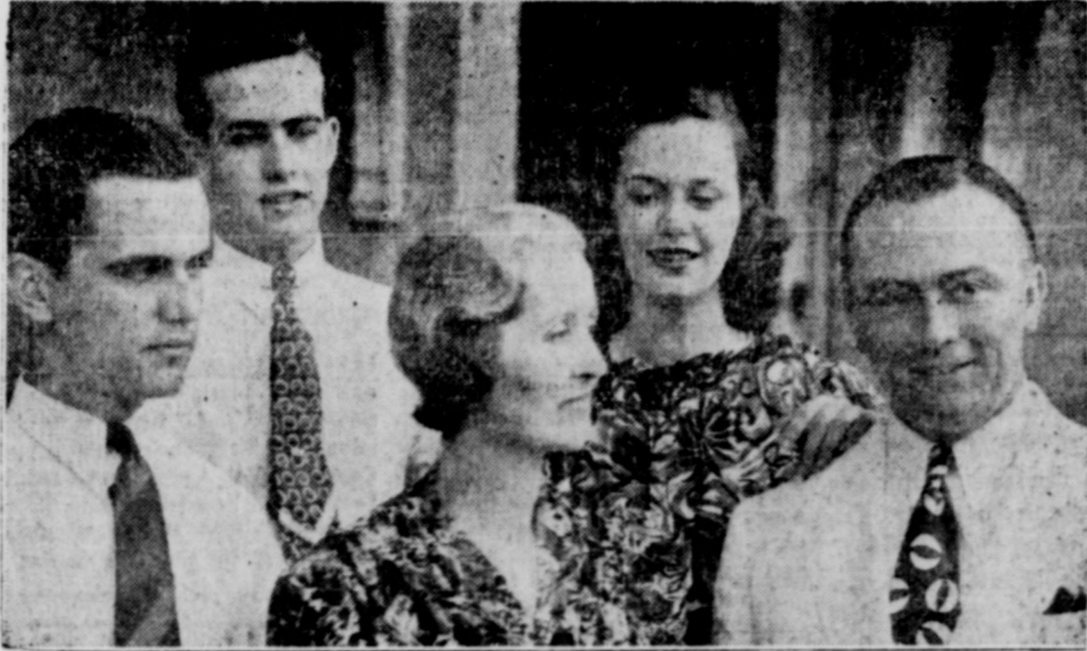

COLLINS AND MOSS TO FIGHT IT OUT IN DISTRICT JUDGE RUNOFF

(Special to Reporter)
Midland—In one of the closest district fights ever recorded in this area, final counting of votes showed that Cecil Collings, present district attorney, Big Spring, and Paul Moss, Odessa, to be in a run-off for the office of district judge.

Collings was the leader after all votes in Ector, Midland, Martin, Howard and Glasscock counties were counted, but only by the narrow margin of 38 votes. He had a total of 4,099 votes, compared to 4,061 for Moss. Clyde Thomas, Big Spring, third man in the race polled 3,803 votes and Collings and Moss have started their campaigns to win over Thomas supporters. Thomas has issued a statement that the Big Spring Daily Herald that "I think it proper to say I shall vote for Collings in the second primary."

In the district attorney's race Martelle McDonald polled a total of 5,178 votes compared to 6,385 votes for three opponents. Boyd Laughlin, Midland attorney, was second in the four-man race and will go into the runoff August 27 with McDonald. Laughlin polled 2,827 votes. Third in the race was Walton Morrison of Big Spring and trailing was Don Traynor of Midland. McDonald carried all counties in the district except Midland, Laughlin being high man here. SAM GRAVES FOUND DEAD EARLY TODAY

Funeral services were held at Hendrick Funeral home Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock for Samuel Luke Graves, 61, Ector county farmer and ranchman, who died in his sleep Sunday night, at his home three miles southeast of Odessa.

The Rev. J. F. Davison, a Baptist minister of Odessa, said the last rites.

He had been a resident of Ector county for the past ten years. He was born in Coleman county.

Attending physicians said he died of a stroke last night. Mr. Graves was feeling good with only a slight headache, Mrs. Graves said today (Monday). He retired for the night at the usual time and slept in the kitchen. Mrs. Graves slept in another part of the house.

She said she heard her husband get up twice during the night for a drink of water. She arose at the usual time 5 o'clock this (Monday) morning and started breakfast. She decided to let Mr. Graves sleep until breakfast was prepared. When he did not answer her call she tried to awaken him but received no response. She went to a neighbor's for help and called a doctor. The physician pronounced him dead.

Mr. Graves had been employed by B. C. Hendrick and Reeder Webb, on whose farms he resided.

Survivors include the widow; one daughter, Mrs. R. G. Dixon of Odessa, and one son, Gilbert Graves of Stanton.

Mr. Graves, formerly lived in Martin county. Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Graves of Stanton, went to Odessa, immediately after receiving the message of the death of his father Monday morning.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all offices of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI, Section 1 Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, _____ do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment; as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted

to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and

laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,

to pay the expense of such publication and election.
