WITH the commencing of work Monday on the city park for Stanton, a promising beauty spot supreme, don't you think Mr. Citizen now is a propitious time to start cleaning up and prettifying up your premises? There should be no limit to the area in which the clean up program applies to this town. Not saying it from the standpoint that Stanton is any more unkempt, possesses a more ungodly sights on the highway for tourists to see as they pass thru unsightly and disreputable old buildings, tumble-down fences and whatnot, than any other town in this section, but we can say without fear of contradiction, that the unsanitary and uncleanly condition of the town is mired down to a considerable depth below par. The incentive to do something to improve the unsanitary and untidy status of Stanton now presents itself more than ever with the building of the city park. What a ghastly sight it would be in comparison to the city's \$16,000 beauty spot and recreation center now under construction, were Stanton to allow itself remain in its present unsanitary and uncleanly condition. There should be a definite and intensive town-wide cleanup campaign inaugurated and by this we do not mean a haphazard, skip-and-a-miss cleanup of locally owned and inhabited city property, but a cleanup of vacant lots, removal of the trash heap and dump grounds of old broken down automobiles and machinery. Stringent sanitary laws should be enforced, if the city has any, and if not, an ordinance should be passed governing this phase, and then enforce it to the letter, allowing the chips to fall where they may. If the enforcement officer fails to perform his duty, fire him and get some one who will.

The barrier in the way of a thoroughgoing clean up campaign the writer has seen standing in small towns, comes through a sort of a sympathetic racket indulged in by local officers. For instance, there is the citizen or several citizens in every small town, (and larger ones, for that matter), who are considered the Mr. Jawns and the Mr. Pierpont Morgans, who, because of that fact, in the eyes of the local enforcement officials, are exempt from cleaning up their vacant lots or removing eyesores from their property. The officer prides his official head above that of discharging the duties of his office. He would rather see his town reek in the mire of filth, scattering death-dealing germs to the homes of the citizens, than to demand of these Jawns and P. M.'s, they too, must heed the laws in the same manner as Mr. Average Citizen.

Very possible it is, that the filth our town has been "enjoying" (?) the past winter, and the past several seasons for that matter, is largely responsible for the many children and grownups, too, of our community, lying in sick beds, today. Responsible for much of the illness in our community, it is said, is due to the high winds the past winter lifting the filth in the air inhaled by the victim. Filth is blown into our sector from other towns and communities to spread disease and our own community filth is added to added to that of the foreign and sent on to other sections there to spread germs.

Little can Stanton hope to make its city park stand out as a healthy spot if the background presents an ugly, unsanitary, appearance.

## BILLY SADLER'S CALF GRAND CHAMPION OF ODESSA SHOW

**CALF STOOD 10TH PLACE IN STANTON SHOW TO WIN TOP HONORS AT ODESSA SHOW**

With his 730 pound calf "Spot," Billy Jo Sadler won the grand championship at the Sand Hills Hereford Show at Odessa last Friday. The calf stood 10th in the Stanton show on February 11th, but has made remarkable gains since that time. He won first place in a class of light-weight calves (calves weighing under 800 pounds) and was placed over the "Old Draw" calf which won first place in the heavy weight class of the show.



The "Old Draw" calf, which was shown by Russell Sadler, stood first in his class at Odessa over a calf shown by Mayfield Kotheman which had been the Reserve Champion of the Mason county show this year. Both of these calves had been shown at San Angelo and Fort Worth, but had shown in different classes at both shows.

**All Calves Place**  
All of the nine calves entered in the Odessa show by Martin County 4-H club boys placed in the money this year. In the light weight milked class Billy Sadler won first with his E. B. Dickenson calf, and Hoyt Springer won fifth with his Bill Kelton calf.

**Russell Sadler Wins First**  
In the heavy milked class, Russell Sadler was first with an E. B. Dickenson calf; James Jones was fifth with his C-Ranch calf; Billy Sadler, sixth with his Geo. Glass calf; James Jones, seventh with his L-7 Ranch calf; Homer Howard, ninth with his Frank Cowden calf; Owen Kelly, tenth with his Sam Wilkinson calf; Homer Howard, eleventh with his Scharbauer Cattle Co. calf.

