JR. HI WARRIORS, INDIANS OF TOMORROW, ARE CO-CHAMPS

Haskell Junior High School's Warriors have completed their season with five wins and one loss in a double-round robin schedule in their four team district, and share the district championship with the Anson Junior High Tiger Kittens.

Coached by Sonny Everett, former Breckenridge Buckaroo and Rice Owl football great, now in his first season of coaching here, the Haskell Junior High gridders increased their margin of victory as the season progressed after an early season loss to co-district champs, Anson.

Scores of the six games played by the Warriors in their district were: Haskell 8, Hamlin 0; Haskell 8, Anson 16; Haskell 30, Albany 22; Haskell 20, Hamlin 6; Haskell 28, Anson 12; and Haskell 40, Albany 18.

Highlights of the Warriors' six games in the order in which they were played follow: Haskell Jr. High defeated the Hamlin Jr. High by a score of 8-0 in the season opener. Haskell's only score was made by Derrel Davis and the two

extra points were made by David Jacobs. The Haskell defense was outstanding.

In the second game, Haskell Jr. High was defeated by Anson Jr. High at Anson by a score of 16-8. Anson scored early in the first quarter, but Haskell tied the score with a pass from Tim Everett to Derrel Davis. The extra points were made by Johnny Josselot. The 2nd and 3rd quarters were scoreless. Anson scored their last touchdown by intercepting a Haskell pass with 1 minute and 50 seconds left.

On their third outing, the Warriors defeated Albany by a score of 30-22. Their first TD was made by David Jacobs and the extra points by Johnny Josselot.

Tim Everett intercepted a pass on the Warrior's own 25-yard line and ran it back ten yards. At this time the Warriors were behind by 2 points. They drove from this point to their first touchdown which was scored by Derrel Davis. David Jacobs made the extra points. The Warriors' final touchdown was made by Tim Everett, with extra points again made by David Jacobs. The entire team played a fine defensive game.

Haskell Warriors next traveled to Hamlin where they defeated the Hamlin Jr. High by a score of 20-6. Haskell's first TD was made by Johnny Josselot. The extra points were added by Josselot. The next

touchdown for Haskell was made by Troy Swartz. The try for extra points failed. Just before the half, Haskell added its last TD which was made by Tim Everett. Try for extra points failed. This ended the first half scoring, with the score standing 20-0 in favor of Haskell. The Warriors had some difficulty handling the ball due to the wet grass. Haskell went scoreless in the 2nd half, but Hamlin scored one touchdown.

In the season's fifth scrap, Haskell Warriors pounced on the Anson Juniors, 28-12. First Haskell TD came in the first quarter on an 18-yard pass from Tim Everett to David Jacobs, Johnny Josselot picked up the extra points and the Warriors led 8-0.

In the 2nd quarter, Tim Everett found paydirt on a keeper. Extra points failed. Later in the second quarter, Josselot scored again and then picked up the extra points. The Warriors led at halftime 22-0.

Anson scored during the 3rd quarter but still trailed 22-0. Everett again scored later in the third period to put Haskell on top 28-6. Anson was able to manage one more TD in the 4th quarter, but the Warriors had the victory, 28-12.

Everett's spirited Warriors ended the season with five wins and one loss by trouncing the Albany Cubs by a score of 40-16. Tim Everett made the first score for the Warriors, and Douglas Bartley added the extra points. The Warriors moved the ball well every time they got it. Haskell's next TD was made by Johnny Josselot and the try for extra points failed. Just before the half, Johnny Josselot made another touchdown and again the try for extra points failed. At the half the score was, Haskell 28, Albany 8. The Warriors were very strong on defense and offense. They allowed Albany only one more touchdown during the 2nd half while they scored two. Tim Everett made the first, and Joe Greer made the second. Both tries for extra points failed. Outstanding in the line for Haskell were Stanley Fancher, Patrick Pace, Bill Ratliff and Ray Herren. Ray also intercepted a pass to set up a Warrior touchdown.

Haskell's Livestock Auction Company, due to rain-mired roads in this area, had a "short run" at its weekly sale Saturday, but cattle which did get to the sale barn "are looking better." Bill Lane, co-owner-operator with T. R. Foster, of the facility here, reported on Monday.

Stocker pairs at the livestock auction here were up approximately \$20 on Saturday's market, and all cattle sales showed a sharp increase, Lane reported. AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HASKELL, TEXAS, CHANGING AND FIXING THE SPEED OF MOTOR VEHICLES ON U. S. HIGHWAY NO. 277, THROUGH THE CITY OF HASKELL; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION THEREOF AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HASKELL, TEXAS. That the speed limit for all motor vehicles on Highway U. S. 277 through the City of Haskell, Texas, shall be as follows: From the North City Limit to F. M. 2163 55 MPH From F. M. 2163 to North 13th Street 50 MPH From North 13th Street to North 10th Street 40 MPH From North 10th Street to North 3rd Street 35 MPH From North 3rd Street to South 3rd Street 30 MPH From South 3rd Street to South 6th Street 40 MPH From South 6th Street to South 12th Street 45 MPH From South 12th Street to South City Limit 55 MPH

It shall be unlawful for any person to drive a motor vehicle through the City of Haskell at a speed greater than the limits set forth above. Trustees of this school were Lee Parks and T. A. Parks. Mrs. Coates received \$80 a month for teaching and "I suppose considering everything the war, terrible sandstorms, and the measles epidemic, we were lucky to get through this year at all."

