THE PRICE OF **BUSINESS SPEED**

Banking Institute Speaker Says That Bank Failures Followed **Business Failures**

CHICAGO, Ill.-Many appear to think that failures occur only to banks. but the complete story of business shows that failures of American banks bave followed the failure of business enterprises, and have not been a cause of those failures, Dr. Harold Stonier, National Educational Director of the American Bankers Association, declared in a recent address here before the American Institute of Banking.

"It is true that we have had more failures in our banks than in the banks of a number of other countries," be sold. "It is also true that we have had more failures in drug stores, grocery stores; railroads, and in every other type of business enterprise. At the same time, it must be said that we still have left after all our failures, more frug stores, more grocery stores, more railroads, and more banks than any

other country." People do not realize, he said, that have been in existence over a century and we have more than 2,000 banks which have been it existence over 50

"In other words, we have more banks years of age than any country in the world," he declared. "The American banking system has not fallen downis the American spirit."
