COUNTY PIONEER

DIED AUGUST 5TH

A. Straub, was born in Alsace Lorraine, Nov. 2, 1866. Lived in Southern France until the age of 23, then he came to America, landing in Galveston, going from there to Kenney, Texas, where he worked for \$60 a year and his board.

In 1893 he married Augusta Writcre, who was born in Posen. Augusta and Albert had only three years of married life, when she died and was buried at Sandy Hill, Texas. Augusta left two small children, Albert, age one year and eight months, and Mary four months old. Five months later Mr. Straub married Miss Minnie Stinke, who was born in Northern Germany in 1858 and came to America at the age of 28.

Mr. Straub lived nine years in Sealy after which he moved to Runnels county, Texas, and from there to Ward County, Texas, in 1907. In 1908 he moved to Martin county with his family. Albert, Jr., was 16, and Mary, 15 years of age. Mr. Straub and his son sold meat and ice, later meat and groceries. This business is still carried on today by his son, Albert, Jr.

Mr. Straub lived here the remainder of his life.

On August 5, 1938, at 8:10 P. M., Mr. Straub passed from this world to the Great Beyond. So another old settler has gone to his reward.

Albert Frederick Straub is survived by his widowed wife, Mrs. A. Straub; Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Straub, his son; six grandchildren Margaret, Albert, Claude, Willie Mae, Bobby Joe and Raymond; Mr. and Mrs. I. G. Peters, his daughter and three Peter grandchildren Angela, Sue and Ick.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION H. J. R. No. 20

proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI, Section 1 Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment; as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment of Ar-

ticle XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.
