"Any foreign person who acquires, transfers or holds any interest, other than a security interest, including leaseholds of 10 years or more, in agricultural land in the United States is required by law to report the transaction no later than 90 days after the date of the transaction," said Glenn R. Brzozowski.

Foreign investors must file Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA) reports with the FSA county office that maintains reports for the county where the land is

"Failure to file a report, filing a late report or filing an inaccurate report can result in a penalty with fines up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the agricultural land," said Brzozowski.

agricultural land is defined as any land used for farming, ranching or timber production, if the tracts total 10 acres or more.

also required when there are changes in land use. For example, reports are required when land use changes from nonagricultural to agricultural or from agricultural to nonagricultural. Foreign investors must also file a report when there is a change in the status of ownership such as the owner changes from foreign to non-foreign, from non-foreign to foreign

Data gained from these disclosures is used to prepare an annual report to the President and Congress concerning the effect of such holdings upon family farms and rural communities in the United States.



The Haskell CISD Educational Foundation, which was established in 1996 by a group of educators, business men and women, and other interested citizens, has had the privilege over the past sixteen years, of assisting teachers in their efforts to go "above and beyond" the state mandated curriculum.

The foundation's goal is to fund creative educational projects. Each year, all teachers at Haskell CISD are encouraged to put their creative ideas into action and apply for funds in the form of mini-grants. Since its inception, the foundation has awarded more than \$22,000 to support and assist classroom teachers as they develop special programs and projects that meet needs other programs miss.

This year the Educational Foundation was pleased to fund five mini-grants. Haskell Elementary kindergarten teachers Judy Washburn, Susan Cox and Lori McBroom purchased fifty magnetic letter sets for their students. The manipulatives, to be used at home with family members helping them learn letter names and sounds, as well as spelling words, are an invaluable tool in teaching reading.

Fifth grade teachers Tammie Wallace and Jennifer Roewe, will use their mini-grant to take students to the Science Spectrum/OMNI Theater in Lubbock. This unique trip allows students to experience over 250 interactive hands-on science and math exhibits, the breath taking OMNI Theater and science and math daily life demonstrations.

Pam Gibson, music teacher

at Haskell Elementary, was able to take third, fourth and fifth grade students to the Abilene Philharmonic's Discover Music Concert. She strongly feels that teaching through studying music, reinforces self-discipline, concentration, memory and motor skills taught throughout the school day.

Kristi Gibson, Haskell Elementary Science teacher, used mini-grant funds to conduct the 3rd Annual Science is Everywhere Science Fair, as well as the 5th grade science field trip. Elementary students in kindergarten through fifth grade have the opportunity to participate in the science fair, while encouraging community involvement. Her goal is to give students opportunities for life experiences that will add to their science knowledge.

At the Rochester Junior High, reading and English teacher Jodi Andress, used the mini-grant to help finance a trip for students who have achieved a goal of 300 accelerated reading points. She hopes that by rewarding students for reaching this goal, more students will become lifelong readers. It also provides an opportunity for less proficient readers to pair up with reader role models to achieve the goal.

The work of the Haskell CISD Educational Foundation would not be possible without the support of all those who believe in providing the very best educational opportunity for our students. It is a nonprofit organization and is solely funded by donations. The brick project adjacent to the high school gym, provides a means to honor or memorialize loved ones, while at the same time expressing support of current students.

What to do with paperwork after tax filing season

season has come and gone, you may be wondering how long to keep records and what records to keep. Keeping necessary records after you file your taxes is a good idea, as they will help you with documentation and substantiation if the IRS selects your return for

"Normally, tax records should be kept for three years," said Clay Sanford, an IRS spokesman in Dallas. "Some documents-such as records relating to a home purchase or sale, stock transactions, IRA deductions or credits you 1-800-TAX-FORM.

Now that the tax filing and business or rental property-should be kept longer."

In most cases, the IRS does not require you to keep records in any particular manner. Generally speaking, however, you should keep any and all documents that may have an impact on your federal tax return.

Records you should keep include bills, credit card and other receipts, invoices, mileage logs, canceled, imaged or substitute checks, proofs of payment, and any other records to support claim on your return.


"When records are no longer needed for tax purposes, do not discard them until you check to see if you have to keep them longer for other purposes," Sanford added. "For example, your insurance company or creditors may require you to keep them longer than the IRS does."

Voter ID law remains on hold pending legal action

AUSTIN-Before and after the passage of Senate Bill 14 by the Texas Legislature in 2011, the new voter identification legislation was labeled discriminatory by its salad, carrots, zucchini, opponents (Democrats) but pumpkin buckle, tea or a necessary tool to prevent

Now, nearly a year since Gov. the "voter I.D." law, it is still pitching and rolling in waves of court action.

In March, the U.S. Department of Justice rendered the law unenforceable, freeing voters in the May 29 Texas Primary Election from having to present at the polls an extra government-issued form in addition to their voter registration card.

On May 8, the Office the Texas Attorney General posted a news release suggesting the Justice Department is engaged in "an ongoing effort to prevent Texas from enforcing its Voter ID law during the November election" and that the federal agency has made "endless discovery requests seeking millions of records that have nothing to do with this case." A spokesman for the Texas Attorney General said that, however, the plan is to continue to seek "quick resolution."

Meanwhile, on May 11, the Justice Department announced plans to monitor the May 12 municipal elections in Dallas, Galveston and Jasper counties to ensure compliance with the Voting Rights Act of 1965. The Justice Department explained that under the Voting Rights Act, which prohibits discrimination in the election color or membership in a minority language group, it may send observers to monitor polling place activities.

Next on the horizon is Texas' Primary Election Day, List. May 29. Early voting for it

Secretary of State Esperanza "Hope" Andrade, the state's chief elections officer, in a May 11 news release, addressed possible misunderstandings related to the state's aforementioned battle with the federal government over the legality of Texas' voter ID law.



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

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
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FFA teams compete at nationals


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
