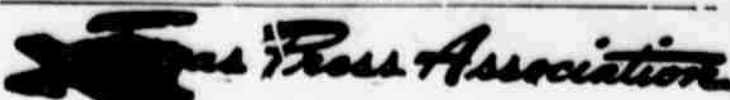

Arlington National Cemetery, home of the Unknown Soldiers, is a memorial not only to those who have died for the United States, but also to the man who tried, reluctantly, to divide the Union.

The cemetery, explains the World Book Encyclopedia, is built around the home of General Robert E. Lee and stands on land that once formed part of the Confederate General's estate. In fact, Arlington is the original name of the property, located on the Potomac River in Virginia.

The home was built by a grandson of Martha Washington, whose great-granddaughter was Lee's wife.

During the Civil War, the Union Army occupied the estate and used it as a training camp and field hospital.

The cemetery is probably best known for the tomb of the Unknowns of World Wars I and II and the Korean War, guarded by a sentry 24 hours a day. But there is also a monument to more than 2,000 unknown soldiers who died during the Civil War.

Jim, all of 11 years old, confided to friends last week that one of his lifelong ambitions (or at least since he was 5 years old) was to enter a greased pig contest and take home one of the animals.

As President Kennedy did in choosing a running mate, Jim gave quite a bit of thought to selection of his partner in pig catching. Bill Cox, 7 years old, got the nod because, as Jim explained: "Bill is so quick I know he can catch one of those pigs, even if I don't, and he will be game enough to hold on until I can get to him."

At least two members of the Jaycees, Bill Tomlinson and Vernay Teague, added to their rodeo knowledge last week, particularly in regard to the handling of roping calves.

When help became scarce in the arena during one of the calf roping events, Bill and Vernay volunteered. Their chore was to loose the calves after they had been roped and tied, a harmless sounding job.

But the calves had different ideas, and both Jaycees suffered injuries that left them crippled for several days and qualified them for rodeo Purple Hearts.

Rin died Friday in his kennel behind the City Hall, from poisoning, believed to have been strychnine. He was found dead only a few minutes after effective help.

Because Rin was a friendly pup, his killer probably found it easy to toss out a morsel of poisoned meat while driving by the dog's kennel beside the alley.

Rin's killer probably feels a sense of satisfaction over his deed in poisoning a helpless animal, causing the defenseless creature to suffer needless agony before death brought relief. What satisfaction a warped mind can derive from such an act cannot be imagin-

ed.

Of the two — Rin and his killer — Rin is now the better off. His killer still lives, but he must face his conscience the rest of his life. And we cannot help but believe that some day, in some form, retribution will come for the heartless, cowardly act.

Ordinarily, genial Buck Bland wouldn't be considered a kill-joy by any means. However, Buck does have a low regard for this business of breaking beer bottles on the highway which a few odd balls consider a "pastime." A Rule character learned this to his sorrow last week.

It happened on Thursday. Buck, his son, Mike, along with a neighbor, Albert Hannas and Ocie Carruth were working on a planter beside the highway

when they noticed a car approaching. In it was this bird from Rule and several youths, all on Cloud 7 and well saturated, it seemed.

Just as the car passed the group of farmers, the odd ball driver let out a lusty warwhoop and crashed an empty beer bottle to the highway, sending glass fragments flying.

When one of the farmers remarked, "If I thought my car would do it, I'd chase those guys down and report them." Buck, his blood pressure building up fast, said, "Don't worry, I can catch them in my pick-up."

Accompanied by Mike, he jumped in his pick-up and gave chase. At the intersection of the Rule highway with the F-M road, the bottle-thrower turned north and poured on the coal when he noted he was being followed.

But Buck was close behind and rolled up beside the car when it stopped at the traffic light in Rule, and told the driver:

"Bud, it might save you a little trouble if you pulled into the City Hall over there across the street, because I'm going there to report you."

The hapless driver followed the suggestion, but at the City Hall he started remonstrating that he wasn't drunk, hadn't done anything.

Reminded of the bottle throwing, he was repentant, saying he was sorry. To which Buck replied: "We were sure you would be sorry about the incident, that's the reason I followed you."

At last accounts, the bottle breaking incident, a violation of State traffic laws, was being handled by Constable Raymond Denson of Rule.

Another sighting of the area's phantom lion or panther has been reported, after the animal was seen recently crossing the highway north of town by Willie Grimes, Stamford terrace and tank contractor.

Grimes, who stopped his car and got a good look at the animal, described it as definitely "looking like a lion" and much too large for a dog.

The animal was seen again last Thursday about 11 p. m., about a quarter of a mile north of the Jeter place near Mule Creek south of town.

A Haskell couple returning from Stamford spotted the big cat some 20 feet east of the highway. Driving slowly, they thought at first the animal was a calf when it showed up in their headlights.

"Then my wife called attention to its shaggy head, and we both had the same thought—that it was a lion," the man said. "But please don't mention our names, people would think we'd stopped too long on Bourbon Drive," he added quickly.

