THE first time we met George Baker, now editor and owner of the Fort Stockton Pioneer and half owner of the Big Bend Sentinel, at Marfa, he was advertising man for the Big Spring Daily Herald. An industrious young man laying out advertising dope he felt would appeal to the eye of the merchants when he approached them on his rounds of solicitation, George had worked around print shops long enough to get the urge to own a newspaper. Little confabs between this writer and George, were held, relative to newspaper work. The next thing we heard of George he had purchased the Devil's River News, at Sonora, and a short time he added the Fort Stockton Pioneer, moving to that city to take personal charge, releasing the operation of his Sonora paper to a young man to whom he had sold a half interest. Under the guiding hand of George who is a friend maker and a friend keeper, the Pioneer grew rapidly as a revenue getter and one of the newest weekly newspapers in West Texas. Recently Baker and his partner, sold the Sonora paper to a movie show owner, and Jacobs and Baker purchased the Marfa paper. Now the latest on Baker, was his photograph that appeared in a recent issue of the Fort Worth Star-Tele with the cut lines revealing he had just been elected permanent chairman of the Permian Basin School Board association, the first of its kind thought to be in Texas. Members of this association are: Fort Stockton, Iraan, McCombs, Pankin, Crane and Big Lake. This is side-stepping his general routine of newspaper work, but Baker is young and handsome, with a fine wife, who is a newspaper writer in her own right, and two grand little sons, he can take it and make good.

One of, if not the most important items of news to come over the wires for Stanton, was the recent message sent by Senator Tom Connally out of Washington, D. C., to Dr. J. E. Moffett, mayor of Stanton, informing him that the WPA grant the city of Stanton had asked for a city park had been okayed by WPA authorities. The amount allotted for this project was \$10,172, to be matched by funds from the city of Stanton, which will make an approximate total cost of \$15,000. Needless for this department to say the park is to be modern in every respect, as that will have to be case to conform strictly with the plans and specifications accepted by the federal government.

Work on the project is to be done by WPA workers, and it has been estimated that it will require 40 laborers over a period of three months. During the past year there has been no WPA project under way in Martin county to provide employment for those classed in that department, consequently, many of the laborers of Martin county have been employed the past year or more on Midland projects. We have been informed that the city is anxious to secure 40 laborers on the WPA rolls, so the minute the signal is given for actual construction work to begin on the park all will be in readiness to go. So if there is any one who wishes to qualify for the WPA work, go now and see the proper authorities at the city hall.

THE REPORTER is in receipt of the Gospel Tidings, with G. B. Shelburne, Jr., editor, published in Abilene. The publication was started by Mr. Shelburne four years ago, a small 2-column, 8-page monthly, printed on ordinary news paper. Russell and Billy Sadler again won the show with the same calves which they placed first and second at the Stanton show on February 11. Billy Sadler winning the Grand Champion award with his 1028 pound calf, "Old Draw" and Russell Sadler winning the Reserve Championship with the 870-pound "J. C." calf. Billy's calf was bred by E. B. Dickenson and Russell's calf was from the heard of J. C. Sale.

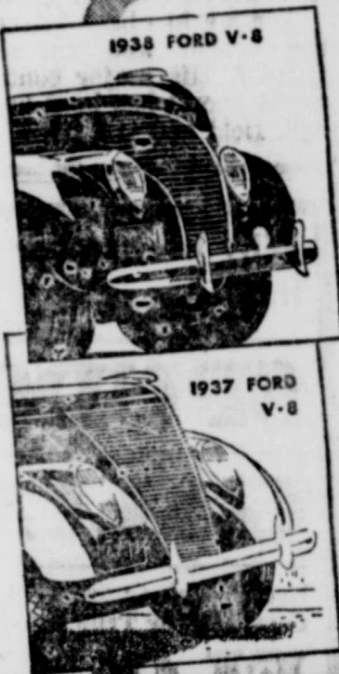
