IS EVERYBODY OUT OF STEP BUT THE CITY OF HASKELL?

(Editor's Note: Following is a dispatch from its Austin Bureau published Wednesday morning on Page 1 by the Abilene Reporter-News. The Haskell Free Press was unable to reach Haskell's Mayor, J. E. Walling Jr., for comment before press time.)

Business and governmental leaders in four cities have indicated an interest in getting water from the Miller's Creek project of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority.

Letters have been received by the Texas Water Commission from Stamford, Seymour, Knox City and Rochester people asking if the size of the Miller's Creek project could be increased from the presently planned 25,000 acre feet to 40,000 acre feet. This activity developed as Haskell city officials were trying to block the project through extensive litigation.

However, he pointed out that the Authority got a permit to use 5,000 acre feet of water a year, but the indicated yield of the reservoir is 7,000 acre feet. Carter said that the commission understands that Freeze, Nichols and Endress, engineers for the Authority, are making further studies to see if another site on Miller's Creek could yield more water.

Advanced retention of the poll tax; favored keeping braces as general farm hands instead of cotton gathering only; in connection with cotton insecticides, recommended that each chemical company keep a sample of each lot manufactured each year, to be rechecked, if necessary.

Let us make clear our eagerness to abolish the scourge of war from the face of the earth just as soon as others are willing to rise to so noble a stature with us. Let us renew our reverence for the blood of our sons and strike with all power we can mount to support and protect those who now fight our battles in distant lands.

And above all else, let us regain our faith in ourselves and rededicate all that is within us to the repair and preservation of our own free institutions and the advance of our own free destiny."

In conversing with several local merchants, I find "credit" is becoming more and more of a problem. Credit is fine if it is used with wisdom, but we should remember the easy road often turns out to be the roughest road in the end!

We should not succumb to the idea that the easiest possible installment terms we can get will be the easiest in the long run. They won't be. Organizations that make a business of handling the financing of purchases will tell you that. Certainly the installment credit system makes it possible for many of us to have the things we could not otherwise have, but that is no reason to use it unwisely.

It is only good business that if you make an installment purchase, pay as much down as you can, make your payments in as short a time as possible and then you will get the full enjoyment from your purchase, for it will not have depreciated in value faster than you paid for it. That's not taking the easy road, but it's taking the road that is traveled the easiest in the long run.

Safety in Courtesy: There is one simple and safe rule to follow in every business contact. This applies to the introduction on the street, the man-

ner of meeting an office caller, your conversation when placed next to a stranger at a luncheon or dinner, the man you are thrown with in traveling. The man who sits in front, or behind you at a football game. The simple rule is to assume you will meet the man again next day, or next week, or will some time run into him under more intimate circumstances or circumstances where any act of discourtesy, or any pointed ignoring would be embarrassing on the second meeting.

This same approach applies to any man or woman we meet, at a traffic corner, or along the highway. How many of us realize that when we blow our horn in a discourteous way at the car in front of us, or give the driver a scowl in passing, he might be going to the same friend's house to which we are headed. Or, do we ever stop to realize that if we made ourselves obnoxious in passing him in traffic, that he might be the first to reach us as we find ourselves in trouble from a wreck?

I heard a couple of good quips regarding the racial problem: County Clerk Bill Reeves said that pecan growers had been asked not to plant any more pecan trees in the future, but to plant "Nigger Toes." Rev. Ellis Todd, pastor of the local First Methodist Church, said he heard that a delegation had approached President Kennedy and had asked him to check with automobile manufacturers who had been equipping their new cars with all whitewall tires... and asking that in the future the cars be equipped with two whitewalls and two blackwalls.

There have been some mighty fish stories to come out of Lake Stamford 12 miles southeast of here during the 10 years or so of its existence, but the fishiest one to go INTO it was a "catfish" one "channeled" this way Thursday by Vic Lowry, of Knox City, gate game warden with the Texas Game and Fish Commission, who operates in Haskell, King, Knox and St. Lawrence Counties.

Game Warden Lowry said the fish were planted at four different places in the lake.

But if all these 120,000 channel cat grow up to be as big as a 22-pound whopper cat displayed by a Haskellite in the newspaper office here last week, what is to be done with 2 million, 80 thousand pounds of catfish? But then there would have to be a "catch" to that story, wouldn't there?
