**CRAWFORD HOTEL OPEN HOUSE TO BE THIS WEEK-END**

On another page in this issue of The Reporter, will be found a picture of the handsome new Crawford Hotel building in Midland, and an invitation to Stanton and Martin county people to attend the opening Saturday and Sunday.

From the Midland Reporter-Telegram we print the following account of the new hotel:

The completely remodeled, renovated and refurbished four story building, formerly the Llano Hotel, is to be operated by Cal Bovkin of Big Spring and A. J. Crawford of Carlsbad, N. M., with Bovkin continuing as manager of the Big Spring Crawford and of the new hotel at Midland. The Carlsbad hotel operator owns both the Carlsbad and Big Spring hosteleries but Bovkin is interested "fifty-fifty" with him in the Midland venture.

The hotel building has been remodeled and refurbished at a cost of \$150,000, making one of the major expansion projects of the year in Midland's business district. There will be 75 guest rooms, all with bath, and twenty apartments in the new Crawford, with parlor suites single and double bedrooms and some equipped for three-person families.

Completely new furniture has been installed, from lobby to top floor, with Venetian blinds in every room, a new Otis elevator, new carpets and all other accoutrements.

The expansion program was inaugurated several months ago by the Motor Hotel Corporation if Dallas, then operating the Llano Hotel, but a deal was consummated by Messrs. Crawford and Bovkin whereby it will be opened by the Crawford system and under that name.

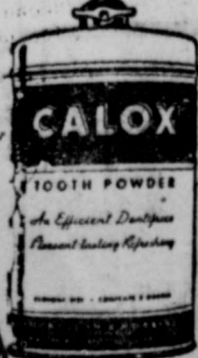

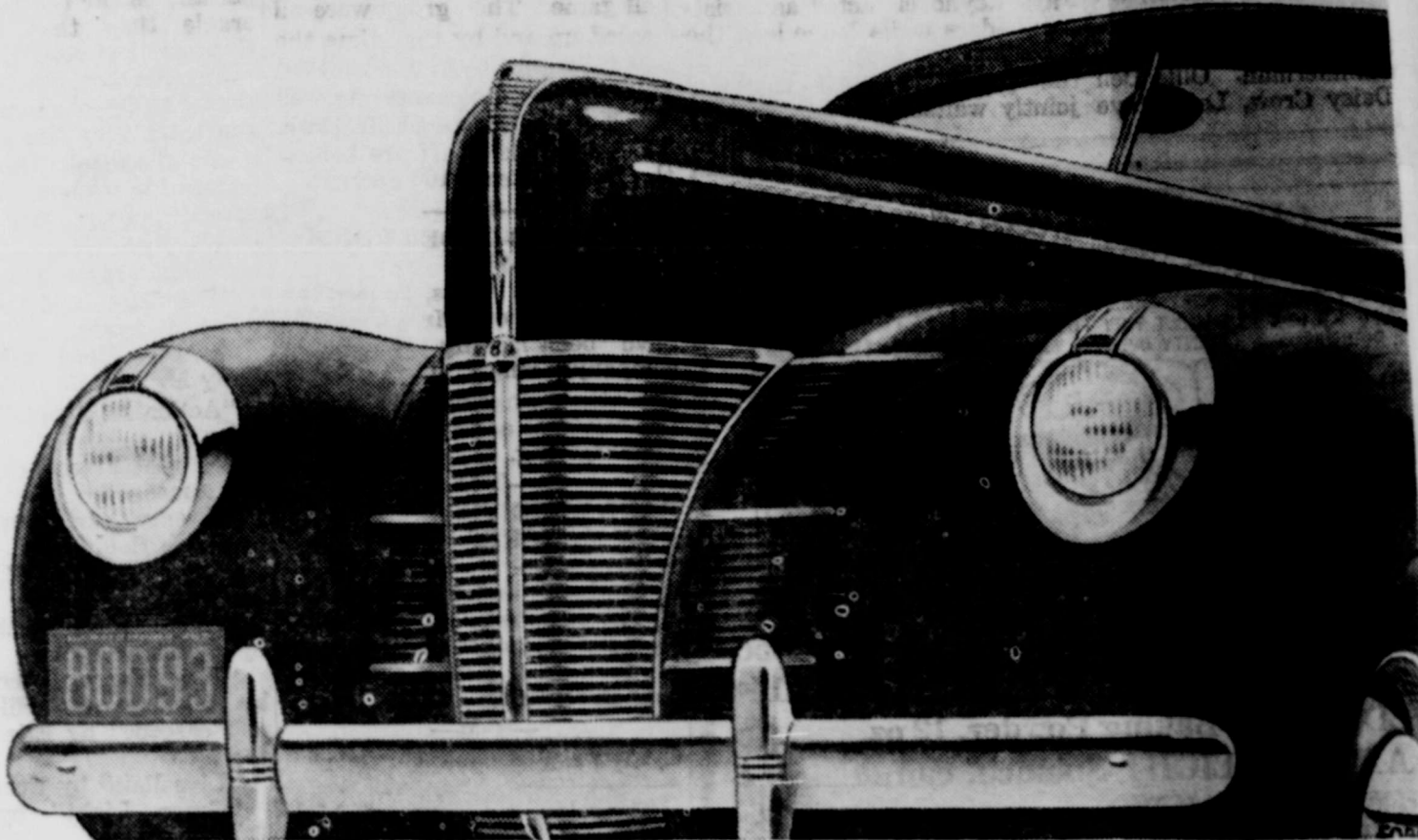
