



STANTON WATER IS PURE

One great concern of Martin County during the past summer months has been the purity of the water in this area. Because of the polio epidemic which has so rapidly spread over Texas, it has been the opinion of many persons that the cause of the disease might be impure water.

Some residents have even gone so far as to send water off to the State Health Department to be tested. And although it is fine to see the people take such an interest in city and county health, this practice proves to be a fruitless one since the department will not test the water unless the sample is sent to it in one of its own sterilized bottles.

There is no need for alarm, however, as Stanton water is pure. The City of Stanton, working in conjunction with the Health Center in Abilene, takes four water samples each week of the city water and sends it to the Abilene office to be checked.

This water is taken from different faucets each week, so that a cross-sectional sample is taken of the entire city. The liquid is bottled in sterilized containers provided by the health center. The center then reports the water to be either pure or impure.

Stanton water has proven to be pure in the case of each bottle sent in thus far, so there seems to be little worry of the polio germ being spread through the water in this area.

WHY DON'T WE DO IT AGAIN?

If a man is angry with you, that's the time to control your own "A soft answer turneth temper. away wrath; but grievous words stir up anger." "Make no friendship with an angry man; and with furious man thou shalt not go lest thou learn his ways and get a snare to thy soul." Proverbs that recall Paul's counsel, "As much as lieth in you live peaceably with all men." There are limits even to the practice of forbearance, but one is wise to keep the boundary

very wide.

In a similar spirit, the Proverbs stress the wisdom of regulating one's own life with good sense, and not according to what others are doing. Envye of others, of their power, wealth, success, or some advantage that they seem to possess, can create disharmony in one's own soul. Peace of mind is of the very essence of inward harmony, and there can be no peace of mind where envy and bitterness

In our personal lives and relationships we can do much to avoid people who don't like us, or who are unfriendly towards us. But in larger relationships—social international—we are confronted with situations which we must accept as they are. They in-volve sharp differences, if not conflicts, in ideas and ideals, ways and manners. 
