#### ELECTION SATURDAY

**I**MPORTANT thing to do Saturday, is for every eligible voter in Martin county to go to the polls and vote, whether he is for the bond issue or is against it. There may be some confusion who is an eligible voter in the election Saturday. The eligible voter is one who has a poll tax receipt and renders property for tax, such as automobile even. Some have thought one had to own real estate in town or county before eligible to vote. So if you have rendered any property for taxes you can vote.

Some voters argue that the amount, \$45,000 is too much to vote for the project as set out in the election notice but as the commissioners' court figured it would be better to have more money if needed to complete the project than not, the \$45,000 figure was set. Should the bond issue carry, it does not mean the \$45,000 will be spent unless it is absolutely needed. Whatever amount is expended not one penny of it will go for any project other than the Stanton-Lamesa road and the road west through Lenora to the Andrews county line. Any reference made to any part of the \$45,000 will be spent on the road running east to the Howard county line can be stamped as false, and only a coup to get votes against the bond issue which will be voted on Saturday.

Many of the far-seeing and progressive communities of the State are building or are promoting "Farm to Market" roads, affording farmers all-weather tributary roads leading into the main hardsurfaced roads. But first, the county must have that main artery road to build to. The election Saturday is to provide such a road that farmers living in close proximity to it can build "feeder" lines to it, and have a convenient road to travel over to the markets, no matter how bad the weather might be. So The Reporter feels if the ranchman and the farmer are looking for a rapid, convenient way to reach the markets, they will not let the opportunity to slip by casting their vote Saturday in favor of the bond issue. And the Stanton citizen who wants his town to progress and wishes to see his property enhance in value will vote for this project Saturday.

## GOOD RAINS VISIT IN THE COUNTY

Rains ranging from three-quarters to two and a half inches fell over Martin county Wednesday afternoon and in the early hours of Thursday morning.

Two inch and a half rain fell on the Gordon Stone ranch, six miles southeast of Stanton, as well as good rains visited the ranches of Tode Houston and Grady Cross, further to the south and east of the Stone ranch. Bonnie White, county commissioner about 25 miles north of Stanton, and Lee Castle, county commissioner, living in the northeast part of the county, were in Stanton Thursday morning and reported good rains in their section. In Stanton the rainfall amounted to three-quarters of an inch.

## PRESSURE COOKER EXPLODES AND KILLS BABY

News reached Stanton this week of death of the 7-months old baby of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Anderson at Stockdale, Texas. A pressure cooker exploded burning the baby so severely that it died soon after the accident. Mrs. Anderson was seriously burned, but is reported she will recover.

### BE SURE YOU KNOW YOUR FLOUR

Test flour by squeezing a portion in hand, if it clings together very much it is soft wheat, if not and is grainy, it is hard wheat.



dise, 'hunter's paradise' and  
'sportsman's paradise.' Such  
terms have often been associat-  
ed, somewhat locally, with the  
Davis Mountains, or the Kerr-  
ville country, during the deer  
season. For years the Concho  
and Pecos rivers have been prac-  
tically the only haven for the  
fisherman, except for the more  
adventurous who occasionally  
wander as far as Lake Don Mar-  
tin, in Mexico. Until recently,  
no one has associated 'hunter's  
or fisherman's paradise' with  
West Texas, especially in the  
immediate vicinity of Stanton.  
Now, however, there is a lake  
just 27 miles south of Stanton  
so abounding with fish that it  
will astound the most skeptical.  
It is a veritable paradise.

"Three years ago, on the '69"  
ranch, belonging to E. L. (Son)  
Powell, there was an old lake  
bed covering over a section of  
land. It was situated in a draw  
which cut the ranch in half, and  
although there was no sign of  
water, it was nevertheless called  
'Dewey Lake.' The only re-  
semblance to a lake left was the  
fact that nothing but tall grass  
grew over the area, although  
the banks were grown up in mes-  
quite. But Dewey Lake was to  
surprise everyone, for in the

spring of 1936 several torrential  
rains fell in that vicinity, rang-  
ing from two to eight inches at  
a time. The draw became a roar-  
ing torrent and Dewey Lake  
was transformed almost over-  
night into a lake nearly four  
miles long and over half a mile  
wide."

In connection with the filling  
up of Dewey Lake with water  
that spring three years ago, the  
Reporter adds this incident.

Glen Brunson, whose ranch  
joins the Son Powell, had been  
plowing some land on a ridge  
near this dry lake then, with a  
tractor. Leaving the tractor in  
the field at the close of the day's  
work, the next morning Glen  
went out where his tractor had  
been left and found field, tractor  
and all buried some fifteen  
feet under water. After several  
weeks of search with grappling  
hooks, and such like, he manag-  
ed to rescue the tractor from its  
watery grave. The night follow-  
ing the evening Brunson left his  
tractor an 8-inch rain fell, the  
aftermath of which was putting  
water in Dewey Lake, now con-  
firmed by those who have been  
fishing on this lake as the  
'fisherman's paradise.'
