A. C. Ward, living north of Stanton, brought to this office Monday afternoon a maize head, fully developed, as fine a specimen as counld be found in a country where rain had fallen at an opportune time and the proper cultivatiion given it.

Mr. Ward had it figured out the one acre of maize that measured up to the head he exhibited the crop would make 2-tons per

Four rows of this maize was planted in a strip of ground upon which a light shower of rain had fallen. The moisture brought the maize up to a good stand, and since that time not a drop of rain had fallen on the crop. He is convinced now that all that is needed to raise a good crop of maise is sufficient moisture to sprout the seed and get the plant well above the ground.



Lights Trace Sky Ride. Mrs. Franklin D. Co-ordination of lighting and color were more in evidence. Under the lights the new Century of Progress purple red, theme color of the new Ex position, presented a glowing beauty that was different. The Sky Ride, almost lost to vision at night formerly, greeted visitors with all its catenary system traced against the sky in electric light. Bright reduced tubes outlined the observation platforms 628 feet above the Fair Farther south from the rotunda of the Ford building a pillar of blue light. 200 feet thick and more than a mile night pierced the clouds overhead. The lighting load of this 100-feet-long building is more than one third the total load of the entire Fait of last year.
