

Friday's 101 degree thermometer reading in Haskell was the 24th day out of the 31 in July that the century mark was topped, the peak heat being 108 registered here on the 10th day of the month, Weatherman Sam P. Herren Jr., re-

ported. Minimum temperatures durthe midsummer month just ended were the 59 and 67 recorded on successive days, July 13 and 14 which few folks here now can recall, so torrid have been the contrasting temperatures morning or evening since that time.

July was one of the driest, 000 000 0-0 2 2 as well as one of the most sizzling, on record in Haskell. Only 11 of an inch of rain fell here the entire 31-day month, and there had been 40 consec-

utive days from June 13 to July 23 without a drop of moisture until a scant .02 fell that day. An additional .09 fell July 26 to complete the moisture totals for the seventh month the year.



1960-64 VOTER STRENGTH IN 13TH DISTRICT REVEALS STORY

summer, so how about switching to politics with the season fast approaching?

Texas 13th District's incumbent Congressman Graham Purcell, of Wichita Falls, and his Republican opponent, George Corse, of Graham, will have at least 90,363 voters to whom to present their campaign messages this fall. That's almost 6,000 more voters than there were in the 1960 general election. And more of them are in town these days.

Steady growth in the number of voters in the 13th Congressional District, which includes Haskell, and all the counties surrounding it except Jones, is shown by a tabulation of figures on poll tax payments and exemption receipts obtained in the district's nineteen counties.

Comparing presidential election years of 1960 and 1964 reveals that 11 of the 19 counties in the district have lost voters since 1960, including all in the Haskell area with the exception of one. Kent, which turned up with exactly the same number-680 as it had four years ago,

But the bigger counties, Wichita, Denton, Cooke and Wilbarger, have continued to gain in voter strength,

The tabulation shows that this congressional district has 90,363 qualified voters, in addition to these over 60 who live in towns under 10,000, and in rural areas, who do not need an exemption certificate to vote, and the voters who obtained the federal-only registrations entitling them to vote in Federal elections only. Blaskell County, for example, is reported to have some 1500 potential voters in this category, over and above its 2049 registered ones. The "over 60's" and "federal onlys" are list reflected

The 1904 figure of 90.363 compares with 84,417 voters in the same counties in 1960. But in 1956, there were 87,255, indicating a drop in population in some counties during the drought era. The following tables compare the 1960 and 1954 voting




