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## SPORT NEWS

That 44 to 13 win the Stanton Buffaloes chalked up against the Ackerly team last Friday afternoon on the Buffalo field, sounds like the local squad is headed for a climb out of the cellar position. The game was not a conference tilt but it revealed that the local cleat foots had improved considerably since its first conference game with Monahans. Two of the Buffs' best players were out of the lineup due to breaking rules, or there was a good chance of the score would have climbed to greater heights. In the first minute of play in the first quarter an Ackerly nabbed a pass and shot over the Buffs' goal line for the first counter of the game. Further on in the ceremony the visitors marked up another score giving them 13 tallies. Following this episode the Buffaloes awoke from their apparent Van Winkle snooze and tied into their adversaries with a vengeance that allowed the Buffaloes to score at will until the pistol shot.

Coach Bud Taylor of the Midland Bulldogs and Jess Rogers sports writer of the Reporter-Telegram, were over scouting the game but what they saw will not save the Bulldogs from a surprise upset handed the Bulldogs by the Buffs on Lackey Field this Friday night. They left the game for home just as the local squad got down to sure enough playing, hence the Midlanders saw only the ragged edge of the Buffs' activities and went home thoroughly convinced their Bulldogs would have easy tobogganing over the local squad. If we could only chase Jay Francis, the sparkplug of the Dogs through a cactus patch bare-footed before game the Buffs might surprise the whole district like the Golden Cranes when they swept roll mall over the Monahans Loboos last Friday night on Crane field. By the way, the Cranes licked Monahans by the same score Monahans piled up against the Buffaloes—26-0. Reports had it that the Cranes were hospitalized following the game with Odessa the week previous, and because of that fact had their game with Iraan called off. Another report comes over our grapevine is the Cranes had the game called off that they might have time to recuperate and mix poison for the Monahans Loboos, and it seemed to have worked. We hardly look for the Cranes to "book us" that big score against the Buffaloes when the two teams match wits and brawn on Armistice Day, the last game scheduled in the conference chase. It yet remains to be seen whether the sandhill overregation will win from Stanton.

Boy, howdy, ain't Johnny Smith's face hot with fever since

the only hope he depended for his Monahans Loboos holding second place in the football conference went glimmering with the loss of the game to Crane. Johnny, you just as well calm yourself, the Loboos, the Kermit Yellow Jackets and the Stanton Buffaloes will all be clamoring for the cellar position.

The Lambs were led to slaughter over Wink way last week end. The Wildcats took the measure of the Littlefield Wildcats to the tune of 72-0. It was a case of Wildcat meets Wildcat but the slaughterhouse caught the Lamb mountains.

Another upset took the spotlight in Class A and Class B football in this area when the Pecos Eagles invaded the corral of the Odessa Broncs and played them to a 6-6 tie. So far this season the Eagles have clean record of victories hung up in every game they have played. That fact is making the Midland Bulldogs quake in their paws as to whether they will be holding second position when the season ends. The Eagles are almost certain to capture their nightcap with Monahans tonight.

The Midland Bulldogs traveled all the way to Iraan, 40 miles, Saturday afternoon to defeat that squad 32-0. The Dogs' main point of vantage was scoring on passes as the Iraan Braves didnt permit the Dogs to gain much yardage on the ground.

The Stanton Buffaloes are to reckon with the Kermit Yellow Jackets on October 21, the following week after the Buffs have met the Wink Wildcats. And how we do shudder every time we think of the Wink game. If the

**TEXAS 4-H ENTRY IN NATIONAL DAIRY MEET**

PAUL ADAMS, 18, and Ivey Miller, 16, both of Pickton in Hopkins County, will represent the State in the National 4-H Dairy Production Demonstration Contest at the National Dairy Show in Columbus, Ohio, October 8 to 15. The contest is being conducted by the Extension Service throughout the Nation for the second year, and is designed to improve methods on dairy farms. The state winning team won over pairs from 12 other counties and was awarded the trip by State Club Leader L. L. Johnson. The boys demonstrated the production of clean milk, showing the best utensils and the procedure to follow, and were coached by Assistant County Agent J. W. McFarridge. They receive all-expense trips to Columbus through the Kraft-Phenix Cheese Corporation, which is also giving a total of \$2,800.00 in college scholarships to the two highest ranking teams in each of the four Extension Sections. Last year L. C. Love and James Dean of Eastland County represented the State in the national finals.

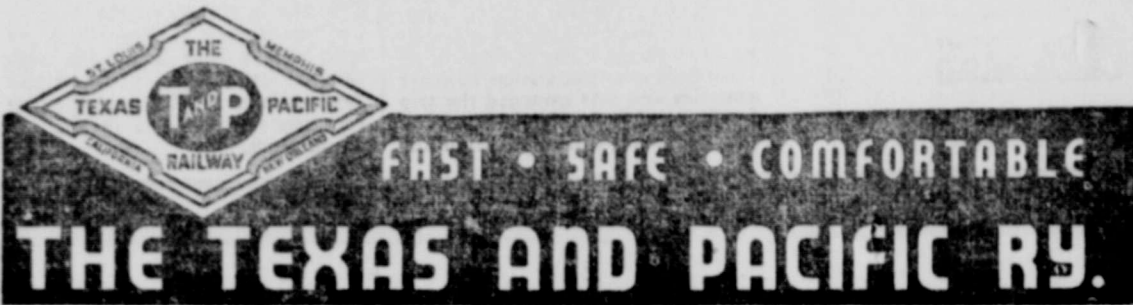

## County-Wide Bond Election for October 15th

### NOTICE OF ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF MARTIN  
TO THE QUALIFIED RESIDENT,  
PROPERTY TAXPAYING ELECTORS OF MARTIN COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID COUNTY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Martin County, Texas, on the question and at the time and at the places within said County designated and set forth in an order passed by the Commissioners' Court of Martin County, Texas, which order is as follows, to-wit:

