FIREMEN SEEK FUNDS FOR MORE WARNING EQUIPMENT

At their regular meeting on Monday night, members of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department approved plans for raising \$1,500 by public subscription with which to purchase additional warning devices used during conditions of severe weather, tornados, and other emergencies which might arise.

At the present time, the department has only two mobile warning devices. These are the alarms which were used in alerting the town shortly before the recent tornado.

Additional units of this kind would provide a greater de-

gree of efficiency in alerting all areas of the town, firemen pointed out. Also needed are additional pre-set shortwave radio receivers which link firemen with a central dispatching unit at the fire station.

A display of the two units used in the warning set-up has been placed in the lobby of the Haskell National Bank, and contributions may be left in a convenient receptacle at the display. Gifts also may be mailed to the fire department if more convenient.

Everyone in Haskell is invited to inspect the two units when they are in the bank lobby.

Olney Firm Gets Repair Contract On Highway 277

A contract for 14.7 miles of construction on U. S. 277 in Haskell and Jones counties has been awarded to an Olney firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

A and A Contractors, Inc., submitted the low bid of \$196,280 on the project. Grading, structures, foundation course, and two course surface treatment in Weibert from the south city limits to the north city limits; from Jones County line; and in Stamford from Haskell County line (north city limits) to Bunkley Street is expected to take 90 working days, according to J. C. Roberts, District Highway Engineer at Abilene.

W. F. Dixon, Resident Engineer at Anson will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Drive Underway In Area to Locate Persons Desiring Farm, Ranch Jobs

James W. Perkins, manager of the Texas Employment Commission Office in Haskell, announced today that a special recruitment drive is being conducted in the Haskell area this week in an attempt to locate unemployed persons interested in regular year-around farm or ranch jobs.

Recruitment is also being conducted for seasonal crews and family groups for cotton chopping activity.

The results of this recruitment drive will be highlighted by a Farm Labor Day which will be held next week in the County Courtroom of the Haskell County Courthouse.

On this day, persons interested in farm jobs will have work applications taken and then assembled in the Courtroom. Farmers and ranchers who need hands are invited to visit the County Courtroom on this day because it is the best way to find the kind of workers needed.

Attendance by both farmers and farm workers will permit a personal interview between the farmer and a worker whose experience and skills most nearly match his needs without the usual loss of time in trying to contact each other.

It was pointed out by Mr. Perkins that there is no charge for this service and there is no obligation on the part of the farmer to hire anyone. "There is complete freedom of choice on the part of both the farmer and the worker," stated Mr. Perkins.

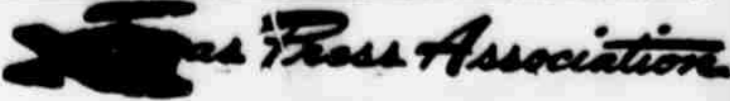

Storm Warning System

Haskell's storm warning system, a joint undertaking of the fire department, city police and sheriff's department and Highway Patrol, is credited with preventing injuries and possible deaths during the recent tornado.

The system, which links all stations with the Abilene Weather Bureau via police radio, was the subject of editorial comment in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram last week. The newspaper commented on the effectiveness of the warning system, and its economy in utilizing existing agencies.

The plan was placed into operation two years ago, and only expense involved was the City's purchase of two portable warning devices at a cost of around \$275 each.

In operation, members of the volunteer fire department with the warning units attached to their cars, cruise all sections of the city when a storm is believed imminent. This information is relayed from county and city police and members of the Highway Patrol who serve as observers at outlying points during periods of turbulent weather.

In view of the system's efficiency during the recent emergency, those charged with its operation can be commended for doing an exceptional job.

Electric and Telephone Companies Due Praise

Many of us are quick to criticize when the least little thing goes wrong to cause inconvenience or disrupt our normal routine. Two frequent targets of criticism over minor inconveniences are the telephone and electric companies.

But when real disaster hit in the form of the recent tornado and windstorm, completely disrupting telephone and electric service, we heard very little criticism. Everyone realized he was in the same situation as his neighbor.

Nothing but praise is due West Texas Utilities and General Telephone companies, who had local crews out minutes after the storm had passed. These were joined by a stream of crew members sent in from neighboring as well as distant towns.