Mrs. Coates was the only teacher at the Center Point School which opened on September 23, 1918, with 49 pupils, and closed March 21, 1919. Miss Only Temple preceded the then Miss Hamilton at this school.

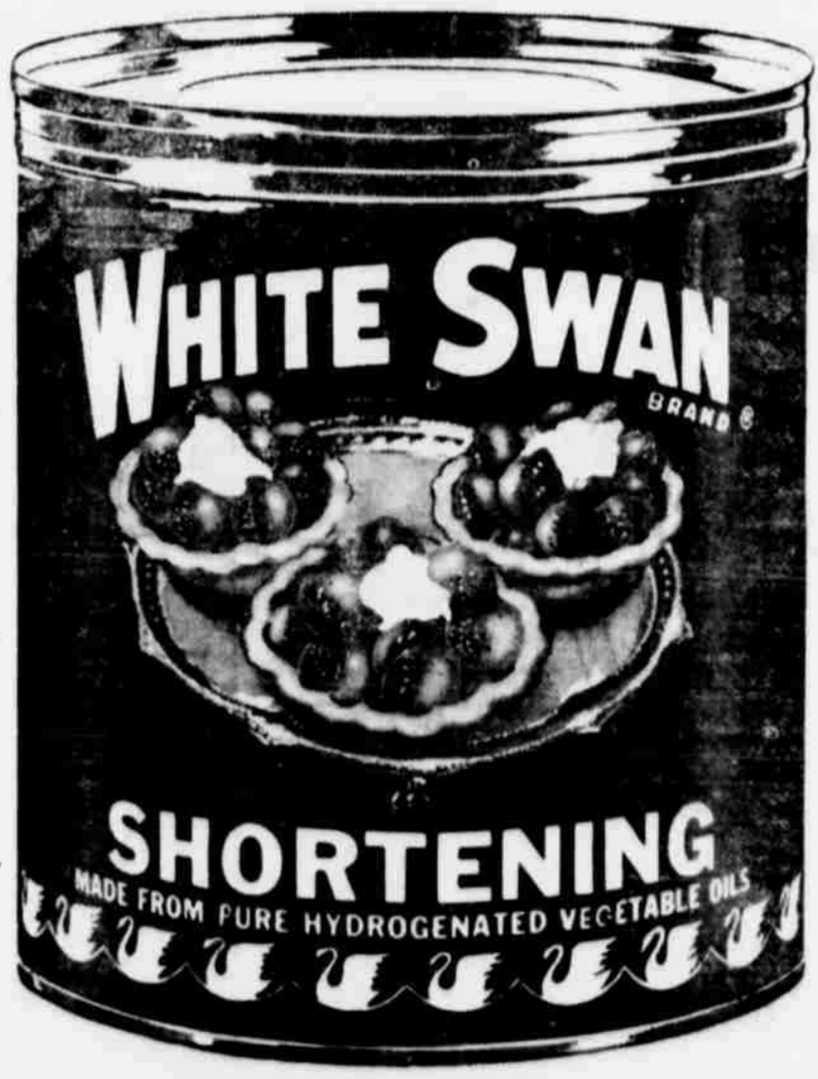

The Good Earth

The blowing wind and pelting rain brings new life to the growing grain. by MRS. B. F. COBB

Now that we have had several rains over most of the County, faces are much brighter. Every one is filled with a new zeal to plant trees and shrubs for next year's beauty.

November and December are good months for setting out trees and shrubs. They should be dormant before planting begins. Any time after a hard killing frost is fine. There are several things to take into consideration before planting trees or shrubs. Namely, how high and wide will the limbs reach; when the tree reaches its growth; how far do the roots feed? What variety of trees can be purchased, and what does best in this locality? If you are planting fruit trees: be sure the tree is self pollinating. Many trees require a companion to propagate. A medium size tree is often the best buy. The age of a tree is also important. Younger ones usually transplant with less shock than do the older ones. Be sure to dig a hole large enough to accommodate the roots. It is also wise to loosen the dirt quite a distance around the excavation, so the new roots, seeking food and water, will have soft earth to expand in.

When filling the hole, be sure not to leave air holes around the roots. Tamp the ground firmly as you fill the pit. Gently agitate the tree as you water around it. This lets the earth settle firmly and seals out all air pockets. If the winter is dry, water trees and shrubs deeply, at least once a month. Many of our plants give up the ghost during the winter months, for lack of moisture. Put trees and shrubs in fertile soil with good drainage; keep them well watered; use plenty of humus and organic nutrients around their base. Then sit back and watch a strong healthy tree enrich "the good earth."
