

## A WARNING TO KITE FLYERS

With the kite flying season at hand, Texas Electric Service Co. issued today its annual appeal to parents to warn children flying kites to keep away from electric power lines.

"That the innocent pastime of kite flying can be exceedingly dangerous is brought out forcibly by the fact that many fatal accidents occurred in the year just passed because of children getting their metalized kites entangled in power lines," according to R. L. Miller, district manager of Texas Electric Service Company.

"Too often children use metal wire in the place of string on their kites and when this wire comes in contact with a power line the result is instantly disastrous. Even plain kite strings carry current, especially if the string is wet. The best idea, regardless of how the kite is built or what kind of string is being used, is to see that it is flown in open spaces where no power lines are located," Mr. Miller stated.

"If a kite should become entangled in power lines, be sure that children do not climb the poles or use long sticks to try to get the kite down. Call our company office and a trained line-man will be sent to rescue the kite if it is possible to do so."

Employees of the electric company will pay their annual visit to local schools shortly and will make a detailed explanation of the dangers of flying kites near power lines.

## Stanton Band and Choral Clinic

### Grand Champion Brings 36c Pound Calf Weighed 890 Pounds and Sold

**TO THE SAFEWAY STORES IN EL PASO**  
Kenneth Holloway, Martin County 4-H Club boy, who won the Grand Championship at the Agricultural Show with his calf which was bred by E. B. Dickenson, sold the calf to Sawayay Stores of El Paso for 36c per pound last Wednesday. The calf weighed 890 pounds, and bro't Kenneth \$310.68. Kenneth had also won \$41.00 prize money on the calf.

Records showed that he had spent \$35.00 for a nurse cow, and \$27.00 for feed on the calf, which made a total cost of \$62.00 for the calf. Kenneth fed two calves this year, and plans to show his other calf at Big Spring this week. This is the second year of 4-H Club work for young Holloway. He has fed four calves in the two years, the first one placed 12th in the show in Midland in 1936; the second won the Grand Championship ribbon in Odessa in the spring of 1937; his third one winning at El Paso; he plans to show his remaining calf until it wins or places high in a show and sell it.

**Sawayay Buys Two Champions**  
The Sawayay Stores of El Paso not only bought the Grand Champion calf for \$310 but it paid \$77.50 for the Grand Champion lamb of the El Paso show. Two other Martin county

boys who entered calves in the El Paso show, Russell Sadler and Billy Sadler, sold their calves at the El Paso auction for 10 cents per pound. Billy Sadler his 1160 pound Aberdeen Angus to the McElroy Packing Co. of El Paso, and Russell Sadler sold his Boone calf to the Hilton Hotel.

**T. & P. Prize**  
Young Holloway won another award at El Paso that was given by the T. & P. Railroad. The prize consisted of a two-day trip to the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show, which is held in March. The prize includes all expenses, incident to the trip, hotel rooms, hotel meals, tickets to the show and railroad fare. R. M. Simpson, Livestock Agent for the T. & P., awarded the prize to Kenneth, and is making arrangements for Kenneth's good time in Fort Worth.

### Kenneth Holloway is Again Grand Champion Winner at Big Spring Show

Kenneth Holloway, Martin County 4-H Club boy, succeeded in winning another Grand Champion at the Big Spring First Annual Spring Live Stock Show Wednesday. After selling his calf "Pat" at El Paso last week, he attended the Big Spring show and won the purple ribbon with "Mike." This calf placed second in the Stanton show on February 12th, and was from the herd of D. E. Cross, Martin County ranchman who lives just south of the Dickenson ranch, and whose cattle are strongly of Dickenson's breeding.

The Martin County boys won every prize in the milk fed class at the Big Spring show, except one, the third place, the light-weight class. The placings were virtually the same as those in Stanton on February 12th. In the heavy weight milk fed class Kenneth Holloway won first; Billy Sadler won second with his Geo. W. Glass calf, and Billy won third with his Dickenson calf; James Webb won fourth with his Wilkinson calf; Russell Sadler won fifth with the J. C. Sale calf; James Jones and Hoyt Springer stood sixth

and seventh with Epley calves. In the light-weight milk fed class which Springer won first. Jewel Ross won second and fourth. All three of these calves were from the D. E. Cross herd. In judging for the Grand Champion, Kenneth Holloway stood first with his calf, and Wadel Strain, Mitchell County F. F. A. boy won reserve championship.

Martin County boys also competed with a group of five calves fed in the county, and stood first place. Mitchell county was second, and Scurry county third. The Big Spring show was started this year and from the interest shown by the Big Spring people and people from the trade territory of Big Spring, Mr. J. S. Green, manager of the chamber of commerce, felt that a much larger show could be held next year.

The show offered \$204.00 in prize money this year, and was open to 4-H and F. F. A. boys from Mitchell, Scurry, Borden, Dawson, Martin, Howard, Glasscock and Sterling counties.

Martin county boys carried off \$69.50 of the prize money offered.

**EL PASO COLUMNIST PRESENTS HIS BOOK OF "PHILOSOPHY AND FOOLISHNESS" TO REPRESENTATIVE**

A representative of the Reporter was hob-nobbing, (minus the hob-nails), in Midland, Wednesday, and came face to face with Nat Campbell, "waggish columnist of verse and epigram in the El Paso Times," so is quoted from the Midland Reporter-Telegram representative who had the same experience. Mr. Campbell presented us with a copy of his book, and while we haven't as yet time to read it and pass our judgment on it, we reprint a few excerpts from the Midland Reporter-Telegram who seems to have saucially reviewed its pages:

"Among the humorous verses of special appeal to residents of West Texas, is one entitled, 'Opening Gates.' Few subjects on which homespun philosophy can be interpreted in verse have been overlooked in his handy volume

"My first writings were very solemn — humorously sober," recalled Campbell, who was born on a small Kansas farm in 1882.

Mr. Campbell spoke of a very dear spoo to this editor, especially, when he mentioned, according to the Midland Reporter-Telegram representative, that he received his A. B. degree from Southwestern college at Winfield, Kansas. It was in that self-same "shack town" it was then, that this editor first saw the light of day, July 23, 1874. The father of James E. Kelly, was one of the first settlers on Walnut Creek in Cowley County, before there was a Winfield, and the first postmaster and newspaper editor in that city.

But that's past history now, and we'll proceed with the finale statement Mr. Campbell made the Reporter-Telegram reporter: "I sit in the park many days, watching people, all insignificant in the vast scheme of life, and the unnecessary, foolish things they do—it's the greatest show in the world."

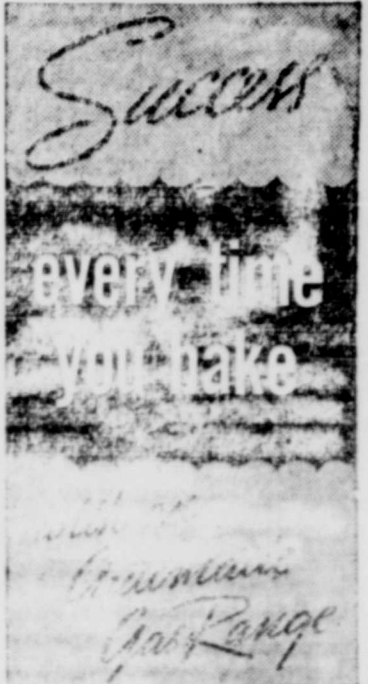
