

SPORT NEWS

To start this column off in a way that will leave the Stanton fan in rather a cheerful mood relative to what the Stanton Buffs may do before the football season is over, the game last Friday night with the Colorado Wolves, so say those who attend the game from Stanton, the Buffaloes really outplayed the opposition, but that the local squad played in hard luck thru fumbling the ball at a critical moment. At one time in the game the Wolves kicked the ball to within a short distance of the Buffaloes' goal line and a Buffalo barely touched it as the ball struck the ground, and a Wolf picked it up and ran across the goal line before the Buff could get his hands on it again. These are bad breaks that will creep into the best of football teams, and most times they are accountable to lack of team work, experience, etc. Then, too, there is a certain amount of hard luck due to inexperience of the players, which is very evident in the Buff squad at this early period in the chase down the conference trail.

The Colorado game revealed that the 1938-39 Buffalo squad had the earmarks of putting up better brand of football this season than in the last two or three seasons past. But it will be along about mid-season before the locals round out into real smooth clicking order.

There are many "ifs" strewn in the path of any undertaking one attempts to do if he doesn't succeed. We are the greatest "if" guy in any man's country. We use it in our walk down our every day path. "Ifs" are in everything and lots of 'em at this season of the year in football games. We heard it said by those who attended the Stanton-Colorado game last Friday night "there was no sense of Colorado winning that game." The Buffaloes outplayed the Wolves, etc., but it was "if" this, and "if" that. Boys, let me tell you something. So long as the playing of the game meets the approval of the officials in charge, it's the squad that chalks up the most scores that win. Stanton failed to make that grade, hence the team lost, "ifs" or no "ifs". True the Wolves had the advantage of about 10 pounds to the man.

What the Buffaloes need now is the cooperation of the Stanton fans and the citizenship as a whole—boosting them and otherwise letting them know we are

behind them at every turn in the road. This mark of respect will go a long way toward placing the team in the win column.

We are not so sure that the Monahans Lobos will chalk up a victory over the Buffaloes this Friday night at Monahans. Statistics, however, are in favor of the Lobos to win, but the calculations are on paper, newspaper, at that, and all are familiar how Germany treated all their guarantees during the World War. The brightness of the Buffaloes' chances to win this game are not of the brilliant illumination character, when it is taken into account that the Lobos last Friday night took the measure of the Lubbock high school "B" team, 19-0, and the week previous, clipped the tasks of the Colorado Wolves, 19-16. A dark cloud with no silver lining appears over Monahans way so far as the Buffaloes stalking off with a victory.

The Odessa "A" Broncs clipped the wings of a crippled flock of Golden Cranes on the former's lighted field Friday night, 25-0. The sport writers had it that the Broncoes romped at will over the Cranes. Maybe by the time the game scheduled against the Buffaloes arrives, which is Nov. 11, the local squad will have had sufficient playing experience and improved so greatly, and the Cranes more crippled, they can beat 'em.

