Pierce-Oil Company, will have to go to Texas to answer the indic-Jury charging him with false swearing in connection with the readmittance of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company into Texas in 1900. The ouster and penalty cases against his company are to Move Here. now pending in the Supreme Court of the United States. "There is no way by which Mr. Pierce can escape being taken back to Texas," said Attorney General Davidson of Texas tonight. "That is, I do not see how a way can be found to delay longer the trial on the indictment found by the Grand Jury of Travis County." The Supreme Court decided after hearing argument of eminent counsel last spring that Pierce must be surrendered to the Texas authorities by the authorities of St. Lou.s, his home. Motion to rehear the case was made at that term of court, and pending a decision. Pierce was allowed to renew his bail bond of \$40,000 for his appearance when wanted.
