Mrs. Betts, always interested in community affairs. was a church leader, known afar for aer crochet handiwork and was considered a "sharpie" at dominces, polyanna and similar games right up until her death During her long residence in Rule, Grandmother Betts was known as that community's Number One Goodwill Ambassador," and was as responsible as anyone for the motto on signs on highways leading into Rule which say, "When You Stop, You Stay. Her cheery welcome caused many people to travel many a mile out of their way to see her.

When she became 100 years old, many people came many miles, too. Members of the family were there from Tulia. Fort Worth, Quitaque, Bovina, Lubbock, Kermit, Littlefield, Brownfield, Wichita Falls and several California points. Seven families of relatives came from Littlefield and Brownfield.

Also surviving are a brother. Robert Perry, of Dallas, now 96, and two stepsons.

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
