OCTOBER 1, DATE SET TO START DRIVE FOR NATIONAL WAR FUND

JAMES JONES COUNTY CHAIRMAN REPORTS \$2,255 COUNTY QUOTA

Judge Ben H. Powell of Austin, president of the United War Chest of Texas, announced the official opening date of the victory campaign of the National War Fund as October 1 with a statewide radio hookup carrying the opening ceremony Monday, October 1, from 9:30 to 10:00 p. m.

James Jones has been made chairman of Martin County, assisted by Judge E. F. White, who will have charge of the rural section.

The six months of coming Fall and Winter will be one of the most critical periods in human history. In the light of that fact the National War Chest committee has completed its schedules; with \$70,159,500 for the USO, United Seamen's Service, War Prisoners' Aid, and American Field Service, with \$24,793,986 available for relief in Europe (two-thirds to be spent in six months), and with \$13,695,003 for relief in China and the Philippines.

The victory in the Pacific, and the morale problems of occupation, demobilization and convalescence mean a peak load for the USO and USO-Camp Shows, with no possible retrenchment until Spring.

Judge Ben H. Powell, president of the United War Chest of Texas, says:

"The war has ended and once again the world basks in the light of peace.

"Yet millions of American service men remain in foreign lands, as far from home and as roared. And in war-torn lands throughout the world other millions wander in hopeless misery, lonely as when the guns still they are our liberated allies...

Unless we help them, all that we fought for will be forgotten. Unless America extends a helping hand, the peace will be lost, though the war has been won.

"And as long as a single American lad remains abroad, there can be no thought of abandoning him. Wherever they may be, whether standing guard in battered Germany or on some lonely Pacific Isle, we at home must continue to serve our men who wear the glorious victory.

"This is the last fund-raising campaign ever to be staged by the National War Fund. In appreciation of the sacrifices of our fighting men and our allies, it must be the greatest success.

"We, as free Americans, must be as generous in victory as we were determined in war."

"We can't let them down!"

Bible Thoughts

"For to one is given by the Spirit the of wisdom; to another the word of knowledge by the same Spirit; to another faith by the same Spirit; to another the gifts of healing by the same Spirit; to another the working of miracles; to another prophecy; to another discerning of spirits; to another divers kinds of tongues; to another the interpretations of tongues" (1 Cor. 12:8-10). Here are nine spiritual gifts named that enabled the early disciples to work miracles. But the question is asked, "How did they receive the miraculous powers which are described in the passage?" By turning to the eighth chapter of Acts we can find the answer. Philip went to Samaria and preached the gospel to the Samaritans. When the disciples in Jerusalem heard that they had received the word and had believed and were baptized they sent Peter and John unto them that they might receive the Holy Spirit. Upon arriving Peter and John laid their hands on the new converts and they received the special gifts named in the above passage. Another example of the transmission of miraculous powers by the laying on of the hands of an apostle is recorded in Acts 19:6, where we read, "And when Paul had laid his hands upon them, the Holy Ghost came on them; and they spake with tongues and prophesied." This teaches that miraculous gifts could be transmitted only by the laying on of apostolic hands.

To answer the question, "Whom did these signs follow?" is, therefore, the apostles, to whom Christ promised such powers, and those to whom the apostles transmitted the power by the imposition of hands. PROTECT RAILROAD REGULATION

Under a system of regulated competition, our country enjoys transportation services of unequalled variety, extent and economy. The purpose of H. R. 2536, introduced in Congress by Representative Bulwinkle of North Carolina, is to make this system even more effective and workable, by making it plain that it is the intent of Congress to intrust the administration of the system of Federal regulation of transportation to the Interstate Commerce Commission. It does not propose repeal of the anti-trust laws as they apply to regulated carriers, but it does say in effect, that arrangements entered into by the carriers, and approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission, shall not be considered as in violation of the anti-trust laws.

The Bulwinkle bill grew out of the attack by the Anti-Trust Division of the Department of Justice upon the legality of organizations for conference and consultation among carriers, and between carriers and shippers, necessary to proper consideration of questions affecting rates, routes, services and joint undertakings generally.

Such arrangements have been in existence for half a century. Their operations have been public, well understood, and highly valued by shippers who make use of them and regulatory authorities, such as the Interstate Commerce Commission which pass on the result of their work. But the anti-trust group in the Department of Justice says conferences among carriers and between carriers and shippers in connection with rates and services, are contrary to the Sherman Anti-Trust Law of 1890 and must, therefore be abolished.

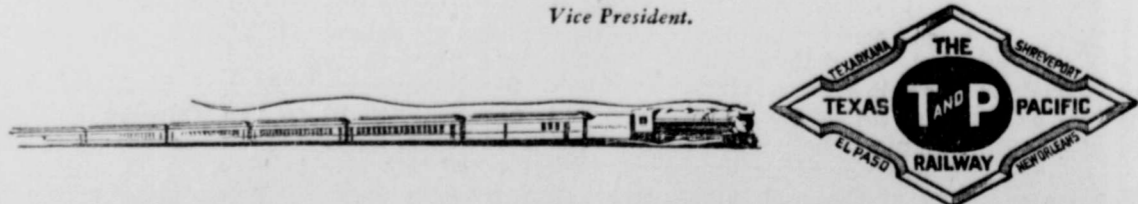
