They will both be drilled to 3,300 feet with rotary tools.

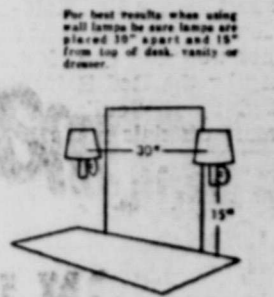

1954 Martin County Cotton Acreage Quota Set At 93,692 Acres

The 1954 cotton acreage allotment for Texas counties, released by the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, formerly PMA, sets Martin County's allotment at 93,692 acres.

The allotment set for Midland County is 26,334; Glasscock, 9,429; Howard, 7,811; Dawson, 213,300.

Each farmer in the county will have to be notified of his acreage allotment before December 15, when cotton planters across the nation will go to the polls to decide whether they want government control on their 1954 crops, with the accompanying support prices.

ASC officials have expressed the belief that cotton acreage controls coming after the last three years of drought are going to be detrimental to West Texas cotton farmers.

Controls are necessary if farmers are to have a government support on prices they receive. Two-thirds of all farmers voting in the referendum must agree to the program before controls can be established.

Basically, the farmers will be voting on whether they want support prices based on 90 per cent or 50 per cent of parity.

If two-thirds agree to controls,

the government will guarantee a support price of 90 per cent of parity. Should the vote go against controls, support prices will be dropped to 50 per cent of parity, and to be eligible for even that price floor on his crop, a farmer must stay within his assigned acreage allotment.

Allotment Opposed
The Agriculture Department has announced that if controls are voted for the 1954 crop, the national acreage allotment will be 17,910,000 acres. However, Western growers oppose the figure set by Congress, claiming it would force them to make drastic and ruinous reductions in planting.

But unless Congress acts, quotas for 1954 will not be changed. The differences have arisen over whether the allotment for next year should be based on the planting of cotton during the last five years as now provided by law, or during the last three years, when large tracts in the West were put into cotton for the first time.

Funds from the sale of Christmas Seals go to finance the year-round tuberculosis control program.

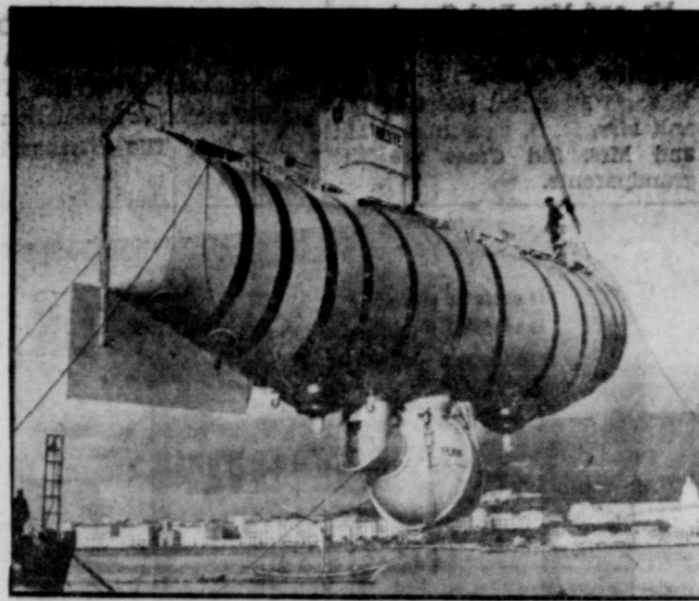

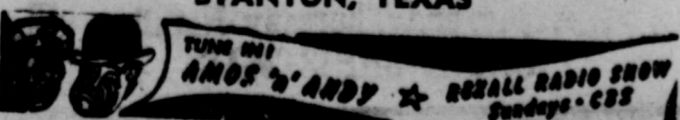

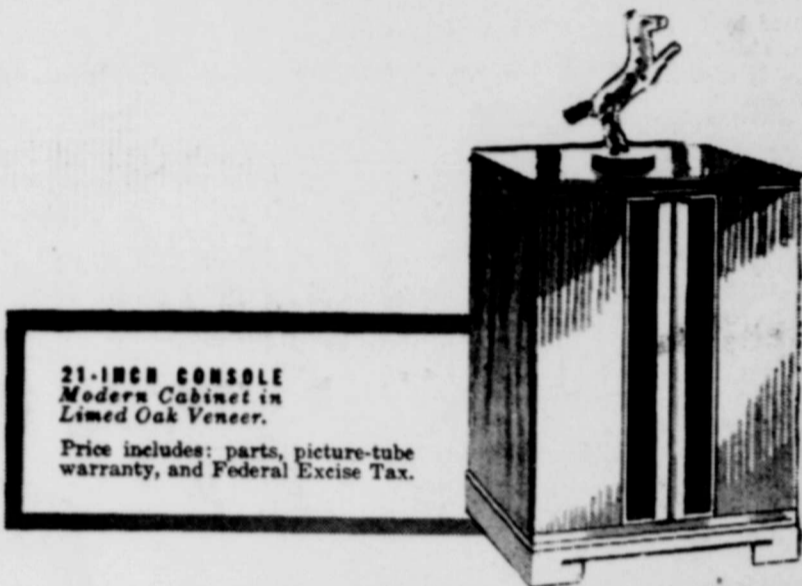