As in every emergency, repairmen had as their first goal the restoration of electric and telephone service where it was most urgently needed. Priority goals were the hospital, public service institutions and business concerns.

A commendable spirit of cooperation and understanding was evidenced on the part of the majority of Haskell citizens, WTU and General Telephone Company representatives said.

However, there were isolated instances reported in which a few selfish and inconsiderate persons demanded special consideration and service. Quite properly their demands were ignored in order to meet the larger needs of scores of other persons, including the restoration of service to homes where emergency conditions existed because of age or illness.

These few isolated cases were at wide variance with the attitude of the citizenship as a whole—one of understanding and appreciation for the prompt manner in which the emergency was met by both West Texas Utilities and General Telephone Co.

the time, recalls that he had ridden over in the south side of town horseback, and started home after the advance wind and rain of the storm hit. There was a torrential rain and he was soaking wet when he arrived home in the north part of town.

Large hail which accompanied the rain beat holes in the roof of their home, and Oscar remembers that he and a brother, John, climbed up on tables and used sticks to punch through the ceiling paper which was sagging with water.

R. A. (Shady) Lane used somewhat similar tactics back about 1913 to prevent a sagging roof from falling in under weight of excessive rain.

Shady was working for the Ford Agency at the time, located on the east side of the square in the building occupied now by Boggs & Johnson.

It was about this time of year and a near-cloudburst hit, dumping several inches of rain within a period of 30 minutes. Building housing the Ford Agency had probably the largest roof area of any building in town. The excessive rain caused the center of the roof to sag from the terrific weight of so much water and occasionally you could hear the creak and crack of strained roof timbers.

As the heavy rain continued, Shady feared the roof might be crushed in, but what to do was the problem.

Then he had an idea. Grabbing his shotgun which was in the office (whether kept there for protection or to force sales we've never learned) Shady went to the section of the building which had no ceiling.

He blasted away and the 12-gauge charge tore through the roof and water started gushing through as if from a fire hydrant. A few more blasts and the sagging roof quit creaking as the surplus water drained through and danger of a cave-in was eliminated.

We had mention here recently about two of our little friends Jim Smith and Bill Cox, who teamed up for the greased pig contest during the Jaycees Rodeo.

A few days ago we learned that their participation in the slick pig melee was almost cancelled by Jim's mother, Ruby Smith after a chance remark by Brooks Middleton one of the rodeo judges.

Brooks had ridden near the box seats on the west side of the arena and was sitting there on his horse waiting for the

next event. Ruby, sitting in a box near the rail, called "Brooks, when is the greased pig scramble coming off?" From A Pastor's Study

I recently visited with a family, the members of which do not come to church. The father of the family, now passed on, was a fine Christian who served his God through His Church all of his life. Neither his wife nor any of his children or grandchildren come to church nor do they make any profession of Christ.

The daughter of the man, who is also the mother of three nearly grown children, explained to me that the children "just started going fishing on Sunday afternoon," and finally liking it so much, they began fishing all day on Sunday. She thought it best that they should be out in the fresh air after working all week, and she let them make up their own minds about church. "After all," she said, "they are free individuals, and will have to make their own decisions."

We will say nothing about the slothful dismissal of parental responsibility displayed here, but will rather let the deprived condition of this family point up an age-old problem in the church: the keeping of the Lord's Day. It is so easy to argue that it isn't any worse to fish on Sunday (or to play golf) than it is to ride around all day in an automobile. I would almost agree with this, judging from the way some of the people drive their cars on Sunday (and every other day, for that matter!)

Nevertheless there is a strong temptation for a man who begins to play golf on Sunday, or to go fishing, to make Sunday altogether a day of pleasure. He, like the family above cited, ceases eventually to use the day for any spiritual ends. The physical exercise may do him good, but if he ceases to exercise the spiritual faculties of his soul, he gradually loses all vital contact with God. Spiritual death inside an active carcass equals nothing, for life and power are gone.

John Wesley's mother wrote to her son: "If you would judge the lawfulness or unlawfulness of pleasure, take this rule: Whatever weakens your reason, impairs the tenderness of your conscience, obscures your sense of God or takes off the relish of spiritual things; in short, whatever increases the strength and authority of your body over your mind, that thing is a sin to you, however innocent it may be in itself."

"Body" in this passage is the equivalent of the term "self" or "personality."

