### T/5 Tillma Gets His Disorgan

From the 13th Armored Division, Camp Cooke, Cal., comes the news to the Reporter that T/5 Tillman D. Morgan, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Morgan, Stanton, has received his discharge from the United States Army at the Camp Cooke separation center. T/5 Morgan was a member of the 13th Armored Division (Black Cat) which fought under General George S. Patton in Germany. The Black Cat tankmen captured more than 20,000 German prisoners in the fighting in the Ruhr and took an additional 19,000 during its spearhead drive through Bavaria and Austria. In the closing days of the European war, the 13th captured Hitler's birthplace city of Braunau, Austria, and liberated 14,000 Allied prisoners of war. The 13th Armored Division was in the process of being redeployed to the Pacific for action in the scheduled invasion of Japan when the Japanese suddenly surrendered.

### 1st. Lt. John Priddy, Jr. Arrives At San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO DISTRICT, AAFDC—1st. Lt. John Franklin Priddy, Jr., of Box 365, Stanton, Texas, who served 10 months in the European theater of operations as a pilot, has arrived at the San Antonio District, AAF Personnel Distribution Command.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Franklin Priddy, Sr., and the husband of Mrs. Laura Gainer Priddy of Menard, Texas.

Lieut. Priddy was liberated from a prisoner of war camp in Germany.

He will spend approximately two weeks at the redistribution station undergoing records and physical processing in preparation for discharge or reassignment to duty in this country.

During his stay here, this combat veteran who was assigned to San Antonio upon completion of a 30-day leave at home, will be duty-free and have at his command all of the many recreational and educational facilities made available to returned airmen by the Personnel Distribution Command.

### STATISTICAL PROG'M GIVEN AT MEETING OF THE LIONS CLUB

SUFT. O. B. BRYAN CITES FIGURES ON REA EXPENDITURES

Bristol Chesser, who, as a boy grew to young manhood in Stanton, and now holding a very responsible position with REA, that of field representative representing the loan department, was a guest speaker at the Lions club Monday night. He presented some valuable data on the growth, and what is in prospect in the future growth of REA, and of its great worth to the rural population. He handed a bouquet to Lion O. B. Bryan, superintendent of Cap Rock Electric Cooperative, that loosened the button from their anchorage on O. B.'s vest as his chest puffed out, and made the rest of the Lions perk up their heads with pride.

Mr. Chesser spent a year with REA in St. Louis, Mo., moving from Waco, now he has moved back to the Texas city.

Mr. Bryan followed the speaker with some statistical data on the Cap Rock Electric Cooperative in this area.

When the REA headquarters was moved to Stanton last Spring the Stanton local office was third class. Following after headquarters was given a postal receipt.

The income of the postoffice mail through Stanton is approximately \$975,000 per month, according to Mr. Bryan.

The valuation of the electric cooperatives in the Stanton area is approximately \$110 million dollars, through the program of the REA.

The valuation of the electric line in the Cap Rock Co-op area, at an approximate cost for completion of 1100 miles of line is \$975,000.

The headquarters office employs a force of 21 people with a payroll of \$4,000 per month. The Ash Electric Co., that have of line in Cap Rock district, have headquarters office in Stanton, the contract to build 100 miles and its payroll is \$3,000 per month. The payroll, of the local REA office and Ash construction company, combined with the expenses, will total \$11,000 per month handed out in Stanton.

Mr. Bryan said that in the next three years the Cap Rock will have a force of 30 employees attached to the local headquarters office.

It is planned during the postwar period to have built 1575 miles of line; a modern of

### WAR FUND DRIVE FOR \$2255 QUOTA STARTED THURSDAY

COMMITTEES APPOINTED AND AT WORK

The county has never failed to reach its objective on all loan drives and it is agreed that it will come through with the War Fund, despite the fact, there is a gloomy prospect for a cotton crop. Give as liberally as you can to this greatly needed fund.

Winthrop W. Aldrich, president of the National War Fund, says: "Some people ask why private relief is necessary, and if governments are not meeting the needs of the people. It must also borne in mind that many of the liberated countries of Europe existed under military government for weeks after their liberation. Also, the assets and resources of government are not always readily freed after their liberation."

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### OVERALL VICTORY LOAN QUOTA \$115,000

This week W. Y. Houston, chairman of Martin County War Finance Committee, received a letter from Nathan Adams, state chairman, that Martin County's quotas in the Victory Loan drive to start October 29th, were: Series E, \$50,000; and the Overall, \$115,000.

"We are approaching this final drive with the knowledge that it won't be easy, but with the greatest determination we have had during the entire war financing program to see it succeed. Certainly we must not fail to back our country in Victory with our dollars. Costs of demobilization, rehabilitation, care for the wounded and contract termination tremendous. We must finance this last phase of the war in the same sound way that we have the actual period of hostility. It is a great duty and privilege to invest in Victory."

**Bible Thoughts**

We come to our last question in the study of Mark 16:14-20. "How long did these signs follow?"

Since the apostles were the only one who could transmit the power to work signs to others, the working of them must have passed away with the apostles and those upon whom they laid their hands to confer these gifts.

Again, since the purpose of the signs was to confirm the word, when all of the word had been given and confirmed, the signs, having fulfilled their mission, ceased. That all of God's revelation has been given and confirmed is evident by such passage as Judge 3. It reads: "Earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints."

That these conclusions are correct is provided by the fact that we are told when they ceased. 1 Cor. 13:8-19 teaches they were to cease when that which was perfect was come. James says that the law of the Lord is the "perfect law of liberty" (Jas. 1:25). Therefore when all of the New Covenant had been miraculously given and confirmed, miraculous demonstrations ceased.

Today we have the complete revelation of Christ, and to it alone we must look for guidance, comfort, and strength. We cannot have our spiritual needs supplied from any other source, for the word of the Lord contains "All things which pertain unto life and godliness" (2 Pet. 1:3), and it perfectly furnishes us unto every good word (2 Tim. 3:17). For latter-day revelations or signs or miracles one will look in vain, but he can find healing for all of the ailments of the soul in the divine word.
