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Relatives in this city received a message Tuesday, announcing the death of Lewis Stoeger, he having died at a U. S. hospital at Camp Johnwise, near San Antonio, October 8th, due to an attack of pneumonia.

The remains were brought to this city for interment, funeral services were conducted at the Catholic church Thursday morning at 10 o'clock and the body was laid to rest in the Catholic cemetery.

Lewis has lived in Martin county all his life. He was aged twenty-five years, four months and twelve days.

He had not finished his training when he was called upon to make the supreme sacrifice. Though he had not reached the battle lines as much honor is due him as to anyone who has died on the battle fields. Those who knew this young man, speak well of him and all honor him for his service in his country's cause.

He is survived by a wife; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Stoeger; three brothers and two sisters.

Treatment for Spanish Influenza.

Washington, September 26. — Secretary McAdoo this afternoon directed Surgeon General Rupert Blue to open the marine hospitals at Willingham, N. C., for influenza cases at shipyards there. Dr. Blue discussed the malady at length, saying:

"The symptoms of Spanish Influenza may be distinguished from those of an ordinary cold by prostration and aches and pains in the head and back. There is no protracted period of waiting to know whether your cold is influenza. If you have it you will probably know the first day.

"There are two main varieties of Spanish influenza. One begins with chills or chilliness which may be slight. There will be what appears to be an ordinary cold, catarrhal, with coughing and sneezing, headache, fever and prostration. The other marked simply by chills fever and prostration. Both of these forms may be marked with nausea and vomiting.

"There is no drug preventative and there is no specific remedy, although the specific bacillus has been isolated. Treatment should follow in general the course of putting the patient in bed immediately and keeping him there till he is cured, both for his own sake and for the sake of the community so that he can not merely get 'better' and go out and infect others.

"The initial treatment should be a saline purgative of colomel. Aspirin, five to ten grains, may be given to relieve the aches and pains. A warm bath also, will prove comforting and check the pain, but great care should be taken to keep the patient from becoming cool. The patient must stay indoors.

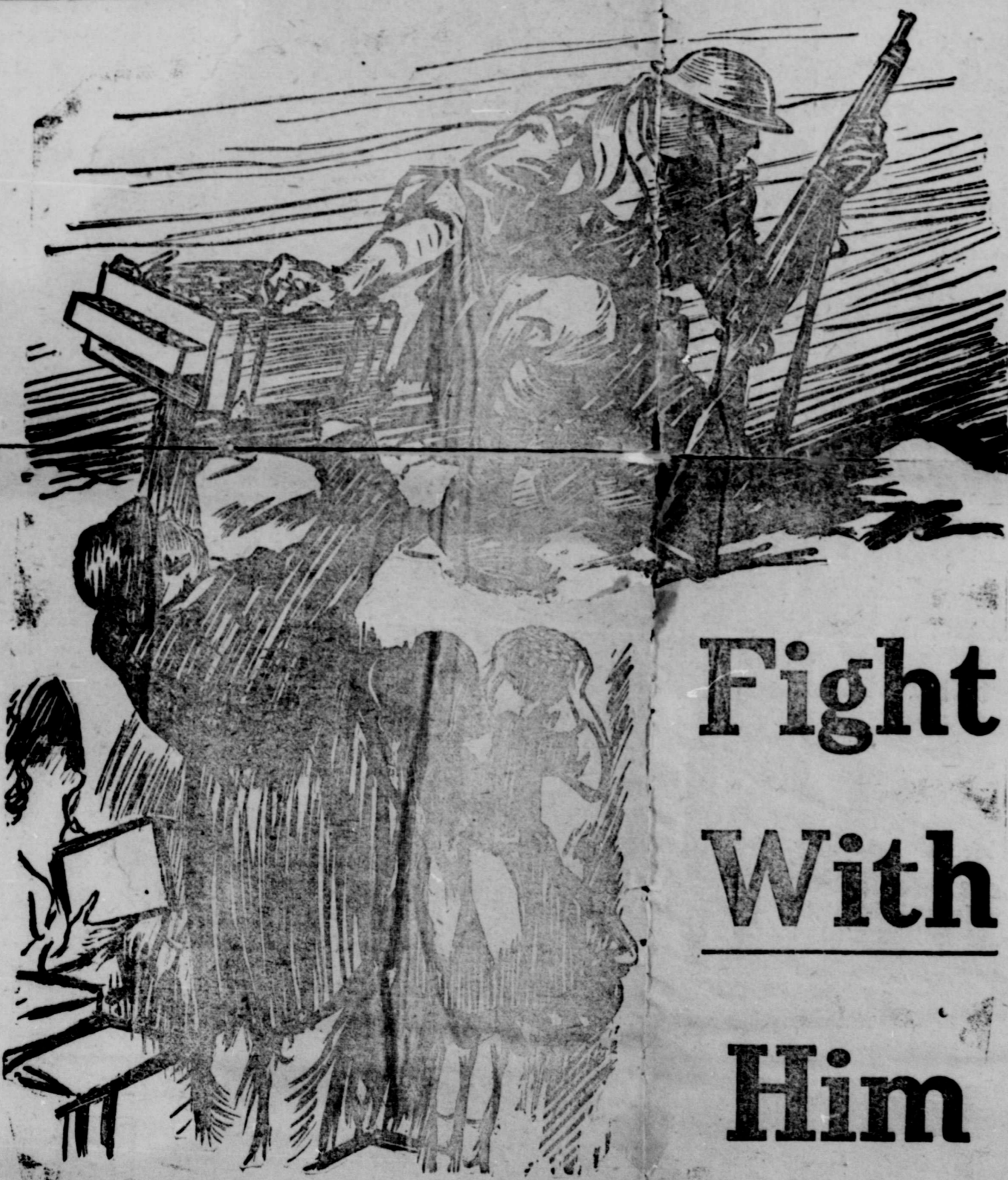
"A light diet should be given, such as pasteurized milk, beef broth, soft boiled eggs and toast. For those with weak hearts there should be added a stimulant.

"To prevent children from becoming infected they should be kept from places of congregation, where some of them are certain to fall victim to the disease.

"The disease is spread by crowds and if children are sent to school they may contract the disease. This applies, of course, to any other places of congregation; keeping the children from school and letting them go to theatres hardly would protect them.

"To the fullest possible extent children should be allowed plenty of fresh air and outdoors play in good weather. Keeping them indoors in super-heated rooms lay the foundation for influenza and all other catarrhal troubles.