One man said to me, "No preacher is going to tell me what to do with my free time—Sunday or no Sunday!" And, rounding the thought of the mother of the family mentioned above, he said, "My life belongs to me and I can do with it as I please."

The words of the Apostle Paul apply to all of us: "You are not your own; you were bought with a price." Jesus Christ loved us and gave Himself for us. We cannot reject the divine love, or the claim of the divine love upon our lives.

It boils down to this: Sunday is God's day. God help us if it ceases to be. It is reserved for rest from physical toil and mental distractions so that the spiritual life may be nourished and nurtured. Man is thus able to better live the other six days of the week. It is also our opportunity to respond to depth and sincerity to God who sustains us by His love and mercy.

The man who recognizes God and seeks to establish a relationship to Him in his heart, and manifests this in his manner of living, does not desecrate the Lord's Day even if he does play golf or go fishing on Sunday afternoon after having worshipped at the appointed hour in sincerity and truth... for such a man glorifies God in his body (to use Paul's words) no matter where he is. The Lord's Day is desecrated by that person who chooses to be spiritually dead and substitutes his exercise and pleasure for communion with God.

A. L. Conners and Party Return From Visit Through North, East

Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Conner of this city, Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Graham, La Nell and Randall of Pampa, Texas, have just returned from Alexandria, Va., where they went to visit First Lieut. and Mrs. Grady R. Cozby Jr., and son, Ray. Lieut. Cozby is stationed at the U. S. Marine Base at Quantico, Va.

After arriving at their destination, the party visited a number of points of interest. One of the first was New York City, where they went to the top of the Empire State Building, 102 stories high and the world's tallest building.

It is 1,472 feet high. Observatory levels are at the 86th floor, 1,050 feet, and at the 102nd floor, 1,250 feet from ground level. Above this peak extends, from a base only a few feet, a 222-ft., 22-story, 60-ton mast-like structure. It is one of the world's most powerful and far-reaching television antennas.

The Conners and their party also saw Macy's, the world's largest department store, The Times Building, and others. After leaving the massive steel jungle of downtown New York City they went to the southern tip of Manhattan Island, The Battery, where they took the ferry out to the Statue of Liberty on Liberty Island. This structure is divided into three parts, base, pedestal, and the statue proper. The base, an 11-pointed star, part of old Fort Wood (a small Army base discontinued in 1937) is entered through a tunnel which leads to the lower elevator landing. Visitors have a choice of an elevator or stairway to ascend 102 stories to the top of the pedestal. A narrow, 12-story spiral stairway leads from the top of the pedestal to the head of the statue, where an observatory is located.

Returning to Manhattan, the Texans crossed the Brooklyn Bridge into Brooklyn and headed south for Coney Island. They took the ferry (they counted 30 cars, two small trucks and two huge refrigerated trucks as they came off the ferry) to Staten Island then back to Virginia.

On another day they went to Washington, D. C., where they toured the Capitol Building and sat down in the Senate and the House of Representatives chambers.

They saw the White House, Jefferson and Lincoln Memorials, all the government buildings, including the Treasury, and drove past the United Nations Building and the Pentagon, the world's largest office building.

They went through part of the Smithsonian Institute and there they saw the largest elephant ever killed. It stood over 12 feet tall at the shoulders and weighed between seven and eight tons. Its tusks were about six feet long. It was killed in Africa.

They also saw stuffed animals from all over the world, including the largest buffalo and the huge timber wolves

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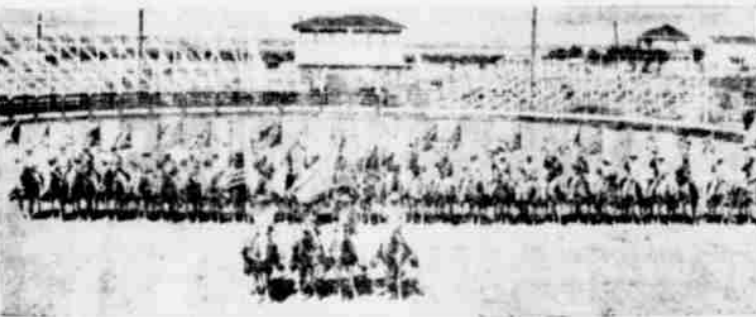
