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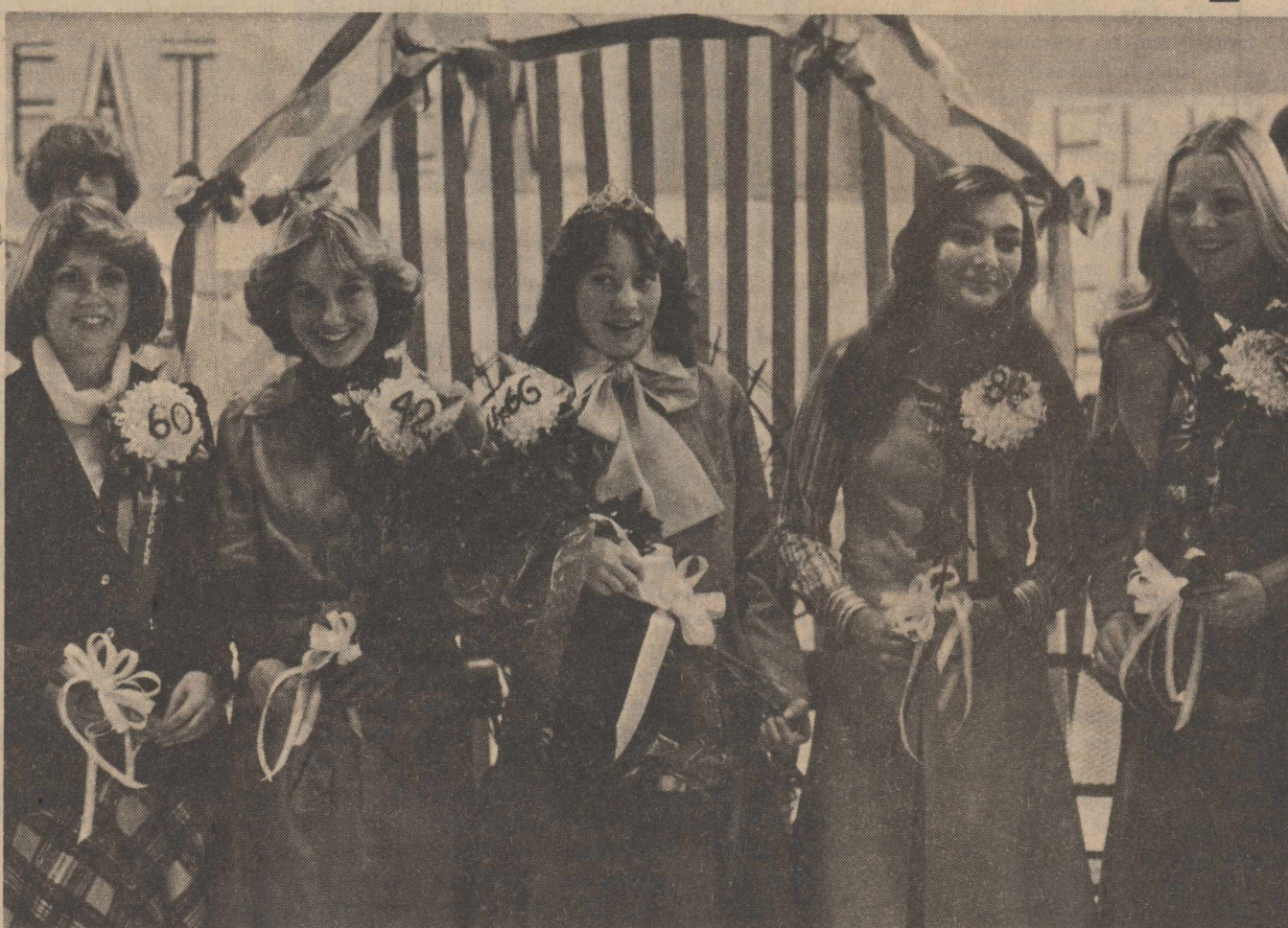

Rev. Sides took the office effective October 15 and was honored with a reception on Sunday night at the County Barn.

