MIDLAND NATIONAL AND STANTON NATIONAL FARM LOAN ASS'NS. GROUPE TOGETHER

In the recent grouping of the Midland National Farm Loan Association and the Stanton National Farm Loan Association, Stanton has been made the headquarters for the associations. Ben Carpenter, of Big Spring, who had been cashier of the State National Bank of Big Spring, several years and had been identified with the banking institution for the past 25 years, has been made secretary-treasurer of the new grouping arrangements of the two loan associations, and with his wife, have moved to Stanton, occupying the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Wilkinson, who have moved to the ranch.

S. D. McWhorter has been the secretary-treasurer of the Stanton National Farm Loan Association for the 21 years, in fact, he organized it.

In a circular letter mailed out this week to some 250 borrowers, he announces that he will be in Midland on Saturdays of each week with office in the I. O. O. F. building, to discuss any and all business in connection with loans, and the rest of the time he will be found in his Stanton office in the Bristow building.

There are some 354 borrowers in the two loan associations and the loan account amounts to \$1,111,830, with a supplemental loan during the depression of \$317,880.

WATER FACILITIES SURVEY MADE HERE

Officials of the Soil Conservation Service from the Regional office, San Angelo, were in Stanton last week making a final survey in connection with the water facilities program which has recently been approved for a part of Martin county.

The water facilities program is a program authorized by the last session of Congress, where-in certain farmers might qualify for aid from one of the cooperative agencies, whereby he may improve the water facilities on his farm for irrigation, or livestock purposes.

The program will be administered by the Soil Conservation Service, in cooperation with the Farm Security Administration and the Bureau of Agricultural Economics and will be assisted by the Extension Service of Texas A&M College.

Just what facilities may be installed for improvement have not yet been determined and just who will be eligible for the assistance has likewise not been determined. However, a series of educational meetings will very likely be held in the county early next week. Eligible farmers will be notified of these meetings by letter.

Members of the Martin county commissioners' court met with the officials of the Administration Agencies and other groups in the courthouse here,

and in Midland, early in August and expressed the need of such a service in this county.

The project has been approved and a preliminary survey was made by the staff of the Soil Conservation Service early this month.

The new project headquarters have been established in Midland and Mr. Olen Fenner has been assigned as project manager. Those men who have made the survey in this county are:

These men visited most of the old irrigation projects that have been tried in the county and studied soil types and possible water supplies.

They were accompanied on their survey by George Bond, county agricultural agent, and also held a conference with William E. Gore, Rural Superintendent of Farm Security Administration.

Road Bond Lost By Single Vote

WATER PROJECTS UNDERWAY THIS WK

Announcement comes from Fort Worth that work in three water facilities projects in the drainage basins of four West Texas streams and their tributaries calling for the construction of stock ponds, farm water storage reservoirs, wells, water spreaders and garden irrigation systems on farms in 15 counties will get under way this week.

Approval for the establishment of these projects was made in Washington last week by the Water Facilities Board.

Among the three projects approved by the Water Facilities Board for development in the western portion of Soil Conservation Service Region 4 is: Mustang and Seminole Draws Watershed, a 4,000,000-acre drainage basin lying in Midland, Martin, Andrews and Crane counties and parts of Howard, Glasscock, Ector, Yoakum and Dawson counties. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service in Region 4 sector of Texas, which includes all territory outside of the High Plains, will work in Midland, Martin, Howard, Glasscock and Ector counties.

Olin Farmer, formerly located at the Temple project and the San Angelo Area offices of the Soil Conservation Service will have charge of a field office at Midland from which point activities of Region 4 of the Soil Conservation Service in the Mustang and Seminole Draws project will be directed.

Small facilities to be constructed under the program include stock ponds, farm water storage reservoirs, garden irrigation systems, wells, detention, retention and diversion dams, pump installations, windmills spring development, water spreaders and facilities that will help to replenish underground water supplies. All of these will provide immediate assistance to the farmer in improving the quality of his farming operations.

Coupled with these developments will be the use of contour cultivation, strip cropping, terraces, crop rotations, pasture development and improvement and other conservation farming practices designed to retain soil and water for productive uses. The farm and home phase of the program sponsored by the Farm Security Administration will emphasize the importance of subsistence farming to supply home needs of the farm family.

