After reading the minutes the secretary called the roll and the club members answered with the statement to do: "My Part in the County Clothing Contest." A short period of time was devoted to business affairs when members were urged to complete their farm food budgets, give a list of the articles they wish to exhibit at the County Fair to Miss Ethel Mae Forester, chairman of the exhibit committee, and to make out an individual report of their work for May to give the secretary. This all should be finished June 6th.

Miss Miller, home demonstration agent of Martin county, met with the club, and checked the foundation dress patterns for the members who had finished their patterns. Some 6 ladies have either completed their individual patterns or have them well under construction. Those who have not started this work are requested to begin at once as each one is expected to make a dress for the County Clothing Contest at Stanton, Texas, June 23. Miss Bertha Blagrove is our wardrobe demonstrator and she will be glad to assist those who need help with their foundation patterns.

Miss Miller requests the women to have their dresses made or partly finished by June 15, when she will check them, giving suggestions that may be necessary. Print, gingham, chambray, broadcloth, silting, pipe and cotton tweed are the materials to select from. The price must not exceed 90c per yard and most all these materials may be bought for much less per yard. Where collars and cuffs are to be used it is advisable to select a material for them heavy enough to wear as long as the dress to which they are attached. The dresses are to be on the order of street or neighborhood costumes as to design.

The ladies of the Brown community have made a list of 5 quilts which they plan to enter in the Howard county quilt show at Big Spring. These should be entered by May 30th.
