Appearing in his column, "Tolbert's Texas," the other day in the Dallas Morning News, Frank X. Tolbert mentioned the name of a pioneer rancher, now deceased, whose acquaintance and friendship were reverred by the pioneer West Texas ranchmen and other citizens of this area who
