## JOHN REESE VANCE PIONEER CITIZEN PASSES AWAY

RESIDENT OF MARTIN COUNTY SINCE FEBRUARY, 1891.

Dr. John Reese Vance, 82, a highly respected pioneer citizen of Martin county, passed away Sunday evening at his country home, northwest of town, following an illness of 10 days. Funeral services were held Monday, 3:30 p. m., conducted by Elder G. B. Shelburne of the Church of Christ, following which interment was made in Evergreen cemetery.

He is survived by one son, Judge Turner Vance of Refugio, Texas, who was at the bedside when death claimed his father; two sisters, Mrs. Minerva Berger, Cincinnati, Ohio; Mrs. Clara Tolle, Dayton, Ohio. Only other relatives in Texas are a nephew, Emmett Vance, Hillsboro, Texas; a niece, Mrs. Cora Ragland, Wichita Falls, Texas; a brother, Henson Vance, who, at the time of his death some fifty years ago, was principal of the Waco, Texas, public schools.

Due to a request made by Dr. Vance, to his old and valued friend J. L. Hall, of Stanton, prior to his death, realizing his days on earth were numbered, he asked that the boys from his farms carry him out and put him away. Responding to the request the following acted as the pallbearers.

Funeral was in charge of the Burnam & Burnam Funeral Home of Stanton, assisted by Nally Funeral Home, Big Spring.

Dr. Vance was one of the most prominent and highly respected pioneer citizen of Stanton and Martin county. A pleasing personality, optimistic word for all with whom he came in contact, a character of sterling worth and a citizen in general who was found at all times on the side of measures that had for their purposes the better things of the social, civic and religious life of his town and county. A citizen whom all called a friend, and when there was a friend in need Dr. Vance was a friend in deed.

Dr. Vance was born in Brown County, Ohio, January 30, 1856, and at time of his death he was 82 years, 9 months and 27 days old. On October 16, 1878, Dr. Vance married Martha E. Turner, who preceded him in death at the Stanton home April 30, 1934. He practiced medicine under Dr. Chaney in Highland County, Ohio, and graduated from the Kentucky School of Medicine in 1887. He moved to Stanton in February, 1891, and has lived on the home place where he died since 1900.

At one time Dr. Vance was postmaster of Stanton; county treasurer; president of the Home State Bank, since sold to the First National Bank of this place; president of the Old Settlers Reunion in July 1924.

Coming to Stanton in the Spring of 1891, soon after the town had changed its name from Marienfeld to Stanton, Dr. Vance set about building up a practice that was to take him many miles into outlying territory, and that a few years later necessitated the opening of a private hospital adjacent to his home. The adobe building, composed of five rooms, provided a convalescing place for stricken ranch people, and patients who demanded constant attention kept both Dr. Vance and Mrs. Vance very busy.

He was 35 years old when he came to Stanton, and his son, the only surviving child, Turner, was seven. Turner is now practicing law at Refugio, Texas.

Dr. Vance helped stake off

and the adobe hospital he built and used during his early days as a practicing physician. The hospital is now located at the rear of the Doctor's home.

the town of Stanton, drove stakes or carried a chain. He did everything else, too, such as digging mesquite roots for fuel.

Few men living today saw as much local history in the making out here as did Dr. Vance, during his lifetime. He observed the passing of the frontier; the prairies not so wild as they were; no longer do antelope come into town to drink at the courthouse watering trough, as Dr. Vance once saw them do. Stanton has grown from a village of one store, one church and one-teacher school into a county seat, a trading point for a prosperous farming and ranching area.

Dr. Vance was owner of extensive farm holdings, and considerable property in the town of Stanton, and his home just at the outskirts of town, northwest stands today as one of the most imposing structures in this area.

## Road Bonds Sold To Ft. Worth Firm

The Martin County Commissioners' Court met in special session Tuesday morning, called for the purpose of canvassing the returns of Saturday's election on the county-wide \$50,000 road bond issue. The final count revealed that 482 votes were cast for the measure and 175 against. In the first election held in May, 274 votes for and for the bonds to 152 against, the bonds sinking in defeat by some 10 votes shy of the required two-thirds majority. The second election held in October, the votes cast for the bonds were 319 for to 160 against, the issue losing by the close margin of one vote. The third, and last election on the bonds held last Saturday, according to the official count by the commissioners' court Tuesday morning, the vote for the bonds was 482 and 175 against, the issue carrying by better than 40 votes over the needed two-thirds majority.

A feature of the election Saturday, as well as the two previous ones, was that the boxes stood unchanged in the attitudes toward the bonds, only in the matter of strengthening their positions on the issue. The two Stanton boxes, the Tarzan and Lenorah boxes, swelled their votes in favor of the bonds over the two previous elections. Valley View never wavered from its position taken in the first election, giving a big NAUGHT against the bonds, and its entire vote for them. In the first election Valley View's vote was 12 for to 0 against; the second, 11 for to 0 against, the one vote lost must have been plowing that day; the third, and the charm, with ire up over two defeats, Valley View went to the polls Saturday and plastered the bonds for a win of 25 for to 0 against, a record they should be proud as well as the proponents.

North Lenorah came near to sending in a clean slate for the bonds, but in the last minute of play the opposition made a touchback, or whatever it is called when one score is made. Anyhow this box gave 26 for to 1 against.

There were two warriors of the Flower Grove sector that exemplified great courage when they marched to the polls and cast their votes for the bonds in a rain of 52 ballots against the issue. But to cap the climax Earl Bryant box "shouldered arms" in one solid phalanx and "shot the works" 11 votes against the bonds to nothing for—like Valley View, only the other way around, much to the regret of those favoring the move.

Where we go from here since the bonds have carried, this pro-

Ten days will elapse from the date of election, before, actual steps are taken toward the building of the road.
