EX-MARINE IN RACE FOR REPRESENTATIE

J. T. Rutherford, 27 year old citizen of Ector county, Odessa, announced his candidacy Saturday, January 24, for the office of State Representative for the 88th district of which Martin County is a part. The incumbentt, George Elliott, will not seek re-election.

Rutherford is a pre-law student at Sul Ross at the present time and plans to attend the University of Texas for his law degree beginning next fall.

The candidate has reported wide support over the entire district, comprised of thirteen counties, with many quarters predicting that no opposition will be faced by Rutherford.

Many will recall the unsuccessful attempts of friends who sought to place Rutherford's name on the ballot during the 1944 election, for the office he now seeks, while he was still on active service in the Pacific. He was ruled out because of technicality in his overseas 'residence'

In making his candidacy known, Rutherford made the following statement: "With my past experience, during my 12 years in Odessa, and West Texas, I feel that I know and understand the problems related to the peoples of this huge district that depends upon the oil, farm-






