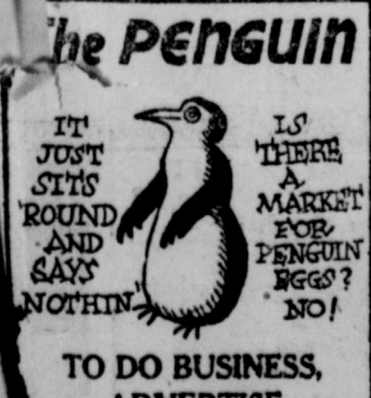

BEN CARPENTER JOINS FARM LOAN ASSOCIATION

(Big Spring Daily Herald)

Resignation of Ben Carpenter as cashier of the State National bank in Big Spring to accept appointment as secretary-treasurer of the Midland-Stanton National Farm Loan association, was announced Friday by bank officials.

Carpenter, who has been with the banking institution for 25 years, will be stationed at Stanton in his new position. He will be in charge of the recently grouped Midland National Farm Loan association and the Stanton association. Both are institutions identical to the local association in charge of Ira Driver as secretary-treasurer.

Directors of the State National bank accepted Carpenter's resignation with regrets. It will be effective as of October 15. No successor has been named for his place.

Almost since he was a boy, Carpenter has been associated with the bank. He got his start doing janitor service as a youth and later worked into the banking department and up through a series of promotions to cashier.

Sen of a widely known pioneer couple, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Carpenter, Ben Carpenter is well known in this territory. He is moving his family to Stanton where they will make their home.

The loan association handles agricultural loans through the Federal Land bank.

S. D. McWhorter, whom Mr. Carpenter succeeds, organized the Stanton National Farm Loan association 21 years ago. Something like \$2,000,000 has been loaned on farm and ranches in this area since organization, and to date, only one foreclosure has been made. Mr. McWhorter has nursed the organization on up through the 21 years until its business has become so voluminous, together with the addition of Midland county, he felt that the services of a younger man was necessary to handle the job, hence his release from the position.

Mr. McWhorter will remain in the office for sometime assisting Mr. Carpenter.

CLOSE TO \$100,000 BEEN RECEIVED BY FARMERS IN SUBSIDY PAYMENTS

Of the \$165,000 which Martin county farmers expect to receive in the form of subsidy payments on part of their 1937 cotton crop, \$99,806 has been received and paid since September 16, when the first checks arrived.

The remainder of the payments should be received within the next three or four weeks, according to reports of George Bond, coun-

ty farm agent. All of the applications are now in the State office. It takes from three to five weeks for an application to be audited and certified for payment after it reaches the State office, and on this basis many more checks should be received this week because of a large number of applications were submitted five weeks ago. Producers are notified by card when their payments arrive.

BAND AND PEP SQUAD SCHEDULE

The school furnishes sponsors and assumes responsibility for all official trips, as indicated.

SCHOOL DISTRICT VALUATIONS

Following the sessions of the Equalization Board last week, Mrs. Nobby Hamilton, tax assessor and collector for the Stanton Independent School District, announces that the total property valuations for the district this year are \$1,603,423 as compared with \$1,595,656 for last year. This is an increase of \$7,767 over last year's valuations, or an increase of less than one-half of one per cent. The school board based its budget figures on a valuation of \$1,600,000, and is definitely following the avowed policy of not increasing taxes over those of the preceding year.

Individual renditions may change somewhat, but for the district as a whole, no appreciable increase has been made. The school board and the Equalization Board, are to be congratulated upon the economical and business-like methods and results.

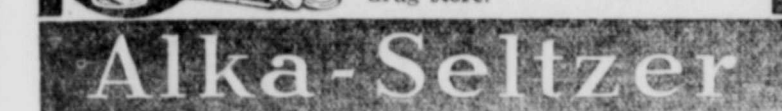

"THEN THE FEATHERS BEGAN TO FLY"

"When I drew the design on my feather comfort material, I just put it on the floor and thumb-tacked it straight, and drew around the paper design with tailor's chalk," Mrs. J. E. Griffin of Brown, told when explaining how she made her feather comforts.

