries will keep for 12 months at this temperature with hardly any loss of quality. So freeze your strawberries and in January you can use your home grown supply for a company dessert of strawberry shortcake.

## Social Security News

Have you a question about social security? Address it to the Social Security Administration, 317 East third street, Amarillo, Tx 79101. You will receive an answer in this column or by mail.

Q. I started receiving social security disability benefits for the month of July 1974. I have friends who are receiving disability benefits and are also entitled to Medicare benefits. When will I become eligible for Medicare benefits?

A. You will become entitled to Medicare benefits in the 25th month from July 1974, your month of eligibility to disability benefits, or August 1976

assuming that you remain eligible for disability benefits. Q. I am over age 65 and applied for social security benefits but received a letter stating that I had not worked long enough in employment covered by social security to be eligible for monthly benefits. How may I become eligible for Medicare benefits?

A. You may now have Medicare Part B coverage by enrolling for Medicare coverage. The monthly premium is \$6.70. You may enroll in the three months prior to the month of attainment of age 65, the month that you are age 65, and the three months after your attainment of age 65. For persons who do not enroll during that period, they may enroll in a general enrollment period which is January, February, or March of any given year. Coverage will become effective for the following July in this case.

Q. I attained age 65 in 1970 and had limited employment covered by social security. I sent

a card to the Baltimore Record Center for information on my earnings record and I received a card stating that I had only 7 quarters posted on my record. Would this many quarters entitled me to have Medicare Part A without having to pay a monthly premium?

A. For persons attaining age 65 in 1970 they must have on record a minimum of 9 quarters in order to be entitled to Medicare Part A Hospital Insurance without paying the monthly premium of \$36.00.

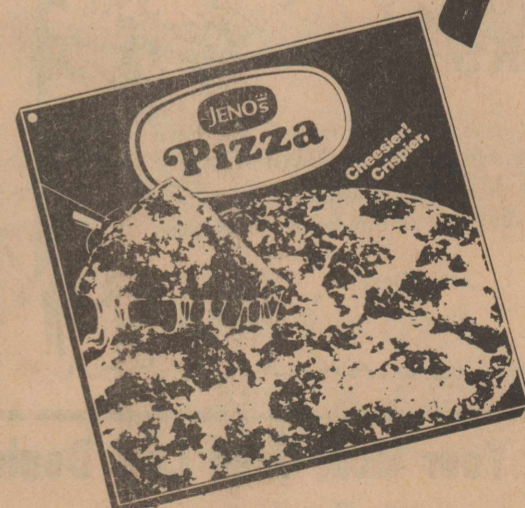