**Boys Win \$143.75 Prize Money**  
Martin county also won first prize on a group of five calves from one county. The boys won \$143.75 in prize money at the show, of which \$51.25 was won by Billy Jo Sadler with the champion calf.

While the prize is yet to be won at the Lubbock show, Martin county club boys are optimistic their calves will capture championship honors, adding another laurel to the wreath of the club's crowning achievement for 1939.

At this time it was decided to have Russell start showing the "Old Draw" calf because he had never won a show and because this was his last year of school, and because it was felt that possibly he could stand to be out of school better for the longer show circuit. Also at this time, Russell decided to invest some of his winnings in a flaming, scarlet, silk shirt, the jinx.

**STANTON SCHOOL PROJECT HINGES ON PASSAGE OF BILL READY TO COME UP IN CONGRESS**

All Stanton citizens, or rather citizens of the Stanton Independent School District, are aware of the bond issue voted last year to used on a very much needed school improvement program, and the matter has been held up for the lack of PWA funds. A bill is soon to be introduced in Congress to create additional funds for PWA, and in a letter to Supt. O. C. Southall from Haynes & Strange architects of Lubbock, an urgent plea is made to all interested in seeing that Stanton school be given its allotment for the improvement program, write or wire their senators or congressman.

The letter that follows is self-explanatory and should have the careful attention of all interested parties:

We urge you to immediately send letters or telegrams to your Congressman and Senators Shepard and Connally, urging their support of H. R. 4576 which has been introduced into the House of Representatives by Mr. Starnes of Alabama extending the Public Works Administration to December 31, 1941, and appropriating the sum of \$500,000,000 to be expended upon loans and grants for projects such as yours which has already been approved by all departments in

## WORK ON CITY PARK STARTED MONDAY

Actual and active construction work started Monday morning on the city park, a \$16,000 Stanton project.

L. W. Vernon, of Brownwood, is WPA project supervisor; Gordon R. Koonse, of San Angelo, project time-keeper; George Shelburne, of this city supervisor in behalf of the city of Stanton.

This project is under the direction of J. D. West, San Angelo, supervisor of this area. Mr. Vernon was in the employ of the Geo. A. Fuller Construction Co., New York City seven years, and with the engineering department of the DuPont corporation, Wilmington, Delaware, 3 years.

Monday work was started on laying off the grounds, tennis courts, wading pool, fish ponds, preparing the ground for setting out 30 Chinese elm trees, shrubbery, landscaping and the setting out of 860 evergreen shrubs; walkways 12-feet wide caliche; 4-inch curb; around the park will be 30-inch rock posts with cable running through each post around the entire park.

From the plans and specifications which are to be followed to the letter, Mr. Vernon says when the park is completed it will rate among the best in the Southwest.

There will be no driveways through the park to endanger the lives of any one enjoying the pleasures the park will afford.

There will be 45 men employed on this project and it will require six months to complete it. Contract for the shrubbery to go into the park was awarded the West Texas Nursery, Midland, R. O. Walker, manager.

## SHERIFF DEPARTMENT CAPTURES MUCH WANTED FUGITIVE

**CHARGED WITH AUTO THEFTS, BURGLARIES, EXTENDING OVER THE STATE**

Sheriff Morris Zimmerman and his deputies, lifted a heavy load of anxiety off the shoulders of the law enforcement officers of the state, when early last Saturday morning, while at sleep in the bunkhouse on a ranch 25 miles northwest of Stanton, in Martin county, they arrested C. V. Wolford, a fugitive from justice, wanted in many of the large cities of Texas for automobile thefts and other burglaries. At the time of his arrest Wolford had a .22 rifle, loaded at the head of his bed, in easy reach. With his capture the officers found two cars, one a 1937 Ford, stripped, and the other a 1933 Ford 2-Door, Wolford had purchased in Midland. On this car he was placing the better parts of the stolen car.

