## Tests Continue On Husky No. 1 Knox Wildcat

Husky Oil Company of Midland and Associates continue testing to complete at No. 1 Knox, Northwest Martin County wildcat, which has indicated it will make a discovery from the Wolfcamp lime.

That formation is being tested through perforations at 9,128-9,146 feet after washing with 500 gallons of mud acid and treating with 2,000 gallons of regular acid.

On the latest gauge reported, it produced 118.8 barrels of 37 gravity oil, flowing in 20 hours, through a 3/4-inch choke.

The oil was cut with two per cent acid water and three-tenths of one per cent basic sediment. There were no signs of formation water.

Tubing pressure was from 50 to 100 pounds. The well made gas at the rate of 115,000 cubic feet daily, to give a gas-oil ratio of 968-1.

This project is 26 miles north-west of Stanton and 6,507 feet from south and 3,812 feet from west line of league 253, Ward (Continued on page 8)

## Congressman Mahon To Seek Higher Grain Sorghum Rates

WASHINGTON, March 5—Rep. George Mahon reports that the recently announced drop in support loans for feed grains has been a shock to the Members of Congress from grain sorghum producing areas.

The House Committee on Agriculture is making a study of the situation in preparation for a Committee hearing which will be held March 13. The support loan level announced for milo for the 1959 crop is 31 cents per hundred below the level for last year. The national average support for milo last year was \$1.83 per hundred. The announced national average support for this year is \$1.52 per hundred.

On February 18, 1959, the Secretary of Agriculture announced support loan levels for corn, milo, and other feed grains. In view of the language of the law, it was anticipated that the support price for milo in 1959 would be approximately the same as corn, inasmuch as both have approximately the same feed value. This is not the case, and an explanation is being demanded and ways are being sought to remedy the situation.

Mahon stated, "Since the drastic drop in support levels for milo was announced, I have ap-

Such communal endeavor has been practiced at many times

and in many places during the centuries since the church began.

This does not mean that communal living, as these first Christians practiced it, is either advisable or feasible under the complex conditions of modern society in which the vast majority of us play a part.

But it does mean that even in the most complex social conditions, true Christians will wish to live unselfishly, using themselves and their possessions for the doing of the will of God, and for the blessing of their fellow men.

Let us thank God for the men and women who have lived in that Christian way. And let us realize that, complex as society may be, there can be no lasting peace, prosperity and happiness for all until all men live to love and help one another.