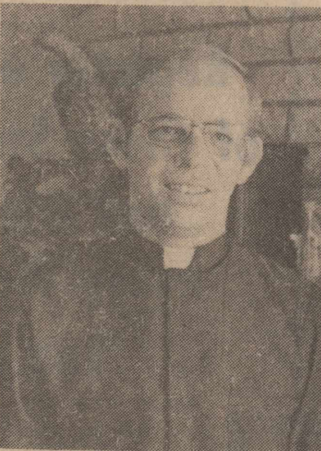

Don Riffe accompanied by his daughter, Laura, his niece, Stephanie Riffe and Pam McReynolds and Melba Brooks attended a football game at New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell, New Mexico on Saturday. They returned to Stratford Sunday afternoon.

Tuesday will be General Election Day across the nation and voters will be deciding on who will be the next President of the United States and voting on candidates from the Court House to the White House.

Polls will open at 7 a.m. in Sherman County with the largest number of registered voters ever in the history of the county signed up with a total of 2,054. The largest number of registered voters previously was eight years ago when 1,604 had registered. Polls will close at 7 p.m.

Broken down by precincts, Precinct 1 has 121, Precinct 2 has 159, Precinct 3 has 399 and Precinct 4 has 1,375 registered voters.

Precinct 1 residents may cast ballots at the Lautz County Barn where Rebecca Lavake will serve as election judge; Those residing in Precinct 2 will be voting at the Spurlock Chapel where Neal Spurlock is Election Judge; while those residing in Precinct 3 may vote at the Texas Side Elementary School with Ralph Renner, Election Judge. Residents of Precinct 4 will be voting at the District Court Room in the Court House in Stratford where George Jeffcoat is Election Judge.

Absentee voting will continue through Friday at the Clerk's Office at the Court House. Don Riffe will serve as Election Judge for the Absentee Box on November 2.

A Sample Ballot for the General Election in Sherman County may be found in this issue of The Star. This Sample Ballot is published for voter's information by members of the Sherman County Commissioners Court.

Besides the Presidential Contest pitting Democrat Jimmy Carter of Georgia against Incumbent Republican Gerald Ford, there are three other races in which local residents have a lot of interest.

These include the race between incumbent Senator Lloyd Bentsen who is being challenged by Republican Alan Steelman for the Texas Senate seat.

The other two include the race for Congressman for the 13th District. In this race incumbent Democrat Jack Hightower of Vernon is being challenged by the man he beat two years ago, Republican Bob Price of Pampa. The other race in which there is a lot of local interest is the contest for the seat of the State Representative for the 64th District in which Republican incumbent Bob Close of Perryton is being challenged by Democrat Daisy Moore of Dalhart.

The only other contested race on the entire ballot includes a race for one place on the Railroad Commission in which Democrat Jon Newton of Beville is being challenged by Walter Wendlandt, a Republican, along with Fred Rodrigue, Garza, a member of the Raza Unida Party, are all seeking the office.

There are also two Constitutional Amendments on the ballot. Number 1 concerns proposed increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two thirds of the legislature and Number 2 concerns the increase from \$100 million to \$200 million for Texas Water Development Bonds for use in enhancement

of water quality across the State of Texas.

For the first time in recent years, the ballot has a total of five candidates running for the office of President of the United States.

These five include Democrats Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale, Republican Gerald R. Ford and Robert Dole, plus the additions of American Party Candidates Thomas J. Anderson and Rufus Shackelford, Socialist Workers Party Candidates Pedro Camejo and Willie Mae Reid and Independent Candidate Eugene McCarthy.

In addition, the Raza Unida Party has Fred Rodrigues Garza as their candidate for the office of Railroad Commissioner; the American Party has Majorie P. Gallion as a candidate for the office of United States Senator and also William K. Hathcock as a candidate for the office of Congressman for the 13th District. [ED NOTE: this was a new one on the editor, we weren't even aware of such a candidate in this race].

Socialist Workers' Party has their candidates for President and Vice President of the US Pedro Camejo and Willie Mae Reid while they have Pedro Vasquez running for US Senator and Pat O'Reilly running for the Railroad Commissioner's office.

As has been the case in the past two elections, the ballot will be printed in both English and Spanish.

The Elks were held on downs and forced to punt after the ensuing kickoff, and Fritch moved in for their second scoring effort.