Wolford was finally tracked down by Sheriff Zimmerman and his deputies, through a tip from John Kelly, investigator for Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Co. Fort Worth, that it was believed Wolford was ranging in either Howard or Martin counties. This set the local sheriff's department to work in this county and after several days located the rendezvous of Wolford and after an all-night vigilance, officers "trapped their game."

Wolford was brought to Stanton Saturday morning and lodged in jail. With two other prisoners Wolford broke jail at Greenville, Hunt county, July 6, 1938, and remained free until his capture here Friday night. The other two prisoners had been recaptured sometime prior. At the time of his escape from the Greenville jail Wolford was waiting trial on the charge of auto theft.

Wolford had served 2 years in penitentiary, and to date has 68 years to serve in the penitentiary. The 1937 Ford was stolen December 19, 1938 from Jack Barr, and it was from this car Wolford was removing the better parts and placing them in the 1933 Ford he bought and paid for in Midland.

An air mail letter received by Sheriff Zimmerman this week from Houston officers, stated that the capture of Wolford cleared up several "big jobs" pulled in that section, and in other big cities of the state.

Wolford went under an assumed name here, giving the name of Bill Willis and had been employed on the Martin county ranch three months. His real name is C. V. Wolford, and the list of charges assessed against him filled a 5x7 card with finger prints that Sheriff Zimmerman showed us, and printed in six fine type it would take a microscope to read them.

Saturday night John Kelly, Frank Wolf, his deputy, and Deputy Sheriff Merritt of Hunt county arrived in Stanton to return Wolford to the Hunt county jail. These officers with the cooperation of Sheriff Zimmerman and his deputies putting on the finishing touches to the capture of Wolford, ended the freedom of a much wanted thief.

There is something about officer John Kelly, that law-breakers don't admire, and that is he usually gets his man when he goes after him. In the palmy oil days of Breckenridge, John Kelly was on the police force, and finally became chief of police. A better natured or cooler headed officer never lived, we know, or John Kelly wouldn't have permitted this writer living in Breckenridge for long. He is a Kaufman county product, weighing 6 feet in his stocking feet, weighing from 190 to 200 pounds, at least was his "dimensions" when we saw him last. That sort of a physique came

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

### STANTON DECLARED CHAMPION IN COUNTY MEET

#### THOMASON OF STANTON WINS INDIVIDUAL HONORS WITH HIS TEAMMATE SPRAWLS CROWDING HIM

The weather reversed its usual form for the county track meet here Saturday, and a near ideal day resulted. Senior and junior track and field events in all divisions were run off.

Girls' tennis, both senior and junior, in all divisions, was played off.

In the senior track and field events Stanton being the only class A school in the county had no competition and competed merely for practice. In class 1 track and field, Courtney carried away honors with Merrick second; Flower Grove, third and Brown, fourth.

In girls tennis Courtney won senior girls' doubles; Stanton won junior girls' singles; Flower Grove won junior girls' doubles; and Brown won senior girls' singles.

Literary contests will be held Friday of this week. Boys tennis will be played Saturday.

The one-act play contest with Flower Grove and Stanton entering casts, will be staged Thursday night at the school auditorium.

Thomason of the Stantonites noed out Sprawls, a teammate, for individual honors, scoring 17 points to Sprawls 14. Thomason gained first place in the 120-yard high hurdles and 220-yard low hurdles, second place in the high jump and 440-yard run. Sprawls had blue ribbons in the century dash and 220-yard dash, second place in the discus and fourth in the high jump.

Courtney's victories were both turned in by Lewis, who scored in the broad jump and high jump.

In the junior division of high school competition Stanton edged out Courtney, scoring 30 points to 29 for the Eagles. Valley View had one point. In the ward school division Stanton had 38 points to 28 for Courtney with Flower Grove turning in two while among the rural juniors Valley View had 36 points, Brown 17, South Plains 12, Lenora seven and Merrick one.


