proposing an Amendment to Article form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all offices of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional ation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter reed as follows:

"Article XVI. Section 1 Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Afffirma-

emnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and de fend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or in directly paid, offered, or promised to contributed, nor promised to or employment; as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So