He thinks the 'lion' or whatever it was, had been eating something, because it stood in the same place as if holding something under one foot while facing the car lights in a defiant manner. "I had always thought these reports of a lion being seen were simply made-up 'yarns,'" he said. "Now I'm convinced that the animal we saw was a lion or panther. I'm positive it wasn't a dog, it was much too large. I don't know how to describe it, but it had the look and bearing of a big cat," he declared.

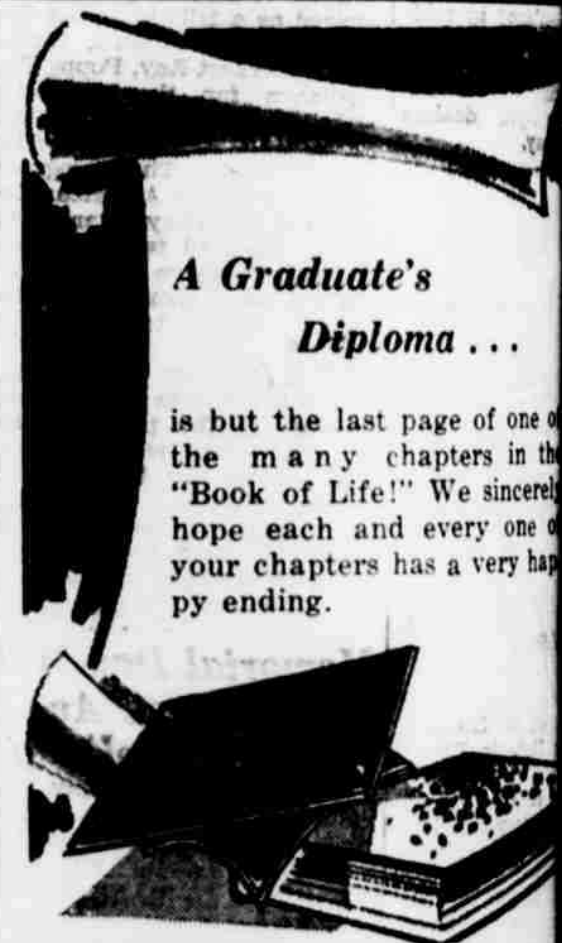

course or to the lake on Sunday instead of to church. He says, "Those who want to go to church can go, and I won't try to stop them. I can feel closer to God in the fresh air than I can in church." This man actually feels that he is broad-minded. This same man doesn't care whether a person is a Christian, a Moslem, or a Confucianist... or nothing at all! "Let every man be what he will," he says.

Such enlightened tolerance can come only from the completely cynical or the completely indifferent. There is more honesty in the militant atheist than in this tolerant "believer." G. K. Chesterton has said that the purpose of an open mind, like that of an open mind, is to close it on something solid. Open-mindedness can sometimes be the type of "virtue" that allows us to be opinionless, permitting us to dodge the ultimate issues, to non-committal, to play it safe.

The Christian Church is "narrow" in the sense that it has resolved to know nothing except Christ... and Him crucified. But "narrowness" within this already "narrow" way is much too narrow. It is choking! The first sort of "narrowness" we must have, Elton Trueblood has said that "there is no cutting edge that is not narrow." But... we would add, if the surface of the cutting edge is gapped and split, its proficiency is destroyed.

The tolerance that is a virtue as well as the unity which we seek both are to be found within the confines of the way that is straight and narrow. It is the way of Christ.

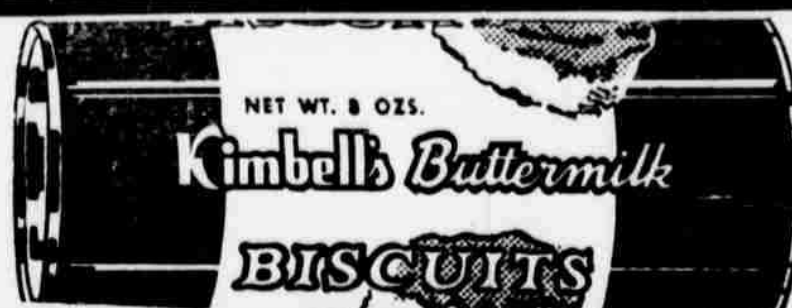

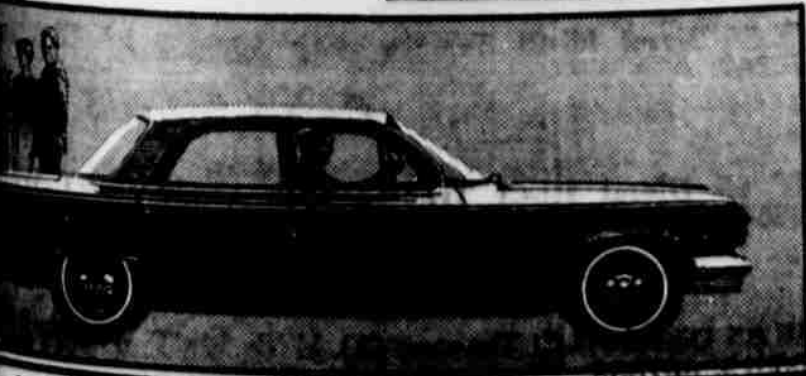
