The North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. made up of Haskell, Rule, Munday, and Goree was created by an act of the Texas Legislature, and seeks to build a surface reservoir on Miller's Creek 24 miles north and east of Haskell for impounding water to serve these four towns.
