QUARTER MILLION MOTORISTS PUT AWAY THEIR CARS

SUFFER A LOSS OF \$12,500,00. NOT GOOD NEWS FOR HIGH-WAY BUILDING.

At the present time, at least, Stanton, along with Midland, is suffering the consequences of a poorly conditioned highway, refering to Bdoarway of America as it passes through Martin county to Midland. No blame for the present state of the highway is to be directed to the road contractors who have put down the caliche. Lots of the blame may be traced to the extra amount of high winds that have prevailed in this area this spring, and the extreme dry weather, which, together, have blown away a considerable portion of the caliche. The traffic over the highway has added to the injury of the road by grinding out chug holes, that leaves the road in a rough and bumpy condition.

The delay in putting the toping to this part of the road is not quite clear to the writer unless it be that highway commission is low on funds with which to complete the job. We know this that the stretch of road through Martin county to the city of Midland is rapidly deterioating, and unless hasty measures are taken whereby the road can be put in its finished state, severe damage will come to the road.






