YEARBOOKS FOR 1939 GO TO HOME D. D. AND 4-H CLUBS

The yearbooks for 1939 are being distributed this week to the members of the home demonstration and 4-H clubs who work under the supervision of Mrs. Elsie Gilkerson, home demonstration agent.

The yearbooks include a directory of extension service and county officials, the club motto, order of business, songs and goals, and an outline of the program for each month.

Women are studying the meat phase of the home food supply demonstration, and second year bedroom improvement for 1939.

Girls' 4-H clubs are studying the "other" vegetable phase of garden work, and second year clothing as their major demonstrations.

In the girls' yearbook programs are outlined thus: January, devoted to planning "other" vegetable phase of home food supply and frame gardens in February, girls will study kitchen aprons and storage space for folded garments; March is devoted to garden problems and sewing on snaps and hooks; April, to style, color, design and making 4 sport dresses; May, to grooming and personal appearance; June, to preparation for and holding of the clothing contest; July, to table service and short course; August, county-wide encampment; September, vegetable canning; October, vegetable cooking and fall gardens; November, making Christmas toys; December, Christmas party.

Soon followed the routing of the new highway a couple hundred yards south of Jones' old stand, and he moved to the location identified by the small picture on this page. Business grew and so did Jones' ambition, and after two years in this location, he moved to Camp Cozy, which offered him opportunity to enlarge his grocery stock and add modern meat market facilities. On January 13, 1936, he moved to his present site, offering him still larger store space, and also permitted him to be down town in the center of business activities. The Jack Jones Grocery and Market now provides Stanton with one of its most up-to-date grocery and meat markets.

So it is with pride the Reporter has this opportunity on the seventh anniversary to give a few facts about the successful rise of Jack Jones in his grocery business. One of the important facts to the success of this store in its seven years of existence can be traced to Mrs. Jones, who has stayed right by the side of her husband in the business, and the success of this business institution has come through hard work, strict attention to business, and the courteous treatment accorded customers by both Mr. and Mrs. Jones.

BAR X FEEDING OUT 2,000 LAMBS

Earl Powell, on his Bar X Ranch, is feeding 2,000 lambs, and running 3,000 ewes on his ranch this winter, besides running 300 head of cattle. Powell, realized 100,000 bundles of feed for the cultivated acres on his ranch last fall and this is being liberally passed out to his sheep for feed.

He is carrying over 2,000 ewe lambs. A modern feed grinding outfit has been added to his ranch for grinding his own feed, which, combined with large weighing scales has been added to weigh his livestock, is rapidly converting the Bar X into a modern ranch.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 19.—Official announcement was made this week of the election of Congressman George Mahon by the House of Representatives to a place on the Committee on Appropriations. The place is considered a highly desirable one and is much sought after among the Members of the House. Only two Democratic Members were elected this session. The membership of the committee includes 25 Democrats and 15 Republicans, Mr. Mahon being the only member from Texas.

Since the Committee is a major one and has a heavy schedule if hearings throughout the sessions, a Democratic member of this Committee is not permitted to serve on any other standing committee of the House. Mr. Mahon leaves posts which he has held through two terms in Congress on the Committees on Civil Service, Insular Affairs, Census, and Elections.

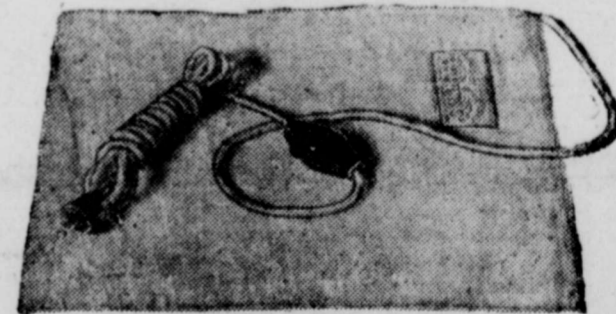
Book Reviewed For Stanton Study Club

NUMBER TWO MILER DOGS HEELS OF WORLD'S CHAMPION



BLAINE RIDEOUT

Denton, Texas—By virtue of his magnificent showing in the featured mile at the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans, on New Year's Day, Blaine Rideout, the larger of the famous North Texas State Teachers College cinderpath twins, won recognition as the second best miler in the nation this season and gained an invitation to run in the famous Wanamaker mile at Millrose Games in New York City February 5.

Rideout finished one stride behind the great Glen Cunningham, world's record holder, at New Orleans. Cunningham's time of 4:10.7 was the fastest mile ever run in the South and the fastest ever run at this time of year out of doors. Rideout's time in the event was 4:10.8, as he finished a good 40 yards ahead of the third runner, Don Lash of Indiana.

Also invited to run at Millrose is twin brother Wayne Rideout, world's record holder in the two-thirds mile run, who will be entered in that event.
