## Stanton High May Become Accredited

The recent report of the official supervisor of schools in this district, Mr. J. T. H. Bickley, states that Stanton has officially been placed on the list of first class high schools. This does not mean that we have any credits restored, but it simply places us in line for accrediting. A few days ago, however, a second letter was received from Mr. Bickley stating that we will hear from the accrediting committee later, intimating that the Stanton high school might yet receive full rating with other accredited high schools of the state.  
Once a school has been dropped from the classified and accredited list of schools, it is not an easy matter to become reinstated in less than two or more years. Hence if we should perchance receive both classification and accrediting in a single year we should feel much gratified, and it would reflect to the credit of the splendid manner in which the people of Stanton have rallied to the support of the school program set up by the administration.  
For an old established county seat town to have an unaccredited high school is a position that should not be too comfortably accepted by any progressive citizenship. And the superintendent expresses the belief that a vast majority of the patrons will continue to stand right behind the board in its efforts in placing Stanton back in her rightful place in the matter of education. It is only the minimum duties we owe to our high school students.

## DISTRICT EIGHT FOOTBALL NAME NEW OFFICERS

Murray H. Fly, superintendent of Odessa school, was named chairman of the District 8 Interscholastic football committee at the annual Spring meeting held in Crane last week. Taylor M. Rushing, school principal, formerly an instructor in the Stanton schools, was elected secretary of the body.

The following schools are included in the district: Big Lake, Crane, Fort Stockton, Iraan, Maria, Midland, Pecos, Odessa, Stanton, Rankin, and Wink.

Upon the other side, it will be contended, no doubt, that these strenuous times, akin to war, and that the government is entitled to act with wartime directness. In any event, a long legal battle is ahead, and by the time that the Supreme Court of the United States hands down its decision, most readers will have to consult the newspaper files or rely on someone having a good memory, to find out what started the trouble. The air lines, however, will recall the origin of the fracas, without research, which brings one back to the saying that a good deal depends on whose ox is being gored.

THE C. C. C. went into operation so quietly that many have almost forgotten its existence, yet it was the greatest movement of men from place to place that took place within a generation, the activities of the World War not excepted. Since strict army discipline was not applicable, there were problems to be worked out in the way of preserving order, but by a system of rewards, and by getting rid of chronic trouble-makers, things soon were running smoothly. In the line of forestry alone, a great deal has been done. The woods have been thinned out, so that selected and hardy trees may have a chance to grow. Fire breaks have been constructed, and sweeping conflagrations in the woods will be easier to control. Roads have been built, enabling a more perfect policing of the public domain against fire. Soil erosion has been checked. Some tree-planting has been done, but not so much as is generally supposed, for the very reason that it takes time to grow a tree to the planting stage, and the number of trees available therefore was limited. Those who think that the only good accomplished by the C. C. C. was to provide employment and keep the idle out of mischief are mistaken. The security of the natural resources of the country has been promoted, and those resources will increase accordingly in value.

SEVERAL air lines have brought suit against the United States on account of the fact that their mail contracts were cancelled some time ago, no opportunity being afforded for the carriers to defend themselves or argue. Although few outside the legal profession are experts on the Constitution, most persons have retained enough of their school day learning to be able to state that the ancient document referred to make it wrong for the federal government to deprive anyone of his property without due process of law. That rule, appears, will be relied upon by the courts that have instituted the suits.

## McCutcheon Out For Representative

The Reporter this week has been authorized to announce W. W. McCutcheon, Jr., as a candidate for Representative for the 88th District in the State Legislature, and the following is a reprint from the Madero Valley News, published at Balmorhea:  
The article is headed:

### "A NEW DEAL FOR THE 88TH DISTRICT BY A YOUNG DEMOCRAT"

Before any contracts from this county can be approved we are required to reduce all contracts so that our totals will come within the official gin figures and are recommending a cut on all contracts where POSITIVE PROOF CANNOT BE SUBMITTED. We have acted on each contract individually and tried to be fair to everyone.

We have suggested that your contract be corrected to the figures on the enclosed slip. If this is agreeable with you sign the slip and return in the enclosed envelope AT ONCE. If not agreeable notify the committee and your contract will be cancelled and returned to you.

All contracts not heard from by Monday, April 30, will be cancelled and returned to the producers.

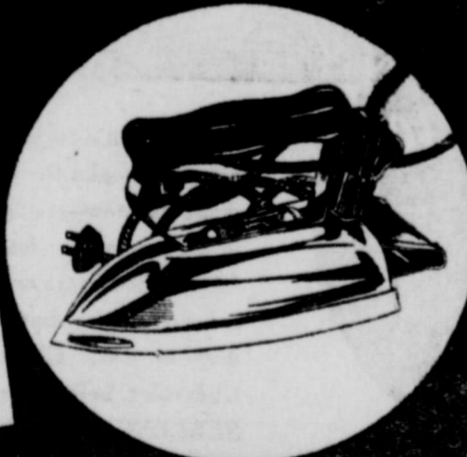

**Food Necessary  
For Health and Work**

A ranchman knows how much feed it takes to winter a hundred head of cattle, or a farmer, how much to feed a team of mules to make a crop. How much will it take to feed a family.  
The following is according to Miss Miller, Martin county home demonstration agent, needed for health and work for a person for a year.  
The club met Tuesday afternoon, April 17, at the community kitchen and the subject of the program was "The Farm Food Supply" by the agent.  
For a family multiply by the number the required pounds of food per person:  
Food—Leafy vegetable, number pounds per person 145; canned 25

peas and beans).  
Ten cans of meat to the person would be included in the canning budget. The above protein should be supplemented with canned fish once a week as a goitric preventive. Salmon and oysters are cheap sources of sea food.  
Grains, number pounds per person 150; (62 pounds flour, 62 pounds corn meal, 10 pounds rice, 20 pounds hominy, spaghetti and macaroni; of this amount five to ten cans may be can-  
Protein, number pounds per person, 145, (this includes 125 pounds of beef, 40 pounds of pork, 5 pounds of nuts, 32 dozen eggs and 20 pounds of dried

Fats, number pounds per person, 45; (butter 25 pounds, lard 10 pounds, salt pork 10 pounds, bacon 10 pounds, person.  
Sorghum molasses is a valuable sweet because of the iron contents. The value of minerals, especially calcium or lime, phosphorus, iron and vitamins were discussed also food sources given.  
Milk, a quart a day.  
Miscellaneous, as gumbo, fruit cake, mince meat, sandwich spread, pickles, relish and others, 10 containers per person.  
A short business meeting was held with Mrs. Lula Metcalf presiding. The next demonstration will be on foundation patterns by Mrs. Lee Eubanks, wardrobe demonstrator, May 1, at the home of Mrs. Chuck Houston. Mrs. Orr was a new member and the attendance was 14.—Reporter.