Mrs. Griffin has just finished two comforts. She used ten yds. of Sylvan sateen, a feather-proof material, for each comfort. The top and bottom pieces were sewed together, then pressed carefully before the design was drawn on it. Each part of the design was stitched on the machine. After all the stitching was finished, each part of the comfort was filled with feathers. Feathers were blown into the center section of the design, first by the use of a vacuum cleaner. Then the next section was filled, and so on, until all were filled, with the section around the edge of the comfort being filled last.

Mrs. Griffin used about 4 1/2 pounds of feathers for each comfort. They had been thoroughly washed before hand, and all of

the large ones taken out. One may use from 3 to 7 pounds of feathers. The edge may be finished by a bias binding or a cord.

SALAD DEMONSTRATION GIVEN BY BROWN CLUB

Raw vegetables are much richer in vitamins than when cooked, Mrs. E. C. Airhart told the ladies of the Brown home demonstration club at their meeting with Mrs. R. E. Stock, October 6.

Mrs. Lee Castle, assisted Mrs. Airhart in giving the demonstration on "Vegetable Salad Combinations."

The following recipes were used:

Sour Cream Salad Dressing:
1 cup thick sour cream.
1-2 teaspoon salt.
1-2 teaspoon mustard.
1 tablespoon sugar.
3 egg yolks.

Chicken Salad:
Diced chicken (preferably baked), shredded cabbage.
Pimentos or green bull peppers.

Boiled eggs.
Shredded carrots.
Season to taste with salt and vinegar, then add dressing.

The above recipe may be used for all meat and fish salad.

Combination Salad: Any combination of vegetables eaten raw. The following is suggested, however, any of them may be omitted, or others added.

Shredded cabbage, radishes, green peppers, onions, tomatoes, carrots, cucumbers.

Combine, add salt, pepper, and vinegar to taste, boiled dressing may be added.

Raw Beet Salad: Raw beets, grated, radishes, onions.
Combine as in combination salad.

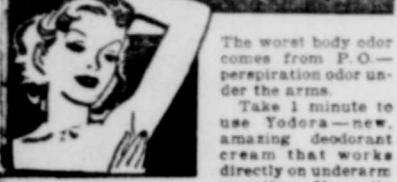

MARTIN COUNTY BOYS FEED CALVES FOR SHOW

Seventeen Martin county boys are feeding 33 4-H club calves this year for competition in the second annual Big Spring 4-H and FFA Livestock show in March, 1939.

Of the 33 calves, 18 are milk fed and are particularly being groomed for the spring shows. All of these calves weighed around 250 pounds in April when they were started on feed. They have all made good gains and, according to George Bond, Martin county agent, some of them now tip the beam at around 600 or more pounds, establishing them as excellent show animal prospects.

The remaining 15 calves are in the dry lot class, being given new stress in Martin county club work this year. Here emphasis is being placed by Bond on the rate and economy of gain rather than the showing qualities of the calf. These calves were started on feed Sept 1 and averaged 455 pounds. Boys are keeping complete records of all feed and expenses incurred.

In addition Martin county boys are feeding three barrows for the Big Spring show, and there are three boys who have started herds of registered hogs.

H. H. Wilkinson. Boys feeding dry lot calves are Billy Y. Clements, Dub Clements, Ceburn Weathers, Chesley Weathers, Reid Brooks, Donald Brooks, Wayne Brooks, C. G. Keele, Curtis Powell, Robert Drummond, Thomas Drummond, and Edgar Lay Powell, who is feeding four calves from the herd of his father, Earl Powell. Last year in the first club boy show here, Martin county boys, headed by Kenneth Holloway and Russell and Billy Sadler, took lion's share of the honors.

They were pushed however, by the Mitchell county lads, under Ben Baskin, county agent, and Fred Schillingburg, vocational agricultural teacher. — Big Spring Daily Herald.
