They probably won't help me much on the demobilization plan, but when I get back home I can present them with a nickel and get a cup of coffee at most any

The first award I received was the beautiful yellow "pre Pearl Harbor" ribbon. It signifies that I was not only selected by my friends and neighbors as the "cream of the crop," but I was among the "first skimming"

After I landed in Africa I received the E.T.O. ribbon along with all other guys. It proves my ability to withstand 14 days and nights rolling from stem to stern on a transport without seeing land.. I had left my dear old homeland "willingly" (with two dozen M-Ps behind me with fix-

ed bayonets who wouldn't)? I am proud of my good conduct medal because I had such a time getting it. I was supposed to have gotten it in Africa but they only had a limited supply so after telling me I would get one they told me, "sorry, we just found out you were a day late on your last furlough in the States-no soap." I didn't mind missing out on the "decoration" but they didn't have ot bring up that incident again. After all I was only two hours late and went out on a 20-mile hike the


