



Only brief reports were received on particulars of the accident. McClintic was riding in the pen when the bull attacked his horse. When his mount was thrown to the ground, McClintic fell free of the stirrups, but could not get to the corral fence before the bull attacked him. Head bruises and cuts on the body were sustained when the animal tossed the cattleman into the fence.

It was not believed that Mc-Clintic suffered internal injuries.

COMPLETION OF WORK ON HIGHWTY 1, EXPECTED TO COMMENCE SOON

At a meeting of the State Highway Commission held Monday at Austin, the contract to complete the improvement program of Highway 1, through Martin and Midland counties, was awarded to the Morgan Construction Co., Dallas, the same company that finished work laying the rock base through this county and a part of Midland county.

The contract for Martin county calls for 18 miles of double bituminous surfacing at a price of \$21.381.

Contract for Midland county calls for 12.5 miles of bituminous surfacing from the Martin county line through Midland city at a cost of \$20,463.

The Reporter is not in position to state definitely when construcion work will commence on this project but it is presumed it will be right away, as the Morgan Construction Co., have all equipment on the ground, with the possible exception of one or two machines.
