GOES INTO EFFECT MARCH 31

Motorists who took advantage of the extension of time for payment of automobile license will have to buy the tags on or before March 31 in order to avoid

The extension granted by an act of the Texas legislature in special session ends the last day of this month and the penalty goes into force after that date. March 31 was set by the act as the time limit for auto license payment not only for 1934 but for future years.

After March 31 a penalty of 20 per cent or an estimate average of about \$2 to each auto, will be imposed. Because of Onfusion caused by the action of the legislature, no penalty was charged persons registering their cars and trucks between January 31 and the time the legislature finally passed the bill granting ex-


