President Truman announced the unconditional surrender of the Japanese at 6:00 P. M., Central War Time, Tuesday. In part President Truman's statement follows:

"I have received this afternoon a message from the Japanese government in reply to the message forwarded to that government by the Secretary of State on August 11.

"I deem this reply a full acceptance of the Postdam declaration which specifies the unconditional surrender of Japan. In this reply there is me qualification.

"Arrangements are now being made for the formal signing of surrender terms at the earliest possible moment.

"General Douglas MacArthur has been appointed the Supreme Allied Commander to receive the Japanese surrender.

"Great Britain, Russia and China will be represented by high-ranking officers.

"Meantime, the Allied armed forces have been ordered to suspend offensive action.

"The proclamation of V-J Day must wait upon the formal signing of the surrender terms by Japan."

The White House made public the Japanese government's mess age, the text of which was delivered by the Swiss charge d'affaires, follows:

ust 10 regarding their accept ance of the provisions of the Potsdam declaration and the reply of the governments of the United States, Great Britain, the Soviet Union and China sent. by American Secretary of States Byrnes under the date of August 11. the Japanese government have the honor to communicate to the governments of the four powers as follows. "1. His Majesty the Emperor

has issued an imperial rescript regarding Japan's acceptance of the provisions of the Potsdam declaration.

"2. His Majesty the Emperor is prepared to authorize and insure the signature by his government and the imperial general headquarters of necessary terms for carrying out the provsions of the Potsdam declaration. His majesty is also prepared to issue his commands to all the military, naval, and air authorities of Japan and all the forces under their control wherever located to cease active operations to surrender arms, and to issue such orders as may be required by the supreme commander of the Allied forces for the execution of the above mentioned terms."

Over a German target flak put out of commission two of his engines, and after six hours of hazzard riding through the air at a slow pace and losing altitude he manage to make a crash landing on an English Spitfire field with no injury to a member of his crew.
