Tornado Hits Stanton

SMALL TWISTER CUTS GASH THRU TOWN DOING ABOUT \$30,000 WORTH DAMAGE

Property damage estimated at around \$30,000, resulted from a small twister that struck Stanton last Saturday evening at about 7:30. A boiling black cloud blew in from the northeast on the wings of a gale whose velocity ranged from 60 to 70 miles per hour about 6:30, lasting until about 7:30 when the wind shifted to the northwest and came with a blast that shook almost every house in town. It was at this juncture the twister struck, cutting a gash through the town from the northwest to southeast about 100 yards wide. The twister seemed to skim along lifting roofs and then dipping down low enough to demolish houses. Some points in the town trees were uprooted while at others limbs were broken off.

The Catholic convent suffered the most damage. Three wind mills were flattened to the ground, the roof on the north side of the convent building torn off, church wrenched badly, and roof on the south side of the priest's home lifted off.

At the home of C. J. Connel, across the street from the convent, large trees were blown down, others stripped of limbs, and the large workshop of Mr. Connel's completely demolished.

The garage at the home of Mrs. Les Thompson, was demolished, house damaged, and trees blown down.

Garage at the home of Rev. Van Zandt demolished, and his car on the outside, left undamaged.

The Assembly of God church, just east of the Methodist parsonage was demolished, and parts of it strewn across the street.

The home of Tom Mashburn, across the street south of the Methodist church was badly wrenched, and column poles to the porch lifted off from under the roof.

The home of Mrs. T. S. Haney, in front, east of the Mashburn's suffered considerable damage by having the roof lifted off and the interior flooded with water. Mrs. Haney was visiting relatives in Abilene at the time, but Mr. and Mrs. Dave Brande, who have apartments there, were in the house.

Front porch to the old Mize filling station on the highway was dropped down in front of the building.

The section house of the T&P across the railroad tracks, south of the highway, was moved off its foundation and otherwise damaged. Mr. and Mrs. Haney and the family were in the house at the time but suffered no bad injuries. Mr. Haney said he could see parts of tin roofs, shingles and the like, tumbling about on the outside, which he concluded was safer to remain in the house than attempt to take refuge in a collar on the place. He tucked the children under him and laid flat on the floor.

To the southwest of the section house, houses were badly damaged from windows blowing out, porches torn down. The home of Mr. and Mrs. Abe Bell's was tumbled over against an electric light pole, causing the pole on which was fastened the light transformer, to fall and smash through the center of the house. Fortunately, Mrs. Bell and babies, were at the home of her mother and Mr. Bell at his barbershop, down town.

A corner of the roof to the government's cotton warehouse in the south part of town, was torn off, as well as the roof in the center of the King Feed & Implement Co., lifted off.

In the northwest part of town the house of Mrs. Elizabeth Lewis, was completely wrecked, parts of the home carried across the street and laid in the yard of Dan Renfro, whose home was only slightly damaged.

Front porches to the homes of Judge C. E. Story, and Ray Simpson, were loosened from their moorings and allowed to fall across the front. Garages, here, were also, wrecked. Other homes on this street suffered greatly from the storm.

At the homes of Cal Houston, Mrs. V. Y. Sadler, Jno. Epley's, windows were smashed in and trees uprooted and stripped of limbs. A tin water tank on the top of a tower at a windmill 100 yards east of Joe Hall's was blown into Mrs. Sadler's yard.

Roof to the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Walker was blown off above the heads of the family, and the interior flooded with water.

The little 2-room home of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Blackford, close to the brick home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jess Blackford, on the farm at the northeast edge of town, was completely wiped off the earth, not a vestige of clothing or a piece of household goods, was found. The young couple and their baby were at the home of his parents at the time, was all that saved them from probable serious injuries.

The Stanton Hatchery, H. A. Wilson, owner, was wrecked, the roof falling in, but only a few little incubator chicks were lost from chilling rain. Mr. Wilson was in his room at the back of the building when the roof caved in, hence his escape from probable serious injuries.

Brick chimneys were blown off the courthouse, some trees uprooted, others relieved of limbs, and some window lights smashed.

Porch to the Baptist parsonage, northwest of the courthouse, was blown off at which moment Rev. McPherson that the "jig was up" he declared.

Demolished garages and damaged outbuildings, were noted over most all parts of town. Little damage was sustained in the business district, outside of a window light here and there broken out. The glass front to the Handcock Help Yourself Laundry was blown out, as well as the rear end of the garage of the Louis Wren building, next door.

Electric lights went off early in the storm and remained off during the night. Hundreds of dollars damage was suffered by the electric company, as well as the telephone company. Crews of both companies working the entire night and all of Sunday before their lines were back to normal.

Out in the country, from 10 miles north, a regular water-sport visited the section, sending dry ravines and gulleys running out of their banks, and forming lakes out of the low places, some sections reporting heavy hail.

At the John McWhorter and Earl Powell ranches, 10 and 11 miles north of Stanton, a 10 inch rain was reported, washing down sheep fences, and drowning some 80 or 90 head of sheep for McWhorter and Powell.

J. T. Armstrong, living ten miles northeast of Stanton, suffered heavy damage from the storm, mostly from hail. He lost a horse either from lightning or hail, his milk cows all bloody from the pelting they received by hail stones, almost as large as baseballs. Roof of his home battered in from the hail, and the roof of his car wrecked.