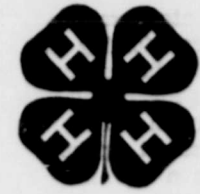

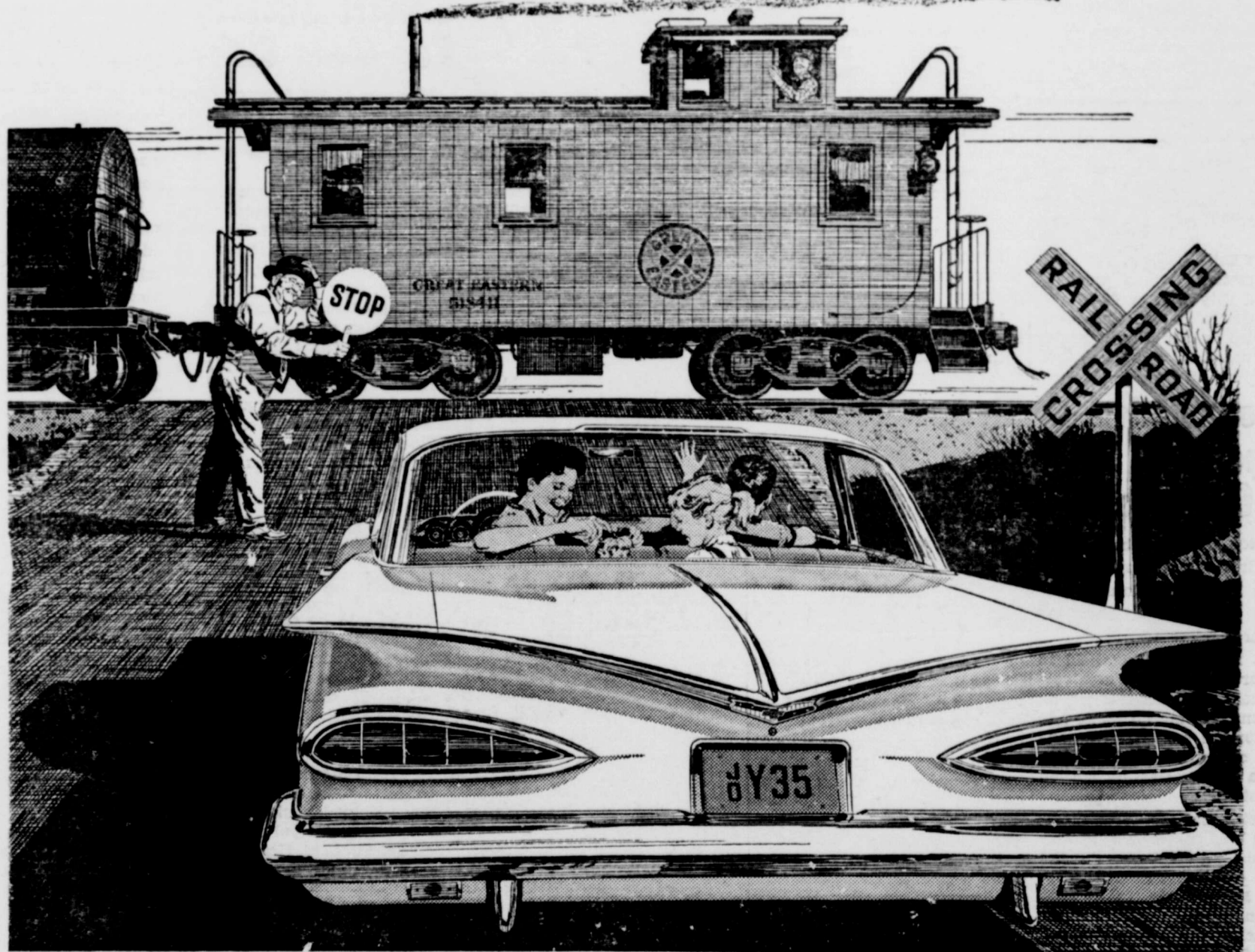

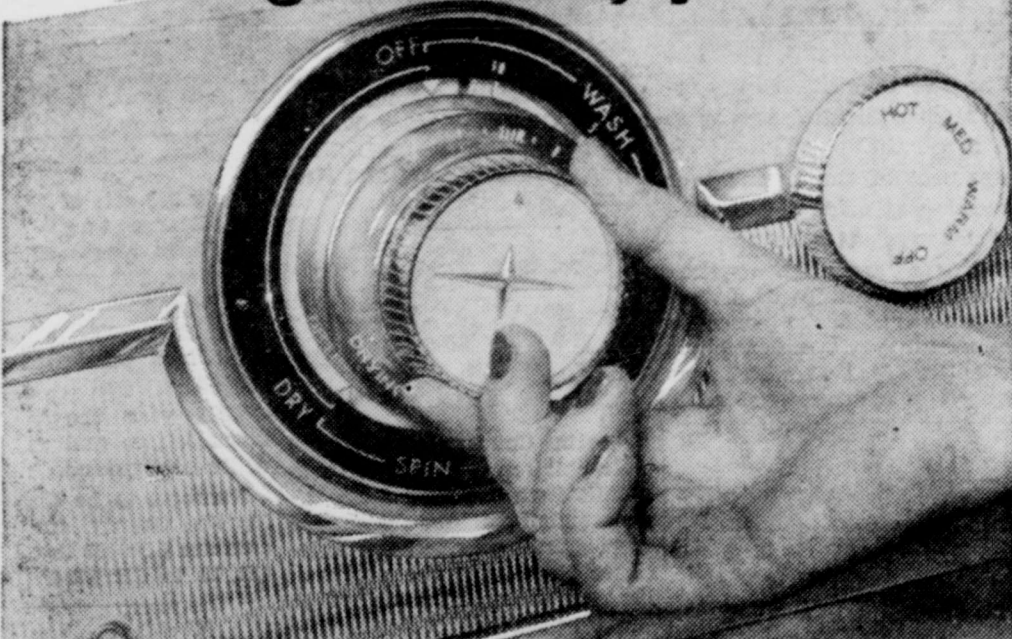

**Vocational Agriculture And Business Training**

By TRAVIS SCOTT, Vocational Agriculture  
Stanton High School

The ability to manage one's business well is desired by everyone. But how does one learn the art of management?

This ability, like many others, can only be learned through experience. This important fact is realized and provided for in the vocational agriculture program at Stanton High School.

Vocational agriculture students are afforded opportunities to learn business management in dealing with individual and FFA projects.

The individual projects of students consist of crop and livestock projects and are usually referred to as the students supervised farming program. Each student is required to have one before he is allowed to take vocational agriculture. Growing these projects and keeping records on them provides students with very valuable experience in business management.

Students learn about the economic laws involved in buying and selling commodities. Too, they learn how to manage their land, labor, and capital in order to make the maximum amount of profit.

Last year the value of crops and livestock produced by the 39 vocational agriculture students at Stanton High School was \$7,687.15. Producing products valued at this much requires the use of good managerial abilities.

Jimmy Barber, second year vocational agriculture student, was one of the chapter's top money earners this year with a yield of 10 bales on 15 acres dryland cotton and labor income of \$1,183.48. Jimmy also fed and showed lambs. He moved at mid-term to Hereford.

Gilbert Casbeer, Star Chapter Farmer for 1958, showed an income of \$375 on capon, broiler, lamb and barrow projects.

