Jeter then hit wingback Gary Drusedow for the 2-pointer.

There you can find fossilized dinosaur tracks along the beautiful Paluxy River. Also, the Chamber of Commerce has a fine specimen on exhibit downtown, too.

Glen Rose is becoming a well-known vacation and health resort and is famous for its mineral water.

Back in the 20's, Glen Rose was well known for another liquid product, illicit at the time.

"Glen Rose whiskey" was

supposedly the acme of the bootlegger's product, and the king pin purveyors of "corn squeezings" always claimed their product was made in Glen Rose. That clinched the sale.

Lawmen also considered it a feather in their hat when they confiscated a load of "Glen Rose whiskey."

Although we've never heard of any dinosaur tracks along the Clear Fork of the Brazos in Haskell and Throckmorton Counties, many other fossils have been found there and along other streams in this section.

Years ago, Tom Donohoo, who now lives in Abilene, discovered several Indian graves in a bend of the Clear Fork where the river had cut back into the bank and exposed the burial plots.

Most interesting feature was the numerous stone artifacts and shells evidently placed in the graves. The stone vessels were probably used in cooking, and the shells for decorative purposes. However, many of the shells were foreign to this section, and evidently had been brought here from the Gulf Coast region. A curious fact was that the graves were some 10 feet below the surface.

Whether they had been dug to that unusual depth, or the surrounding level built up by the river after the burials were made was problematical.

Another interesting find made by Harry Stalcup, bottling works owner here in the late 20's, was a petrified ram's horn, found on Rattlesnake Hill at Scott's Crossing.

It was perfect in every detail, and looked as if it had been cut off at its base.

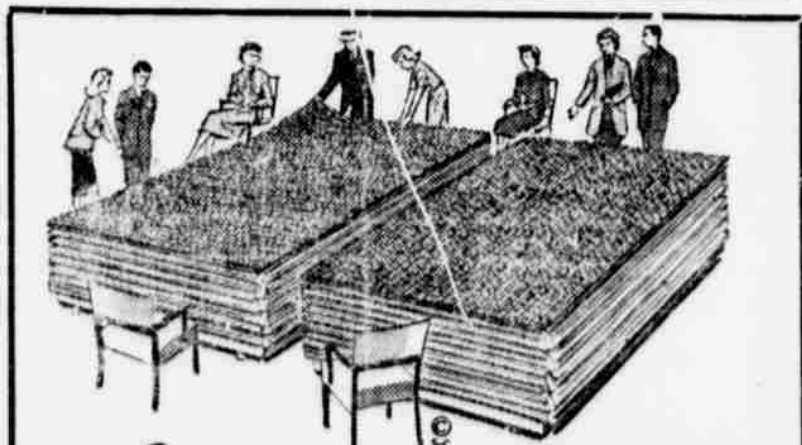

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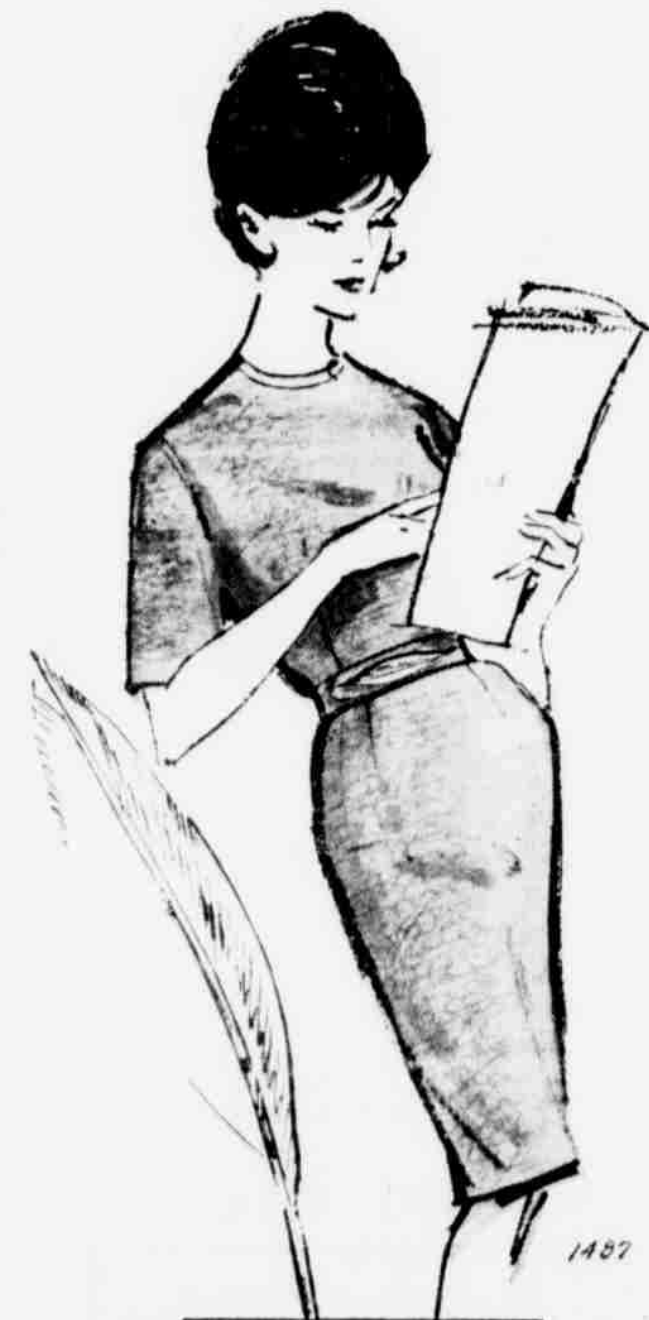



It was undertaken when the Gulf Oil Company, which had a refinery at Sweetwater at that time, told of its future water needs.

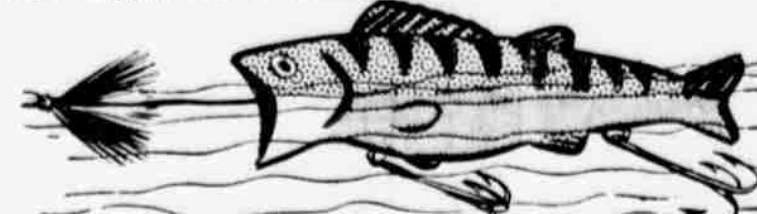
Already there were several small lakes around Sweetwater, mainly the city's municipal water supply. But Sweetwater

Accordingly, in the late 40s, right after the end of World War II, talk began about a new lake. Engineers were brought in. They said the best chance was on Oak Creek.

But Oak Creek was on the other side of the Callahan Divide and in the Colorado watershed. Sweetwater was in the Brazos watershed. Naturally some of the local residents