The deluge extended up into the Tarzan community where Paul Jones suffered the loss of 80 head of sheep from drowning when a large lake was made out of some low lands.

B. T. Hill, reported his crew had just finished planting 1900 acres the third time, when the rain washed the land as flat as dinner table. Ten inches was the estimate of the rainfall on this ranch, 25 miles northeast of Stanton. Monday morning Mr. Hill was preparing to plant over his field for the fourth time. No damage to speak of was done to the ranch improvements. In Stanton, chimneys were blown off Mr. Hill's house and the wind mill badly wrecked.

French Gray, living at the west outskirts of town, lost his windmill, vacant fruit stand that stood on the highway by the wind.

All the crops planted from the northern edge of town to the Dawson county line, were washed over and will have to be planted over for their third and fourth time.

The amount of damage suffered by Stanton from the storm was estimated between twenty-five and thirty thousand dollars. The washing out of crops and other damage wrought in the country will mount the total up into the many thousands of dollars, alone.

Wild rumors floating in various outside districts, reported that Stanton had been blown away and many lives lost, and with all communication lines out of commission the wild rumors had their way until early morning Sunday.

The town was without lights at night, and various citizens after the storm trudged around in the stricken district with the aid of flashlight and lights from automobiles.

This is the first storm of so violent nature to visit Stanton in its history, and it was one that sent the cold chills running up one's spine. Practically the entire population without storm cellars in which to take refuge, it was certainly an hour of agony and nerve-racking experience by the populace.

The eastbound Sunshine Special of the T&P, due at 7:05 in the morning, was held here an hour Sunday morning because of the tracks at Sulpur Draw just west of Big Spring, were under water. The T&P yards in Big Spring were under water as well as the lowlands in the city. Water running into the lobby of the Settles hotel and Ritz theater, as well as other buildings in that city.

Two miles west of Stanton it was dry as a powder house, as well as two miles south of town. The storm's southern boundary was Stanton, and extended north and east of town.

Red Cross Committee on Job

Sunday morning only a few hours following the destructive windstorm of late Saturday evening, a committee from the Howard County Chapter of the American Red Cross, were in our city, with offers of assistance and to check the damage done by the storm. This committee was composed of Messrs. Shins Phillips, Edmund Notestine, and Cole. They were taken on a tour of the town by the local Red Cross committee, composed of W. A. Kaderli, E. P. Woodard, Jr and L. H. White.

Monday afternoon Robert T. Bridge, disaster relief chairman for the South and Southwest, and his assistant, Miss Monroe, came to Stanton to inspect the damage done by the twister, and to confer with the local Red Cross chairman, Rev. Fred McPherson. They were surprised at the extent of damage and seemed eager to render all the assistance needed. They announced that a special worker would be here this week to confer with


Total Annual Earnings More Important Than Hourly Pay

Wage Rates Are Higher Than in 1929, but Millions of Unemployed Do Not Benefit

Washington, D. C.—Do high hourly rates of pay mean good times—more money in the weekly pay envelopes of the nation's workers?

If so, workers are better off than in prosperous 1929, for wage rates are higher. In manufacturing, for instance, 1937 wage rates averaged 64 cents per hour, compared with 56 cents in 1929. In other industries, hourly rates also

rose sharply, although statistics for them are not so comprehensive as for manufacturing.

Workers in most industries who were fortunate enough to have full-time employment were better off in 1937 than in 1929. But per capita earnings of all workers were less because many were on part time and many had no jobs at all. Even at the top of the recovery, in early 1937, eight or nine millions were estimated to be unemployed, and the figure is much larger today.

The contrast presented by increased hourly wage rates for employed

workers and a very large volume of unemployment is brought out in an income study made at the Brookings Institution. The study was financed by a grant from the Falk Foundation of Pittsburgh.

Hourly wages were reduced in the years immediately following 1929, with sharp downward movement of business activity, but they did not drop as much as the cost of living. Workers who retained full-time jobs bettered their position even while the depression deepened, but others suffered a decrease in income because of sharply reduced hours, or loss of employment altogether.

When recovery set in, hourly wages moved upward and continued to rise, spurred by the NRA and the pressure of organized labor. Hourly wage rates in the meat packing industry, for instance, rose 35 per cent between 1929 and 1937. In steel, the increase was about 32 per cent, and in many other industries it was around this figure.

Due to lower living costs the average industrial worker in 1937 could buy from 20 to 35 per cent more with an hour's pay than he could buy with an hour's pay in 1929.

Workers actually employed benefited in different degrees. In meat packing, hourly increases were enough to boost weekly wages 4.3 per cent over those of 1929, although hours were reduced from 51 to 39. Steel workers' weekly earnings declined about 6 per cent as hours were reduced from 55 to 39. In the silk industry, despite a rise in hourly rates of about 6 per cent, weekly earnings declined about 27 per cent, as hours were cut from 51 to 35.

Higher hourly rates, of course, did not help the millions of workers who were not on payrolls.

Increased hourly wage rates can bring greater income to the masses of workers only if accompanied by adequate employment. Hence, if high hourly wage rates are to result in well filled pay envelopes, economic policy must be directed toward removing whatever obstacles lie in the way of an increase in business activity.