THE STATE OF TEXAS  
COUNTY OF MARTIN

On this 12th day of September, 1938, the Commissioners' Court of said County was convened in Regular meeting at the Courthouse, with the following members of said Court present, to-wit:

C. E. Story, County Judge  
J. D. McCreless, Commissioner Precinct No. 1  
J. S. Blackford, Commissioner Precinct No. 2  
Bonnie White, Commissioner Precinct No. 3  
L. E. Castle, Commissioner Precinct No. 4

Jno. F. Epley, County Clerk and Ex-Officio Clerk, Commissioners' Court, with the following members absent: None, constituting the entire Court, at which time the following among other proceedings were had:

There came on to be considered the petition of W. A. Howard and 124 other persons, praying that bonds be issued by said Martin County, Texas, in the sum of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000) Dollars, to bear interest at the rate not to exceed 4% and maturing at such times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court serially or otherwise, not later than twenty years from their date, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, within said County, including the acquisition of all necessary lands for right-of-way purposes on the South end of the Stanton-Lamesa road and on the proposed west road extending from a point on the said Stanton-Lamesa Road west to the Andrews County line accessible to the communities of Lenorah and Tarzan in Martin County, Texas, and from a point on the Stanton-Lamesa road, said point being the N. E. Corner of Sec. 15, Block 36, Twp. 2-N Martin County, Texas, thence in an N. Easterly direction along the Section line to the Howard County line, and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied annually upon the property of said Martin County, Texas, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds, and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity, and after due consideration Commissioner McCreless introduced a proposed order.

The order was read in full by the County Clerk.

A motion was made by Commissioner McCreless and seconded by Commissioner Blackford that the order be passed finally, which motion was carried by the following vote:  
AYES: Commissioners McCreless, Blackford, White and Castle.  
NOES: None.

Thereupon, the County Judge declared the order finally passed. The order is as follows:

WHEREAS, it appearing to the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident, qualified, property-taxpaying electors of Martin County owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

WHEREAS, it further appearing that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Martin County;

IT IS THEREFORE, ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF MARTIN COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said County on the 15th day of October, 1938, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine:

"Whether or not the bonds of said Martin County, Texas, shall be issued under Article III, Section 52 of the Constitution and Laws enacted pursuant thereto, in the amount of Fifty Thousand (\$50,000) Dollars, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed four (4%) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually as may be determined and fixed by the Commissioners' Court of Martin County, Texas, and maturing at such times as may be deemed most expedient by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, not later than twenty years from their date, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, within said County, including the acquisition of all necessary lands for right-of-way purposes on the South end of the Stanton-Lamesa road and on the proposed west road extending from a point on the said Stanton-Lamesa Road west to the Andrews County line accessible to the communities of Lenorah and Tarzan in Martin County, Texas, and from a point on the Stanton-Lamesa road, said point being the N. E. Corner of Sec. 15, Block 36, Twp. 2-N Martin County, Texas, thence in an N. Easterly direction along the Section line to the Howard County line, and whether or not an ad valorem tax shall be levied annually upon the property of said Martin County, Texas, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds, and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity, and after due consideration Commissioner McCreless introduced a proposed order.

2. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3, Title 22, Revised Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature.

3. All persons who are legally qualified electors of this State and of this County, and who are resident, qualified, property-taxpaying electors of this County, owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence.

4. All voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AN AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

And those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AN AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

The said election shall be held at the several polling places in Martin County, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as officers of said election at the several voting precincts, as follows:

In Precinct No. 1 at the City Hall in the City of Stanton, Texas, with H. A. Houston as Presiding Judge, and Poe Woodard, George Bullock and I. G. Peters as Associate Judges.  
In Precinct No. 2 at the Methodist Church in the City of Stanton, Texas, with G. A. Elland as Presiding Judge, and Luke Cathey, Sam Martin and Clayton Burnam as Associate Judges.  
In Precinct No. 3 at Tarzan, Texas, with T. J. Holloway as Presiding Judge, and F. Springer, Francis Orson and Irvin Welch, as Associate Judges.  
In Precinct No. 4 at Pleasant Valley, Texas, with R. T. Hightower as Presiding Judge, and Loyal Carr as Associate Judge.  
In Precinct No. 5 at the Schoolhouse in Lenorah, Texas, with George Parker as Presiding Judge, and S. J. Foreman as Associate Judge.  
In Precinct No. 6 at Brown, Texas, with Wm. Johnson as Presiding Judge, and James Shortes as Associate Judge.  
In Precinct No. 7 at Loyola, Texas, with J. B. McNew as Presiding Judge, and H. H. Corbett as Associate Judge.