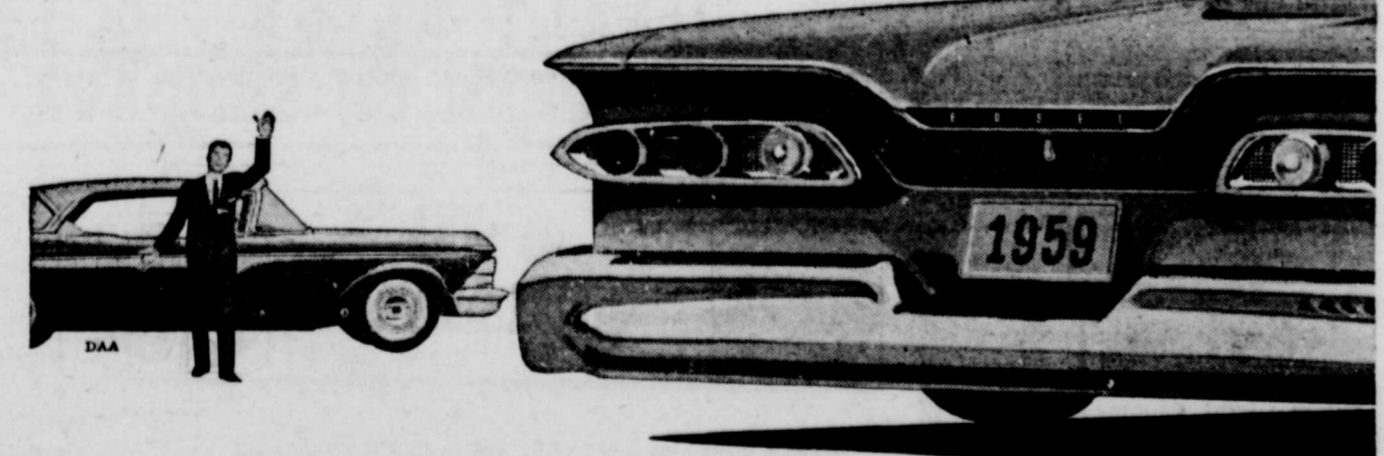

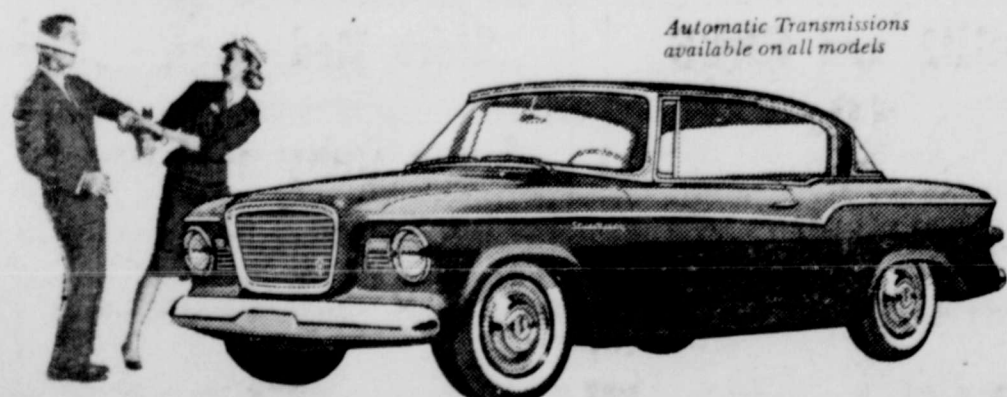

### TESCO Manager Stresses Kite Flying Safety

Safety rules for boys and girls who fly kites were outlined this week by Cecil Bridges, manager for Texas Electric Service Company.

As explained by Bridges, the five safety rules in order of their importance are: First, fly your kites out in the open where it won't get caught in wires or trees. Second, use only string made of cotton, silk, linen, nylon or rayon. Third, use only wood in your kite frames. Fourth, fly kites only in good weather. You don't want to get them rain soaked. Fifth, if your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company. They will send someone to get it down for you.

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been very careful in the past about where and when they flew their kites," Bridges stated. "We had a perfect record last year with not one boy or girl being injured and only a few kites demolished. This year, I fully expect that even the number of kites lost will be reduced because it seems that every year, our boys and girls listen more carefully to our warnings and cooperate better in making kite flying safe."

To further impress children that safety is all-important in kite flying, Texas Electric Service Company is providing posters for all school bulletin boards and announcements for school principals.

Nance is participating in the Great Plains Conservation Program and plans to reseed the rest of his rangeland in the near future. Nance also plans a conservation cropping system on his cropland.

Conservation of soil, water and plants takes the undue risk out of farming and ranching.

Joe Froman and W. J. Sprawls have made application to the local Soil Conservation Service

office for participation in the Great Plains Conservation Program. Sprawls has 160 acres and plans to terrace part of it and have a strip cropping system. He also plans to return part of his place to native grasses. Froman plans to terrace and strip crop his farm.

K. F. Campbell plans to begin root plowing and reseed on part of his ranch this week. Campbell will plow about 100 acres of mesquite infested rangeland and seed this land to a mixture of native and introduced grasses.

Continued misuse or prolonged conservation use will make very obvious changes on rangeland. Look across the road or over the fence and evaluate your own situation.

Douglas added that if the Legislature fails to enact these school bills at this session, and fails to provide the money for them, it may be years before the timing is right for another such appeal.

"We can't afford to lose the tremendous citizen force behind these recommendations at this time," Douglas explained. "And if we don't levy the necessary taxes to pay for them at this session, it may be years before another legislature will be in the mood to consider again the kind of taxes needed to put the Hale-Aikin type of program into operation."

"If we're going to stay ahead of Russia, we'd better not miss a chance to improve our schools," the local educator declared. "We need to pass this program this year — not two or ten years from now."

The prospector bottomed at 12,148 feet in barren Devonian. It then plugged back for the testing in the Wolfcamp.

Cities Service Oil Company No. 1 Glass, wildcat in South Martin County, flowed new oil and acid water after perforations opposite the Strawn were washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

The shot holes are from 10,614 to 10,619 feet and from 10,608 to 10,612 feet.

During the last 5½ hours of testing, the project flowed 30 barrels of new oil and 25 barrels of acid water, through a 20/64-inch choke. Testing continued.