Applications for work in the three project areas may be made to the field offices at Midland, Colorado and Stamford, any county agent or field representative of the Farm Security Administration.

Mrs. Stephens was raised in Stanton, going to school here, and following removal of the family to Cisco, was married to Mr. Stephens in Dallas.

ARRESTS CHECK FORGER IN BIG SPRING

We are not charging our friend Deputy Sheriff Ogle Avery with reading Diamond Dick detective stories, but the way he has been sleuthing around and capturing lawbreakers, lately, he possesses much of the Diamond Dick charm.

This week he arrested a fellow giving his name as Rufus Thompson, in Big Spring, charged with forging checks. The record that Thompson seems to have left behind is passing a forged check, August 16, on Higginbotham-Bartlett Co. in Stanton, for the sum of \$28.40; cashed another to the amount of \$18.60 on Atchison Grocery, on August 29, both these checks on Big Spring bank; the third, of \$97.00, dated March 1, 1937, passed on the bank in Stanton, made out on an L. Simpson Lum

ber Co., check, Quanah, Texas. On this latter forged check transaction, Mr. Avery carried Poe Woodard, cashier of the First National bank here, over to Big Spring, Wednesday night where Thompson was identified by Mr. Woodard.

Deputy Sheriff Avery reports warrants are out for Thompson by Oklahoma authorities.

Avery will leave Sunday for Stephenville for Dave Walden and Raymond Adams, charged with robbing Camp Cozy here in the summer. They were first arrested by the local sheriff department, but Stephenville authorities had a prior lien on the two suspects for robbing a jewelry store there. They were sentenced two years at Stephenville and are being brought back to Stanton to stand trial for the Camp Cozy robbery.

Undaunted by the second defeat administered to them in the road bond election held last Saturday, the backers of the project immediately went into a huddle and now have petitioned in the field for the required number of signers to present to the county commissioners to call a third election on the same proposition. It is reported the commissioners will meet this Saturday at which time the petition will be presented and another election date will be set.

For the second time in the space of a few months the \$50,000 county-wide road bond election went down to defeat by the small margin of one vote. If you can get any closer to a defeat or a victory than one vote you will have to pluck a hair from a frog's back.

The county commissioners met Tuesday and canvassed the vote cast in the election last Saturday, and the official count will be found below, with the result the proponents for the proposition lost the two-third majority by one single, solitary vote.

Two voting boxes in the

county, Lenorah - North and Valley View, cast every vote for the bonds, while Loyola lacked only two votes of casting all against the bonds.

The bonds were proposed as the means of financing an extensive road building program which would have meant the opening of a highway, along a state designated route, from Stanton north 17 miles to Lenorah and westward to the Andrews county line. Other short sections, including one from Lenorah to West Knott just over the Howard county line, were included in the proposal.

MAKES TWENTY-FOUR FEATHER COMFORTS

Last December, Mrs. R. A. Brooks of Quanah, Texas, was visiting her sister, Mrs. J. E. Kelly. While in Stanton at that time, Mrs. Brooks inquired of the home demonstration agent for information on making feather comforts.

On October 17, she again visited the county home demonstration agent's office and reported that she had completed 24 feather comforts since beginning the construction of that type of light-weight cover. At one time she had enough material in her house to make 18 feather comforts. Sylvian-satin is the feather proof material used.

Making these comforts has become a profitable industry for Mrs. Brooks. Her customers furnish all necessary materials and pay

her \$5.00 for making each comfort. All of the work is done by Mrs. Brooks, alone.

Experience has helped Mrs. Brooks to perfect her method of filling the comforts, the first 2 made, were filled by hand. Afterwards, a funnel, like those used in filling jars when canning vegetables, was purchased and bradded to vacuum cleaner. To that was attached a long cardboard hose which was secured at a dry goods store. Through that hose the feathers are blown to each section of the comfort. Vacuum cleaner is placed at the foot of the bed and the comfort is spread on the bed during the filling process. By having the equipment so arranged, the work is much easier than if placed on the floor.
