WILDCAT OIL TEST ON DR. VANCE LAND

Much interest is attached to the location of another wildcat oil test two miles northwest of Stanton on Dr. J. R. Vance's land.

The test, to be known as the W. D. Anderson No. 1 J. R. Vance, is about four and a half miles south and slightly east of the Harris-Anderson No. 1 Robertson in the center of the southwest quarter of section 33-36-1n, T&P, Martin county. Location of the new test is to be in the center of the southwest quarter of section 9-36-1n, T&P.

The Robertson well had a show of oil at 4,070-80 feet and saturation from 4,150-66 feet. These two strata were tested before it was finally abandoned at 4,178 feet after logging a hole full of sulphur water at that depth.

Two other abandoned tests lie about four to six miles south and east of the new wildcat, but neither was drilled to the depth of the Robertson test. The latest was the Moore Bros. No. 1 F. A. King, in section 43-35-1s, T&P, northwest Glascock county, drilled to 3,938 feet and abandoned with sulphur water logged from 3,922-36 feet. The other was the Woodley well in which no shows were encountered, but in which the formations were logged higher than in the Robertson well.

New Wildcat Test For Eastern Martin County

The Fort Worth Star-Telegram, had the following report to make on a new wildcat test to be made in eastern Martin county:

T. G. Shaw, Trustee, of Fort Worth, Tuesday, was reported in Martin county making location for a wildcat test eight miles northwest of the Texas Company No. 1 Wilkinson wildcat test now drilling in western Howard county.

It is understood that Shaw plans to locate his test, contracted for 4,000 feet and scheduled to be spudded on or before May 26, in section 35, Bauer & Cockrell survey, in eastern Martin county. It is on the land of H. H. Wilkinson, president of the Continental National Bank of Fort Worth.

Texas Company No. 1 Wilkinson, section 32, block 34, T 1-N, T&P survey, in western Howard, was drilling below 2,670 feet, in anhydrite. It is understood that Shaw, who assembled the original block, retained one-half interest in the Texas Company test as well as in 3.4.0 acres.

LOSES TWENTY POUNDS IN ARKANSAS

RETURNS FROM FLORIDA SHOOT WITH TROPHIES

Following a recent participation in a pistol shooting match at Coral Gables and Tampa, Florida, Jess Woody returned with nine new prize medals that he won. Among the prized possessions were two certificates of victory, one highest civilian marksmanship. He also was among 25 marksmen that won a trip to Cuba, but as there was so much confusion in governmental affairs in that country the trip was called off. Woody was a member of a group of 25 winning the trip last year, and he went.

Accompanying Mr. Woody home from Florida for a day's visit in his home, were Mr. and Mrs. Mark Wheeler of Los Angeles, California. The two gentlemen spent half a day on the Cal Houston ranch, northwest of Stanton, hunting jackrabbits and they killed 160 rabbits with .22 rifles.

Mr. Wheeler is a member of the Los Angeles police force, and at the national mid-winter pistol tournament at Tampa, this year, he won the national all-around pistol marksmanship scoring 2507 points out of a possible 3000 with .22, .38, .45 calibre revolvers, after he established a new world's record in .45 calibre slow-fire in the third day of the five-day shoot. Wheeler's score of 180 points out of a possible 200 in the first match was four points of the previous record made last year at Camp Perry, Ohio, by his team-mate, J. J. Enghrecht, who was unable to attend the meet this year.

Wheeler also won the time fire with a .45 calibre gun; was high with a score of 822 in the days' four matches with .45 calibre pistols.

LIVE AT HOME PLANS MADE BY H. D. CLUBS

Home demonstration women of Martin county, under the direction of the county home demonstration agent, have planned the home food supply for one year to fulfill the needs of each club woman's family. The plan was worked out according to the number of individuals in the family.

Mrs. Gilkerson estimates that for a family of five, a farmer should keep two 500-gallon dairy cows, providing a quart of milk per day for each child, a pint for each adult, and butter at each meal. One-half acre should be in garden space to provide the necessary vegetables; one-half acre should be devoted to fruit-bearing vines and trees, and two acres for such crops as melons, corn, potatoes, field peas.

For poultry products necessary in this live-at-home plan, according to the standards, the family of five will need at least 50 laying hens and 150 baby-chicks per year. Two 250-pound hogs, a 500-pound beef and a few sheep, if desired, will provide sufficient meat the year around.

YEAST NEEDS FAVORABLE TEMPERATURE AS WELL AS MOISTURE

"Like all living things, yeast needs a favorable temperature as well as moisture in order to grow," Mrs. Elsie Gilkerson, home demonstration agent, told members of the Stanton Home Demonstration Club, in their meeting at Mrs. A. J. Graham's April 5, at 2 p. m.

"The best temperature for bread fermentation is probably 80 to 85 degrees. If temperature goes much over 95 degrees F., the growth of the yeast is retarded." For quick rising without too much heat, bread can be set in hot water and covered with a cloth.

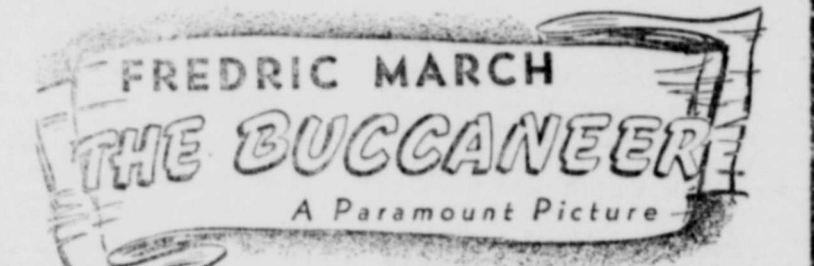

**MARTIN COUNTY'S
FIFTY YEARS**

In 1880 there were only 12 residents in what is now known as Martin county, and land was considered as fit only for cattle raising; in 1930 the last census showed the population was nearly 6,000 and Martin County one of the richest agricultural sections in the State.

Martin county was created in 1888, and the Stanton Reporter observed the fiftieth anniversary of the county with a special edition, citing facts about the development of Martin County. Some of the most interesting information is about farm ownership. The Reporter points out that of the 900 farms in the county, each averaging 700 acres, one-third are operated by full owners, nearly a hundred by part owners, and the remainder by tenants.
