DALLAS GREETERS GREET STANTON MONDAY P. M.

TRIPPERS ARRIVE IN RAIN WHICH SPOILED PARADE AND CAUSED CEREMONIES TO BE HELD UNDER STORE AWNING

Dallas trade trippers, some sixty or more strong, arrived in Stanton Monday at 12:30, in a shower of rain that caused the parade to be called off and holding all ceremonies under the awning in front of the Bryan Cash Grocery. Called away on an urgent trip to Austin, District Attorney Bob Hamilton was not present to deliver the address of welcome, Mrs. J. E. Kelly, welcomed the delegation with Perry Davis responding in behalf of Dallas.

The Dallas band gave a concert program, while other members of the delegation visited the stores and various places of business.

In a neatly printed booklet passed out here during the stay of the Dallas delegation, appeared the following, under the head: "Dallas Greets Stanton."

"Dallas brings greetings to Stanton, county seat of Martin county, and a city which has an enterprising citizenship that always stands for progress and development. Stanton has an excellent public school system, that is second to none in West Texas, and four churches. Under Stanton, from 25 to 50 feet, is a sheet of water which a new \$45,000 water distributing system taps and brings to the people for their pleasure.

"Stanton is located in a county which has 900 square miles of tillable land, which is unusually fertile and suitable for cotton, kafir, maize, hegarri, feterita, sorghum, sudan, melons, potatoes, fruits and vegetables.

"It is to such communities of vision, progress and hospitality that Dallas sends its business emissaries. They are making the Southwest the Nation's empire region. Linked in a common destiny, Dallas and these key cities, with eyes forward, march on!"

With reference to the visit to the visit of the Dallas business men to Stanton, the following paragraph appeared in the Dallas News:

"The first woman officially to greet the party was Mrs. James Kelly of Stanton. Perry Davis thanked her on behalf of Dallas for the hospitality she so graciously offered for Stanton.

Thieves Get \$100 Worth Loot

ROBBERS MAKE SECOND HAUL ON LOCAL STA.

MANAGER PARKS ESTIMATES LOSS \$100; SHERIFF YATER HAS FEW CLUES; MAGNOLIA POSTS NOTICE OF REWARD.

Burglars made a second haul early Monday morning on Magnolia's local service station, located near the high school building, and according to E. H. Parks, manager of the station, the robbers' net profit will be close to \$100 provided they bind themselves by the code of fair competition in marketing their loot which consisted mostly of automobile accessories.

Evidence of the burglary was first discovered by H. H. Kaderli, station employe, on opening the station for business about 6:30 Monday morning. Local authorities were summoned and a thorough investigation made by Sheriff Milt Yater, revealed that only a few clues may be utilized in running down the culprits.

The burglars entered the station after crashing a window and forcing it open. No additional damage was reported other than the removal of a hand lock from an outside pump from which was drawn approximately 40 gallons of gasoline. The order of the station office was greatly disturbed as its contents were strewn pell-mell. The change tray from the cash till was found outside of the station proper in an adjoining flower bed and beside the window through which the loot was delivered. The robbers overlooked two rolls of pennies in the bottom of the cash drawer.

Up to the present time there have been no arrests made in connection with either burglary. The only loss sustained in a former burglary was an alarm clock, although attempts were made at looting a small stock room in the station.

Magnolia owners and operators of the station, have posted rewards in both cases.

As the matter of providing suitable site for a playground for children, and adults, too, for that matter, the discussion led to the point of providing grounds for a city park, where the young and the old people engage in recreational activities. **About \$25,000,000  
Granted in Loans**

Bruce Frazier, secretary-treasurer of the production association has received word from S. M. Garwood, Production Credit Commissioner of the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, D. C., that about \$25,000,000 in production loans and approvals has already been granted through associations and that the volume of loans is expected to increase as the season advances.

"A part of this money has been paid

out in Martin county," Mr. Frazier said. "From its office in Midland the association is now making an increasing number of loans to farmers in Martin, Howard, Midland, Glasscock, Reagan, Ector, Andrews, Crane, Upton, and Winkler counties, for the purpose of growing crops and for purchasing work-stock and farming supplies for the season's operations. The loans are made on crop and chattel security.

"A number of the loans are being made on the installment basis," Mr. Frazier added. "An applicant's loan may be approved in the full amount, but paid out in installments as needed during the season, the object being to enable the borrower to save on interest costs and be sure of having the money when he needs it throughout the season to finish his crops or livestock operations. The interest rate on loans, recently reduced to 5½ per

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cent per annum, is charged only for the time the money is being used and payable when the loan is due. Some farmers are saving from ¼ to ½ on interest costs by getting loans on an installment basis.

"Another new feature of the production loans allows a farmer or stockman to apply for a loan and establish a line of credit which is used to make cash purchases of livestock or work-stock, the association taking in San Angelo Wednesday in the in a chattel mortgage on the stock pur-

chased as part of the security for the loan.

The association was organized under the Farm Credit Administration to be a permanent source of agricultural and livestock credit for this section," Mr. Frazier said, "and it now has facilities capable of fulfilling that purpose."