This is the first qualification to make a run for another Sweepstakes Award which a band must earn Division I awards in Marching Plus Concert and Sight Reading competition.

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The Stratford Fire Department and the City Hall were a bit embarrassed last week when a fire broke out in a wall between the fire hall and the city hall.

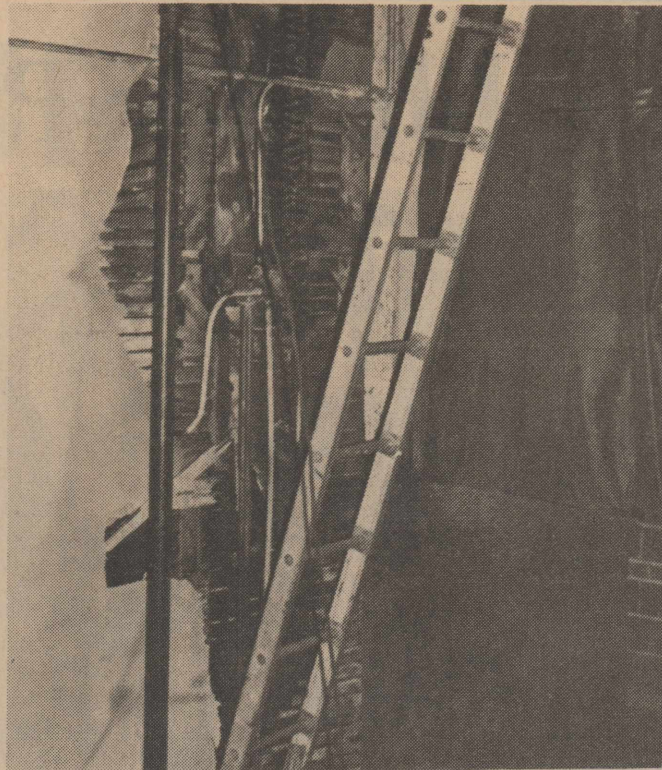
Not too much damage, mostly smoke and some red faces, however, had it not been discovered when it was we may be rebuilding the city hall and adjoining buildings.

Social Security News

Q. I'm a student and hope to get a temporary holiday job. Do I need a social security card for such a short period of work?
A. You need a social security number if you plan to work in a job covered by social security (nine out of 10 jobs are covered). If you don't have a social security number, you should apply for one soon at any social security office.

Q. I'm 65 and when I retired in February, I told social security my earnings from my part-time job wouldn't go over the \$2,760 limit for the year. However, I got a raise and now expect to earn \$3,300. Should I notify social security?
A. You should notify social security about your earnings change without delay to avoid getting benefits you would have to pay back. If you earn over \$2,760 in 1976, \$1 in benefit will be withheld for each \$2 earnings over \$2,760. No matter how much you earn the year, you can get your social security benefit the month in which you earn over \$230. No work in your own business.

Q. Why is social security handling supplemental income?

OSHA Drags Agriculture For One Year

COLLEGE STATION--Something has happened in our nation's capitol which will be of interest to all agricultural producers as well as other businesses, notes Dr. Gray S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. As of Oct. 1, farms, ranches and other enterprises defined as "agricultural operations" who have 10 or fewer employees at any one time are exempt from all requirements under the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA) for one year.

"Annual attempts to amend OSHA during Congressional floor debate on an appropriations bill succeeded this year," points out Nelson. "Certain amendments have been attached to the appropriations bill for the Departments of Labor and Health, Education and Welfare. All OSHA operating funds for fiscal 1977 are in that bill."

The bill stipulates that no civil penalties would be proposed on first instance OSHA violations (other than serious, willful or repeated violations) unless 10 or more violations are found.

explains Nelson. The bill also exempts from OSHA coverage farms with 10 or fewer employees.

President Ford first vetoed the \$56.6 billion appropriation bill for the Departments of Labor and Health, Education and Welfare, including \$130.3 million for OSHA, on Sept. 29, on the grounds that it exceeded by \$4 billion the sum he requested for fiscal 1977.

However, Congress overrode the veto the following day. The bill will provide \$130.3 million overall funding for OSHA, including appropriations for the preparation of inflationary impact statements, education, research and consultation activities, and an increase of the compliance staff.
