payer forgets one of the above? Mr. Campbell said the return must be specifically processed and any refund will be delayed. If the taxpayer calls or writes about his refund, this inquiry takes clerical help away from the processing of correctly prepared returns. Thus, all returns are slowed up. Review your return very

carefully when it is completed, Mr. Campbell advised. Put it aside overnight, then review it again the next day. After you are sure it is clear, complete. and correct, mail it to the District Director of Revenue, 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Texas 75201.
