KILLED BY A TRAIN.
By an oversight we omitted an account last week of the deplorable accident at Elmdale, in which two persons, J. E. Tucker and hittle son, Johnny, were killed by the westbound passerger Sudday night, Jan bour We orad list. We the facts, but it was difficult to get the facts, but it was difficult to
get anything reliable owing to the get anything reliable owing to the number of reports circulated, and having been called to Abilene Wednesday evening we failed to get the item entirely. The body of the man, who was killed instantly, was left at Elmdale until the Coroner from Abilene could come out and get it. The little boy was carried to Abilene and placed in the Hollis Sanitarium under the care of the railroad phyaicin, where everything possible was done to ave his life possible was done to save his ife, but he died the latter part of the week. The parties were here on
Saturday selling banannas and left Saturday selling banannas and left bere for Abilene Sunday evening and were killed by the west-bound passenger, Jim Ellis engineer, about 7:30.

The man was about 35 years old and the little boy about 12 years old and it is said that they lived at Haskell. Where the accident occur ed the wagonroad runs paralell with with the railroad for quite a distance and they evidently did not hear the train coming behind them as there was a stiff west wind blowing and they drove on the track in front of the train at the crossing. The wagon and buggy, trailing behind the wagon, were both demolished and the horses badly hurt. The man was killed instantly and the little boy 6
fatally injured. The latter was found upon the pilot of the engine after the train stopped.