The very thoughts that the Buffaloes are scheduled to meet the Wink Wildcats, makes this department quiver in his "holier than thou" shoes. The idea of facing a team that has twice in succession won the district championship in this thorny clad 7-B district, and just last Friday night waded into the Hobbs, N. M., incorrigibles—a team of "beef", well sprinkled with ineligible material, and subtle that aggregation to the tune of 31-0. 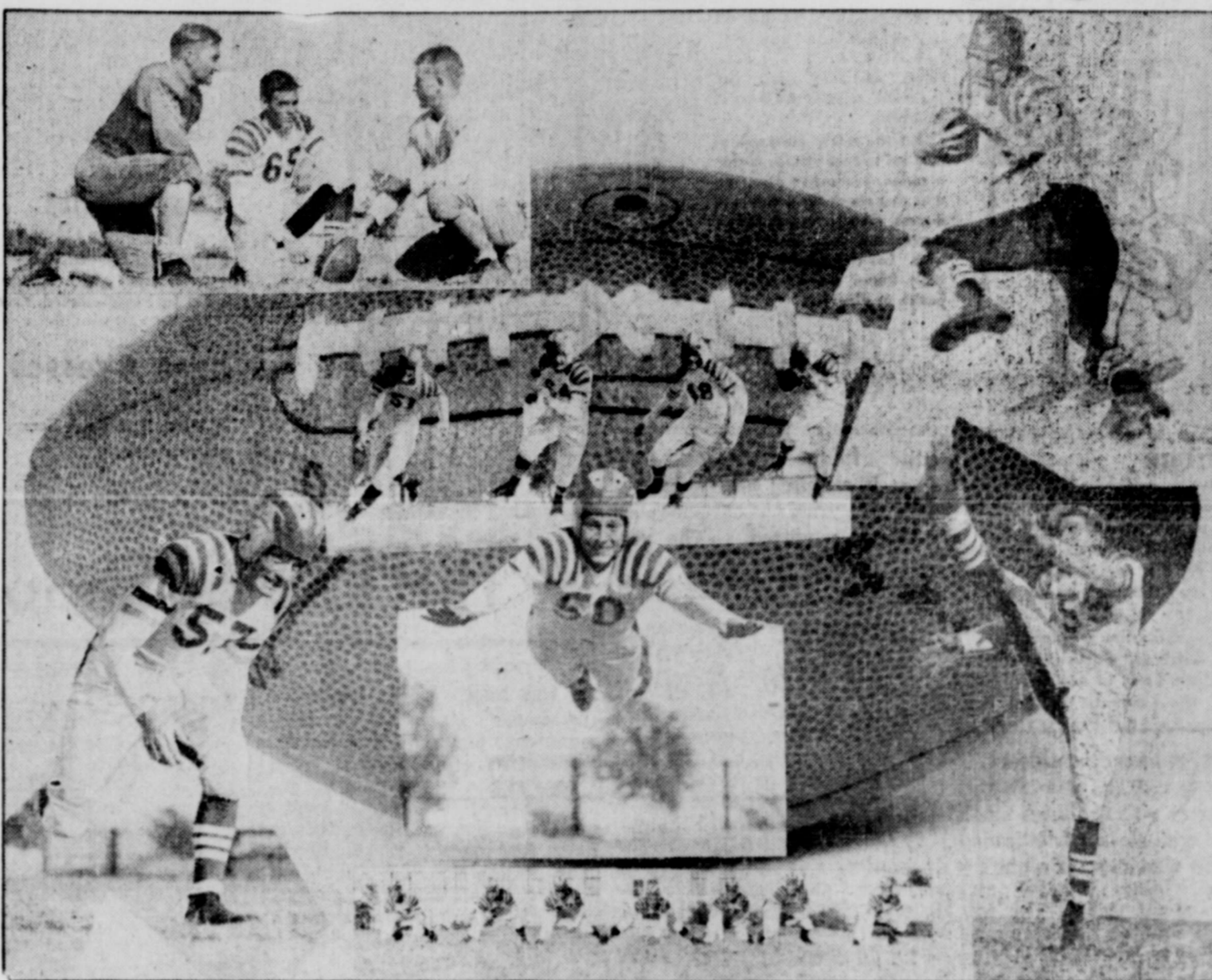

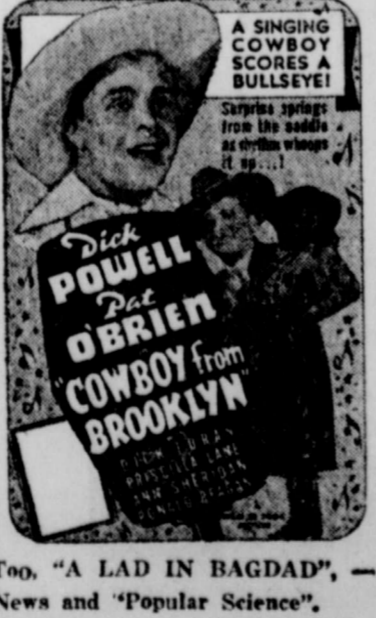

Stanton Reporter: Practically impossible to fill this column this week, sitting at the keyboard of the linotype, no copy in sight, with a thousand and one things turning over in our mind, none of them pertaining to a thing for this column—and the time drawing short for putting the paper to bed if we hope to get some 5,000 copies of the paper to our few hundred subscribers by Friday morning.

It was William Shakespeare, if memory is reliable, who warned against men who think too much. He preferred sleek, baldheaded men, men who slept at night instead of lying wakeful and thinking about things. The editor of the Stanton Reporter may be thinking too much. He is busy thinking, with a thousand things turning over in his mind, when he ought to be producing copy for his newspaper. A newspaper is not built by what the

editor thinks but by what he does. It requires a bit of thinking, of course, but concentrated, not wander-witted. The very fact that the Stanton brother was thinking of getting out 5,000 copies to send to a "few hundred subscribers" indicates he was in a state of mental scatteration. State Press wishes he could impress upon editors and everybody else that streamlined thought is bedrock success. No man can add a cubit of his stature by taking thought, but by taking thought he can avoid pitfalls dugged by his own thoughtlessness. This is a lecture to the unthinking and those who think too much. Too much thinking disturbs the balance, sways the equilibrium, knots the filaments of the brain and tends to make the individual too dependent upon the weather.—State Press in the Dallas Morning News.

THE longer the PWA puts off allowing an allotment for building and improving the Stanton school plant, the more deterioration is eating its way into the buildings. At present, the school buildings are in a deplorable state. Taxpayers of the Stanton Independent School District, have done their part—they voted \$27,500 school bonds in July

for this improvement program, the proper paper for the allotment sent immediately to the PWA office in Fort Worth, there approved and application of \$22,500, where the matter is awaiting either approval or rejection. PWA has made it known it will share funds in such work and Stanton would like to have its first PWA building project approved.
